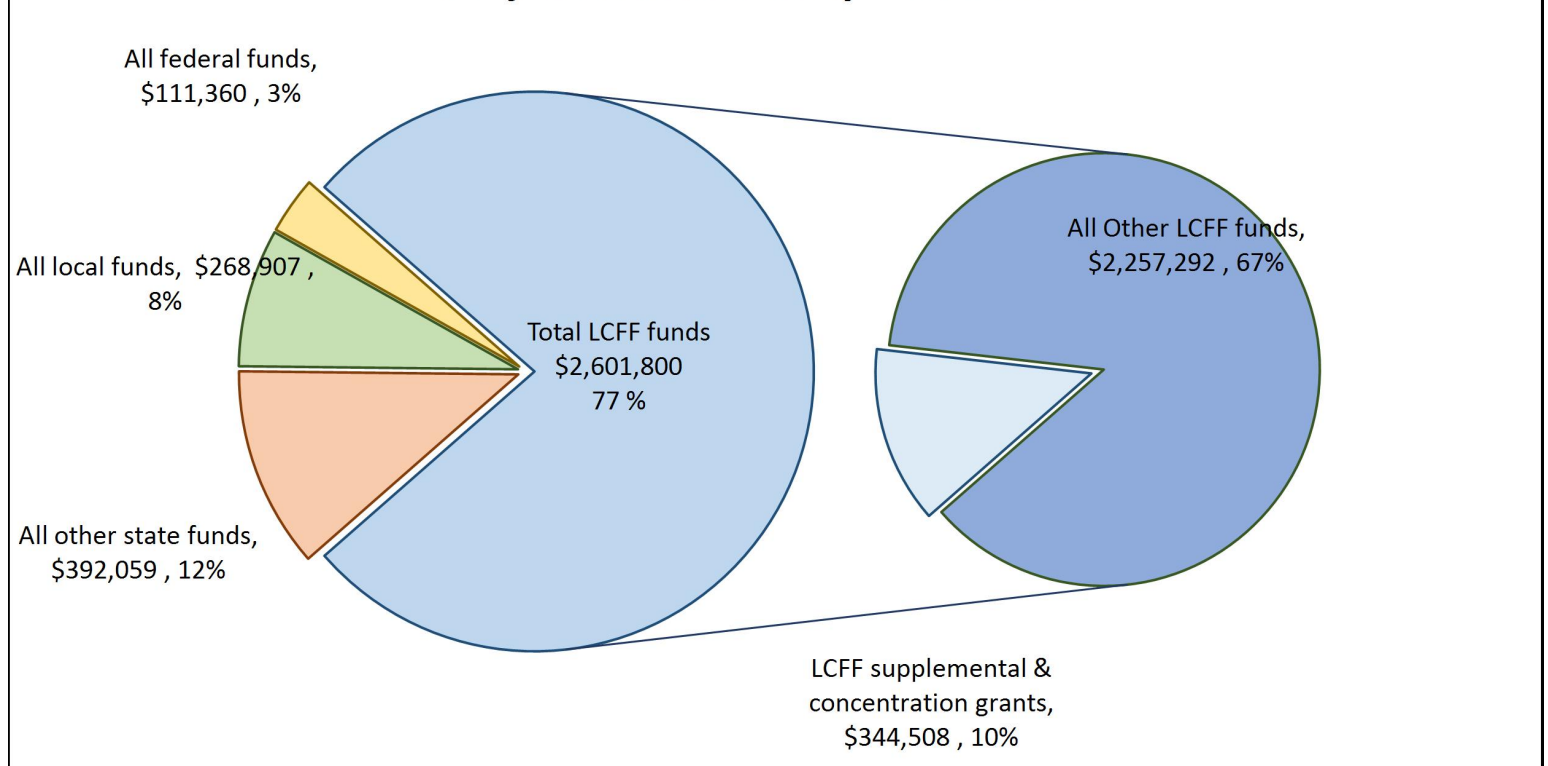

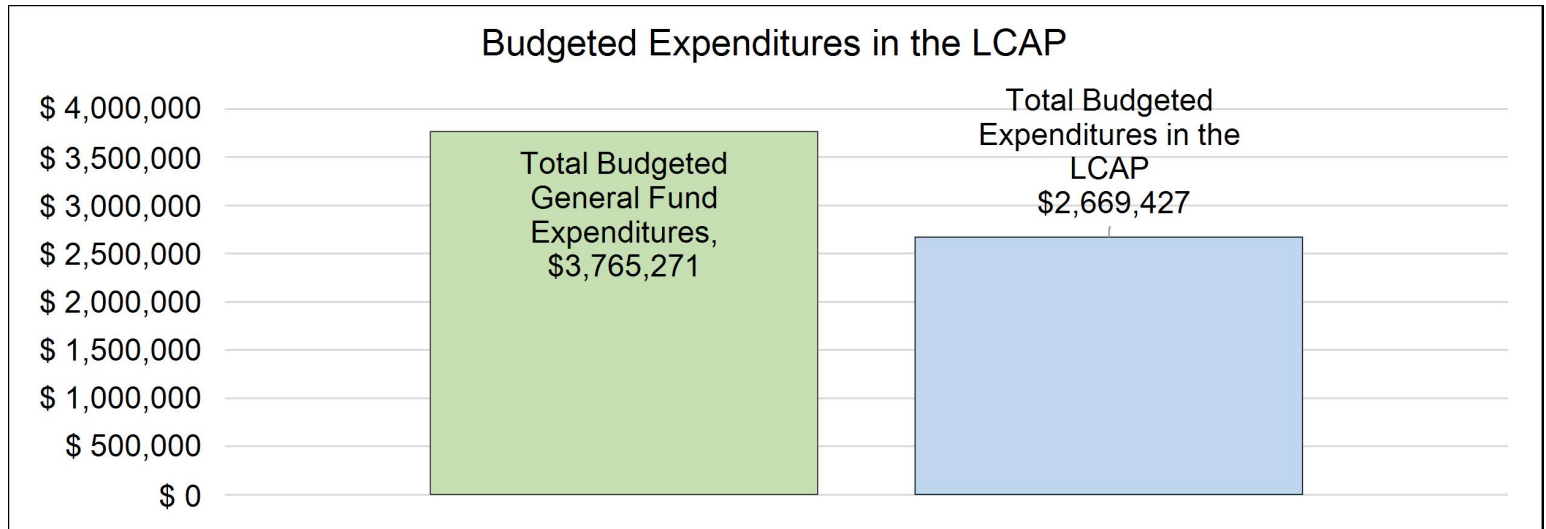

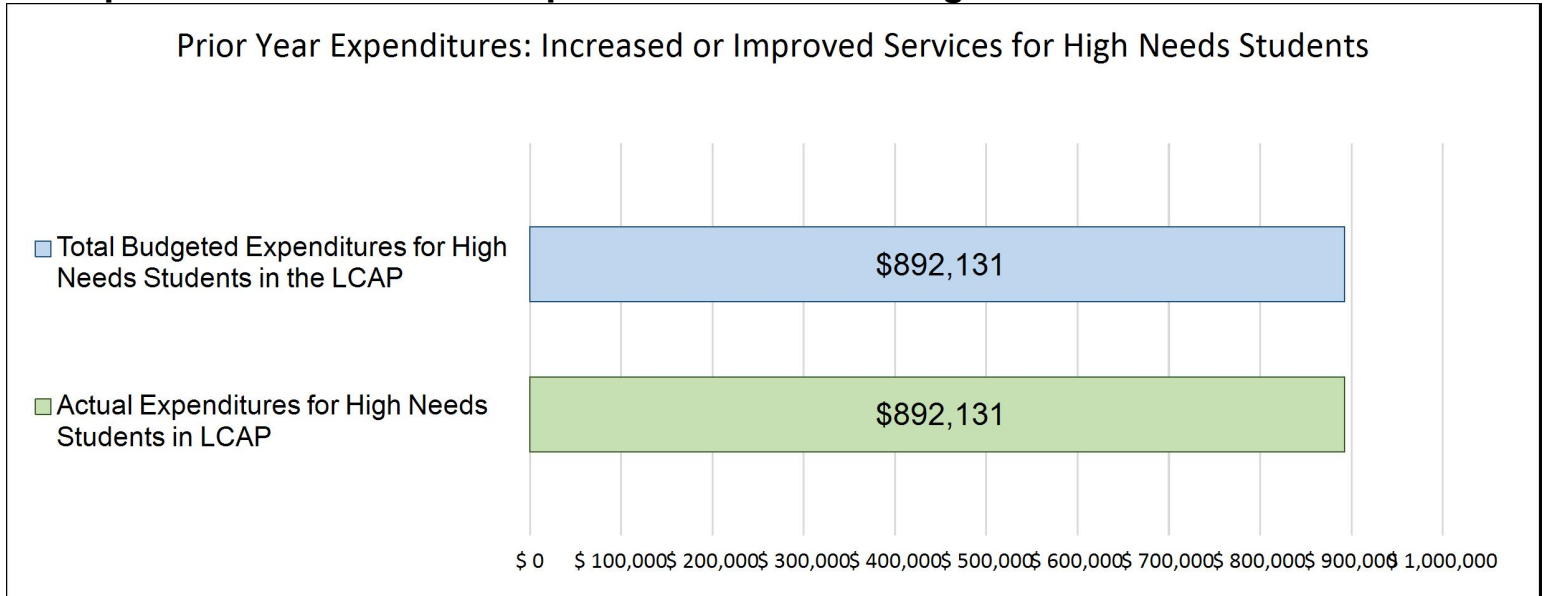

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

New Jerusalem Charter School (NJC) is in the heart of a vibrant agricultural community in southern San Joaquin County near the city of Tracy. This public charter school offers an alternative to traditional public schooling under the governance of the New Jerusalem School District and its School Board. With a mission focused on cultivating an intellectually stimulating environment, NJC fosters responsibility, respect, independent thinking, and mastery of content standards. The school is dedicated to creating a positive learning atmosphere where students are encouraged to realize their academic potential. Through a comprehensive approach that includes academic instruction, interventions, and support programs encompassing in-school, after-school, and summer sessions, NJC is committed to ensuring student success.

New Jerusalem Elementary School (NJES) comprises Grades 1-8, with one Kindergarten class that is part of another District LEA feeding into our Charter school. Our public charter school provides area residents with a public school option managed and operated by the New Jerusalem School District and their School Board. The school is deeply rooted in a strong community with generations of families that have been served within our school district and other authorized schools.

