# Introduction to Construction Safety 2026-2027 (NCCER-Aligned)

### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course prepares students to complete OSHA 10-Hour Construction Outreach training by developing entry-level construction safety knowledge and skills. It provides students with a general overview of common construction job-site hazards and related safety guidelines. Students will learn to ensure their own safety and that of others by following safe work practices and procedures, inspecting equipment before use, and using safety equipment properly. This course is appropriate for entry-level construction, maintenance, and pipeline personnel.
