

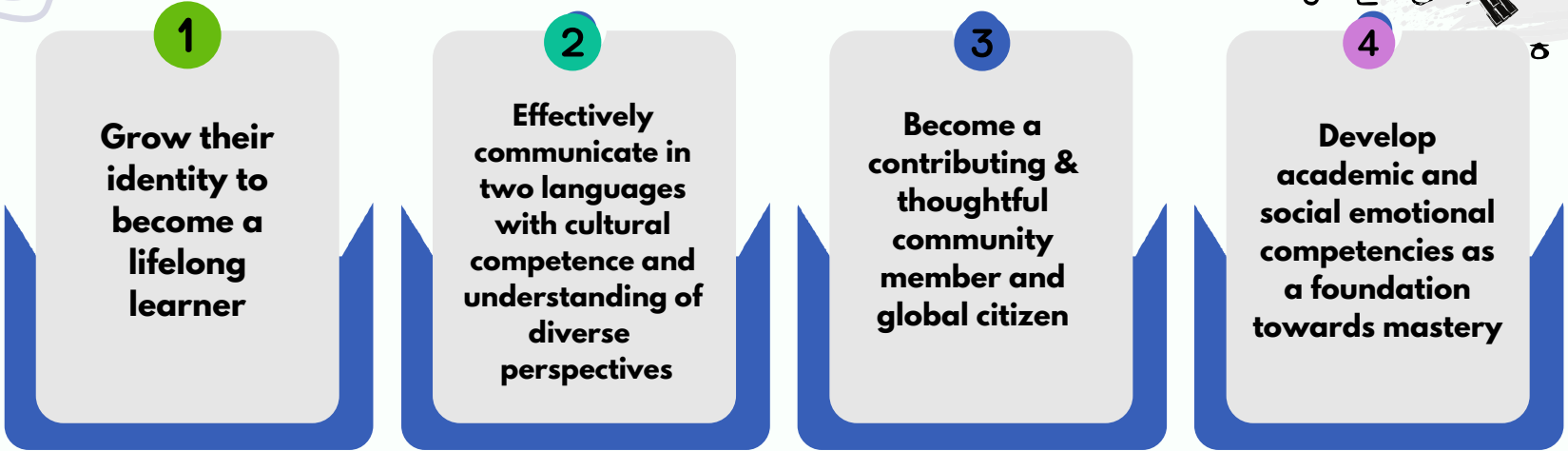

Strong Foundations for Biliteracy

Students begin to cultivate foundational skills to build their identity as a Dual Language Learner. Students utilize foundational literacy and SEL skills to read, write, listen, and communicate about familiar topics and literature in English and Korean using social and academic language.

*The goal of our 50/50 model is for students decode and encode in English and Korean by the end of 2nd grade.

Build & Expand Ideas

Students expand and apply their vocabulary, background knowledge, and communication with others to explore family history, school, local and global community.

Students apply their communication and literacy skills to understand perspectives on local and global issues as well as to learn about the past, present, and future.

*Students will start a comprehensive portfolio to document their journey in KDLA.

Project Impact

Students strengthen their sense of identity, content knowledge, and communication skills to be an active and thoughtful community member. Students dive deeper with community and global perspectives and engage in a community research project to continue building their KDLA Portfolio.

Passion Project

Students utilize language and SEL skills to expand creativity, inquiry skills, perseverance, and problem solving. Students will participate in project-based learning to explore further topics of interests and issues important to the community. Students will complete the comprehensive KDLA portfolio to show growth in language and mastery.

Elementary 50:50 Model

From Kindergarten to 6th grade, the Korean language is taught in units of study including explicit phonics instruction, Korean literature, and Mathematical Practices. Korean Units are also aligned to the National Korean Standards (2020), CCSS, and grade-level science and social studies frameworks.