Our school's mission is to create an academically challenging environment that promotes responsibility, respect, independent thinking, and mastery of content standards. We will maintain a positive learning setting in which students maximize academic potential as determined by state and local assessments (ELPAC, CAASPP, MAP). NJES is committed to ensuring success by supporting our students through rigorous academic learning, interventions, and support efforts including in-school, after-school, and summer sessions.

The student population consists of 214 students in grades 1 through 8. The demographic profile includes 61% socioeconomically disadvantaged students, 25% English learners, and 27% students with disabilities. The ethnic composition of the student body is, 3% African American 57% Hispanic or Latino, 2% American Indian, 3% Two or More Races, and 35% White. NJC's commitment to student success is reflected in its dedication to maintaining a positive learning environment and supporting students through various academic and support efforts tailored to meet individual needs.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

The 2025 California School Dashboard and local data reflect that while New Jerusalem Charter continues to meet key operational benchmarks, several areas—including chronic absenteeism and consistent access to supports—require continued attention, while other areas such as English Learner progress and academic growth demonstrate meaningful improvement. Given that approximately 51.6% of students are socioeconomically disadvantaged and 27.2% are English learners, these outcomes highlight the importance of sustaining targeted supports for unduplicated pupils.

Recent data indicate that family engagement practices improved following adjustments to implementation. LCFF Priority 3 Self-Reflection Tool ratings show that the LEA maintained a rating of 5 in creating welcoming environments (Q2). However, collaborative planning (Q12) declined from 5 to 4 in 2024 and remained at 4 in 2025, indicating that earlier efforts emphasized participation in events rather than structured opportunities for shared decision-making. In 2025–2026, the LEA implemented consistent, calendared engagement opportunities, including DELAC, ELAC, Coffee with the Principal, LCAP parent input meetings, and parent club meetings. These changes improved outcomes because predictable and recurring engagement structures increased access for families—particularly English learner and socioeconomically disadvantaged families—allowing them to participate in ongoing dialogue prior to decision-making. As a result, Q12 returned to a rating of 5, and home learning support (Q6) also improved to and maintained a rating of 5.

- English Learner Progress: Very High (Blue), 67.9% making progress, increased by 35.8%, demonstrating strong effectiveness of language development supports because targeted services are addressing the needs of English learners
- English Language Arts (ELA): Medium (Yellow), 61.5 points below standard, improved by 27.3 points, indicating growth but continued need for academic acceleration
- Mathematics: Medium (Yellow), 94.6 points below standard, improved by 22.6 points, showing progress while maintaining a significant performance gap

- Chronic Absenteeism (Local Trend): Initially increased, then significantly reduced to 13.6%, indicating that revised strategies were more effective because they better addressed barriers to attendance for unduplicated pupils
- Access to Counseling Services: Declined from 25% to 6%, indicating inconsistent access to supports because systems for outreach, referral, or service delivery were not consistently implemented
- Communication (Local Survey): Increased from 90% to 96% before declining to 93%; however, no survey was conducted in 2025–2026, limiting evaluation of trends

Overall, the data indicate that the LEA has maintained strong foundational systems while demonstrating improvement in key areas such as English learner progress and academic growth. However, chronic absenteeism and inconsistent access to supports remain areas requiring continued focus. Outcomes improved because targeted strategies became more structured and aligned to student needs, particularly for unduplicated pupils. Moving forward, the LEA will prioritize strengthening attendance systems, expanding access to student supports, and maintaining structured family engagement practices to sustain and accelerate progress across all priority areas.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

The development of the 2026–27 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) at New Jerusalem Charter School was guided by an ongoing and collaborative engagement process that centered the perspectives of educational partners. Families, teachers, administrators, classified staff, students, and community representatives provided feedback through climate surveys, public comment opportunities, advisory committee meetings, including the School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), and District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC), as well as LCAP planning meetings conducted throughout the school year.

Educational partner input was reviewed alongside multiple measures of local and state data, including CAASPP, ELPAC, MAP Growth, attendance, and school climate indicators, to evaluate progress toward prior goals and identify areas requiring additional support. This process helped ensure the LCAP reflects current student needs, particularly for English learners, low-income students, and students requiring additional academic and social-emotional supports. The engagement process aligns with the LCAP requirement that educational partner input inform comprehensive planning and continuous improvement.

Influence of Educational Partner Feedback on LCAP Goals

Goal 1: Strengthen Family Partnerships and Promote a Safe, Inclusive Learning Environment

Feedback from families, students, and staff through the 2025 Climate Survey and advisory meetings emphasized the continued need for consistent communication, student safety, and stronger family-school relationships. Educational partners identified a desire for increased opportunities for family participation and clearer communication regarding student progress and school programs. As a result, the school revised and expanded actions related to family engagement events, communication systems, school safety practices, and staff professional development focused on relationship-building and inclusive school culture.

Goal 2: Improve Literacy Outcomes Across All Grade Levels

Teachers, instructional staff, and administrators identified early literacy and reading comprehension as ongoing priorities based on student assessment results and classroom performance data. Educational partners emphasized the importance of targeted literacy instruction, intervention support, and professional development in evidence-based reading practices. In response, the LCAP continues to prioritize literacy acceleration through instructional coaching, intervention services, progress monitoring, and expanded supports for students performing below grade level.

Goal 3: Provide Tiered Academic and Social-Emotional Supports for Identified Student Groups

Educational partners reviewed student achievement, attendance, engagement, and English learner performance data and expressed concern regarding achievement gaps and student well-being. Families and staff emphasized the importance of timely academic intervention, mental health support, and strategies to improve student connectedness and engagement. This feedback influenced the refinement of actions focused on intervention systems, English learner supports, counseling services, and programs designed to improve attendance, school climate, and student engagement outcomes.

The adopted 2026–27 LCAP reflects the district’s continued commitment to using educational partner feedback and data analysis to guide decision-making, prioritize student needs, and improve outcomes for all students.

At New Jerusalem Charter School, our commitment to cultivating strong family partnerships remains central to our mission of providing a high-quality, equitable education. This commitment is not aspirational—it is fully embedded in our systems and practices, as demonstrated by our consistent full implementation and sustainability ratings across all components of the LCFF Priority 3 Self-Reflection Tool. We believe that active family engagement directly supports student academic success and well-being. By fostering inclusive relationships and maintaining open, two-way communication, we build a supportive educational environment that extends beyond the classroom. Our efforts include regular parent-teacher conferences, multilingual newsletters, family workshops, school events, and advisory committees that ensure families are well-informed and involved in their child’s education. In 2023, the California School Dashboard confirmed that New Jerusalem Charter School met all Priority 3 indicators at the highest level, including: Building Relationships Between School Staff and Families: Our staff are trained to recognize and value each family’s strengths, culture, language, and educational goals. We intentionally create welcoming environments that affirm every family’s voice and presence in the school community. Building Partnerships for Student Outcomes: Through workshops, learning nights, and access to educational resources, families are empowered to support student learning at home. Staff receive professional learning to strengthen home-school connections and personalize communication strategies. Seeking Input for Decision-Making: Families are actively involved in shaping school policies and programs through School Site Council, ELAC, DELAC, LCAP meetings, and parent advisory committees. We prioritize the inclusion of underrepresented groups to ensure all voices are heard in schoolwide planning and improvement efforts.

For 2026–27, we will continue to deepen these efforts by:

Expanding culturally responsive outreach and engagement strategies.

Strengthening professional development focused on family engagement best practices.

Enhancing opportunities for families to participate in data analysis and program evaluation.

Increasing the visibility and impact of family feedback on school decisions.

These actions ensure that educational partners—especially families—remain at the center of our planning, implementation, and continuous improvement cycle.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 LCAP year, New Jerusalem Charter School implemented the majority of planned actions aligned to strengthening family engagement, including ongoing communication efforts, advisory committee meetings (SSC, ELAC, DELAC), and opportunities for family participation in school programs and decision-making processes. These actions were carried out consistently throughout the year, with continued emphasis on maintaining strong relationships between staff and families and ensuring access to information and engagement opportunities.

Overall implementation remained strong, as evidenced by sustained high ratings on the LCFF Priority 3 Self-Reflection Tool. The 2024 baseline reflected full implementation and sustainability (rating of 5) across all components. In 2024–25, ratings declined in several areas (ranging from 2 to 5), particularly within “Building Partnerships for Student Outcomes” and “Building Relationships,” indicating variability in the consistency and depth of implementation. In response, the LEA adjusted practices during the year, which resulted in improved ratings in 2025–26 (primarily 4s and 5s), demonstrating a return toward full implementation.

Substantive differences between planned and actual implementation included the need to refine engagement strategies to better meet the needs of educational partners. While planned activities such as workshops, communication outreach, and advisory meetings occurred, participation and impact were uneven across student groups. This required mid-year adjustments to increase accessibility and responsiveness, including strengthening communication practices and expanding outreach efforts.

Successes in implementation are reflected in improved outcomes in several key metrics. Family satisfaction with communication increased significantly for all students (from 80% to 93%), with notable gains among English Learner families (from 76% to 98%), indicating that communication strategies became more accessible and effective. Additionally, school attendance rates improved across all student groups (from 91.05% to 94.3% overall), suggesting that strengthened school-family connections contributed to increased student engagement because families who receive clear, timely, and accessible communication are better able to support consistent student attendance.

Challenges encountered during implementation included inconsistent engagement across subgroups and reduced participation in certain services. For example, the percentage of students accessing counseling services declined from 25% to 12%, indicating that outreach and connection to support services did not reach all intended students and families. Chronic absenteeism rates also initially increased (from 11.5% to 15.4%) before improving the following year, suggesting that early engagement efforts were not sufficient to address attendance barriers for all student groups.

These challenges highlight that while structures for engagement were in place, the depth and equity of engagement varied, particularly for unduplicated student groups. Adjustments made during the implementation period focused on improving inclusivity and responsiveness, which contributed to subsequent improvements in both engagement indicators and student outcomes.

Overall, the LEA effectively implemented its planned actions, with evidence of continuous improvement over time. Variations in implementation quality and participation informed refinements to engagement strategies, resulting in stronger alignment between family engagement efforts and improved student outcomes.

Effectiveness:

This action was effective during the 2025–2026 school year as the LEA continued to implement a comprehensive system of family engagement opportunities designed to strengthen partnerships between families and the school. Families participated in School Site Council, ELAC, DELAC, Coffee with the Principal meetings, parent-teacher conferences, family events, and LCAP engagement activities, providing multiple opportunities for two-way communication and educational partner input.

The effectiveness of this action is reflected in the LCFF Priority 3 Self-Reflection Tool results. Ratings for Q2 (welcoming environments), Q6 (supporting learning at home), and Q12 (collaborative planning of family engagement activities) remained at the highest implementation level, indicating that family engagement practices are fully implemented and sustained throughout the LEA. These results demonstrate that the LEA has established consistent systems that promote family participation, support learning beyond the classroom, and provide meaningful opportunities for educational partners to contribute to school planning and improvement efforts.

Student engagement indicators also remained positive during implementation of this action. Attendance rates remained strong, chronic absenteeism remained below baseline levels, and suspension rates remained at 0%. These outcomes suggest that maintaining strong relationships between families and the school supported ongoing student engagement and a positive school climate.

Overall, this action proved effective because the LEA sustained structured opportunities for family involvement and educational partner participation, resulting in continued implementation of high-quality family engagement practices and positive student engagement outcomes.

Action 1.2 – Educational Partner Communication

Aligned Metric:

3A: Educational Partner Communication Satisfaction

Effectiveness:

This action was effectively implemented through the continued use of ParentSquare, school newsletters, website updates, automated messaging systems, translation services, and direct communication between staff and families. These communication systems provided families with timely information regarding student learning, school events, attendance, and opportunities for educational partner engagement.

The LEA maintained a focus on providing accessible communication for all families, including multilingual communication and translated materials when needed. Consistent communication increased family awareness of school programs and engagement opportunities while supporting stronger connections between families and school staff.

Educational partner feedback indicated that families continued to value the availability of multiple communication platforms and the responsiveness of school staff. These communication systems supported family participation in school activities and decision-making processes by reducing barriers to accessing important information.

Overall, this action was effective because it maintained clear, consistent, and accessible communication practices that strengthened relationships with educational partners and supported ongoing family engagement throughout the school year.

Action 1.3 – Targeted Student Group Parent Volunteer Recruitment

Aligned Metric:

3c: Increase the number of parent volunteers recruited from targeted student groups (English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged households, and families of students with disabilities).

Effectiveness:

This action was effective during the 2025–2026 school year as the LEA continued to implement targeted outreach and engagement strategies designed to increase participation from families who have historically experienced barriers to school involvement. The LEA funded bilingual personnel and utilized translated communications, family outreach efforts, parent information meetings, surveys, and ongoing relationship-building activities to improve access to volunteer opportunities and school engagement activities.

Implementation of this action increased awareness of volunteer opportunities among English Learner and socioeconomically disadvantaged families by providing information in families' primary languages and reducing communication barriers. The use of bilingual staff and translated materials improved families' ability to access school information, understand volunteer opportunities, and participate in school activities. Parent information nights and educational partner meetings also provided opportunities for families to learn about school programs and become more actively involved in supporting student success.

The effectiveness of this action is reflected in the LEA's continued efforts to recruit and engage parent volunteers from targeted student groups and to create more inclusive opportunities for participation. These outreach systems strengthened relationships between families and the school while increasing access to school engagement opportunities for families who may not have previously participated due to language, communication, or access barriers.

Overall, this action proved effective because the LEA maintained intentional outreach and communication systems that expanded opportunities for participation among targeted student groups and supported more equitable family engagement across the school community.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

New Jerusalem Charter School developed this goal in response to extensive analysis of the 2024–25 MAP and CAASPP ELA data, which revealed a persistent need to improve student literacy across all grade levels. Spring 2025 MAP results showed that 23% of all students met or exceeded reading standards, with particularly low performance in the upper grades with 10% of 6th graders and 3% of 7th graders demonstrating proficiency. These results were corroborated by 2024 CAASPP ELA data, which showed that 18.45% of students met or exceeded standards, with no students meeting grade-level benchmarks in Grade 5.

Additionally, subgroup data indicated that progress toward English language proficiency and reclassification remained areas of concern. In 2023–24, 42% of English learners made progress toward proficiency on the ELPAC, and 4.6% were reclassified. Though those rates improved in 2024–25 (ELPAC progress dropped slightly to 32%, but reclassification rose to 11%), the New Jerusalem Charter School recognizes the need to better align instructional supports and language development programming.

These findings were reinforced by educational partner feedback highlighting the urgency to invest in reading interventions, bilingual family engagement, and culturally relevant instructional materials. In response, this goal prioritizes targeted actions for unduplicated student groups—English learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, and foster youth—who are overrepresented in the lowest performance bands.

This goal aligns with LCFF State Priorities 2 (Implementation of State Standards), 4 (Pupil Achievement), and 8 (Other Pupil Outcomes), and is designed to close literacy gaps and equip all students with the foundational skills needed for academic success and postsecondary readiness. By strengthening Tier 1 instruction and expanding Tier 2 and 3 interventions, New Jerusalem aims to ensure equitable access to rigorous, responsive literacy education across all grade levels.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The implementation of goals at New Jerusalem Charter School in 2025–26 reflected strong alignment with the intended actions. Most key initiatives such as Literacy Nights, Parent Engagement Events, MAP Assessment Expansion, and ELPAC-targeted supports were implemented successfully. However, some planned activities like tiered intervention room setup and expanded volunteer outreach experienced delays due to staffing constraints and vendor scheduling issues. Despite these, the school made progress in implementing targeted support for English Learners and socioeconomically disadvantaged students. SEL-focused activities and expanded learning opportunities (afterschool and summer programming) were executed with high student participation.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

While most LCAP actions stayed within projected budgets, there were minor underspends in communication tools and contracted translations due to delays in vendor onboarding. Conversely, expenditures on supplemental instructional materials, intervention staff, and ELA/ELD assessments exceeded estimates, driven by higher-than-anticipated student needs and expanded small group instruction. There were no

significant differences in the planned percentages of improved services for unduplicated pupils, and the estimated actual percentage remained aligned with projections.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Effective actions included:

Action 2.1: Targeted Reading Intervention Program

Targeted reading interventions contributed to improved literacy outcomes for participating students. According to Year 2 outcomes, 32% of students participating in the Targeted Reading Intervention Program demonstrated growth, exceeding the Year 3 target of 20% and indicating that intervention supports are helping students make progress in reading.

Action 2.2: Core Literacy Instruction and Academic Supports

Literacy-focused instructional strategies and supplemental supports contributed to improved student achievement on both local and state assessments. MAP Reading results increased from 23% of students meeting or exceeding grade-level standards in Year 1 to 36% in Year 2. CAASPP ELA performance also improved from 18.45% to 27.22% of students meeting or exceeding standards.

Priority 4: Pupil Achievement (Pupil Outcomes) Priority 6: School Climate (Engagement)

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

New Jerusalem Charter School developed Goal 3 in direct response to concerning trends identified on the 2023 California School Dashboard, which revealed significant academic and school climate needs among specific student groups. English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, Hispanic students, and students with disabilities were consistently performing in the Red performance level in both English Language Arts and Mathematics, scoring over 90 points below standard in most cases. Additionally, only 32.1% of English Learners made progress toward English proficiency on the 2024 ELPAC, down from 42% the previous year. The school also observed high suspension rates in 2023—especially for students with disabilities (17.2%) and socioeconomically disadvantaged students (14.2%)—indicating a need for enhanced school culture supports. Though climate survey results improved from 80% to 91% satisfaction in 2024–25, the goal remains to build a positive, inclusive school culture for all students. This goal is intentionally designed as a Focus Goal to address these disparities by developing a robust, tiered system of supports. It includes a comprehensive strategy of academic interventions, social-emotional learning supports, expanded learning opportunities, and targeted professional development to address the persistent needs of historically underserved student groups. Goal 3 addresses multiple LCFF State Priorities: Priority 1 (Basic Conditions of Learning) through staffing and instructional resource allocations, Priority 2 (Implementation of State Standards) and Priority 4 (Pupil Achievement) via ELA, Math, and ELPAC interventions, Priority 5 and 6 (Engagement and School Climate) through PBIS, student recognition, and enrichment, Priority 3 (Parental Involvement) by expanding outreach and engagement through school events and supports.
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By developing this tiered system, the LEA aims to reduce achievement gaps, raise student engagement and proficiency levels, and ensure that all students—particularly English Learners, foster youth, low-income students, and students with disabilities—are supported academically, emotionally, and socially.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, New Jerusalem Charter School continued implementation of the tiered support systems outlined in Goal 3 to address the academic and school climate needs of English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, Hispanic students, and students with disabilities. Planned actions, including targeted academic interventions, expanded learning opportunities, PBIS supports, family engagement activities, and school climate initiatives, were implemented largely as intended.

The LEA experienced notable success in improving academic performance and English Learner outcomes. The 2025 California Dashboard showed New Jerusalem improved to Yellow performance levels in both English Language Arts and Mathematics, while English Learner Progress increased significantly to 67.9%, resulting in a Blue performance level. Suspension rates also declined compared to prior years.

No substantive differences occurred between planned actions and actual implementation. However, the LEA experienced challenges related to chronic absenteeism, which increased to 20.8% and remained in the Red performance level on the 2025 Dashboard. The LEA also identified ongoing needs related to consistent student participation in intervention programs, staffing capacity for targeted supports, and strengthening progress-monitoring systems for academic and behavioral interventions. Despite these challenges, the LEA maintained implementation of planned services and continued refining supports to address the needs of targeted student groups.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between the planned and actual percentages of improved services, and LEA-wide implementation ensured students-maintained access to planned academic and school climate supports.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions associated with Goal 3 were generally effective in making progress toward addressing the academic and school climate needs identified through the 2025 California School Dashboard. Through implementation of targeted academic interventions, English Language Development supports, expanded learning opportunities, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), attendance initiatives, and student engagement activities, the LEA established a tiered system of support designed to address the needs of English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, Hispanic students, and students with disabilities.

Action 3.1, Academic Supportive Actions, contributed to improved academic outcomes for several student groups. English Learner progress toward English proficiency increased from 42% at baseline to 67.9% on the 2025 Dashboard, exceeding the Year 3 target of 60%. This improvement occurred because students received additional language development instruction, targeted interventions, supplemental academic support, and increased opportunities to practice academic language across content areas. Academic performance also improved in Mathematics, with English Learners improving by 38.1 points, Hispanic students improving by 17.2 points, and socioeconomically disadvantaged students improving by 20.3 points from baseline. English Learner performance in ELA improved by 21 points from baseline, indicating progress toward reducing achievement gaps for targeted student groups. Although student groups remained in the Red performance level, the positive movement in distance-from-standard data demonstrates that academic interventions are contributing to improved student achievement.

Action 3.2, School Culture and Climate Actions, was effective in improving student behavior and maintaining a positive learning environment. Suspension rates decreased substantially across all monitored student groups when compared to baseline data. Overall suspension rates declined from 11.5% to 4.6%, while suspension rates for socioeconomically disadvantaged students decreased from 14.2% to 5.6%, and English Learner suspension rates decreased from 8.5% to 4.4%. Students with disabilities also demonstrated significant improvement, decreasing from 17.2% to 5.4%. These outcomes suggest that PBIS implementation, student recognition activities, behavioral supports, and engagement opportunities increased student connectedness and reinforced positive behavior expectations. School climate survey results also improved from 80% to 91%, indicating that students reported a more positive perception of the school environment.

Action 3.3, Expanded Learning Opportunities, provided additional academic support, enrichment activities, and structured learning opportunities outside of the regular school day. The partnership with the Boys and Girls Club will increase access to academic assistance, homework support, and enrichment experiences for students who required additional instructional time. While the impact of this action cannot be isolated from other academic interventions, the improvement in English Learner progress and academic achievement data suggests that expanded learning opportunities contributed to increased student engagement and access to learning supports beyond the regular instructional day.

Overall, the actions under Goal 3 were effective because they addressed identified academic, behavioral, and engagement needs through a coordinated system of supports. Evidence of effectiveness is reflected in improved English Learner progress toward proficiency, reductions in suspension rates across targeted student groups, improved school climate outcomes, and positive movement in ELA and Mathematics achievement data. While achievement gaps remain and student groups continue to perform in the Red performance level on Dashboard indicators, the data demonstrate meaningful progress toward the goal and support the continuation of these actions.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on reflections from prior practice and review of Year 2 outcomes, the LEA determined that no substantive revisions were necessary to Goal 3, its metrics, target outcomes, or planned actions for the 2026–27 school year. Current actions will continue to be implemented to sustain academic growth, improve English Learner outcomes, strengthen school climate, and address chronic absenteeism among identified student groups.
