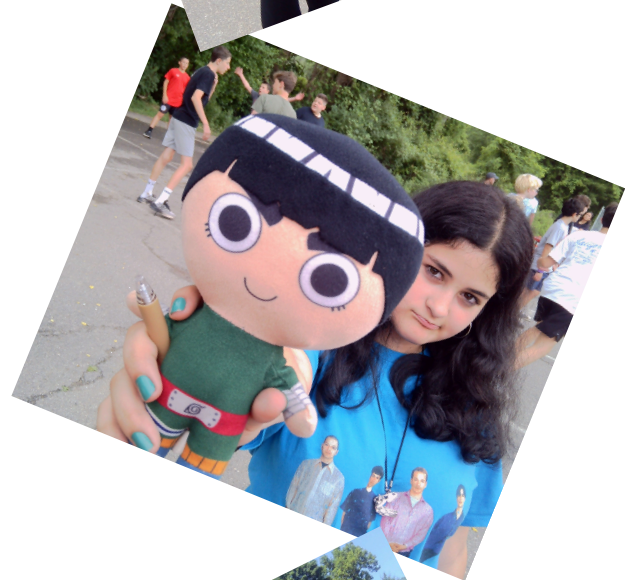

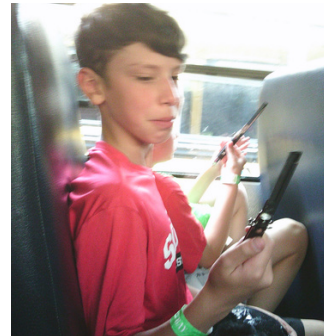
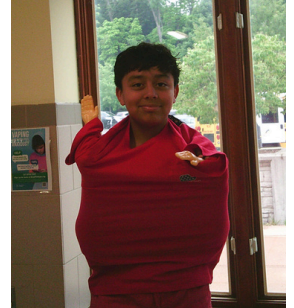

Hello and welcome back to The Great Outdoorsman. This is our final issue so let's make it a good one! Today we will be covering the Quassy trip.

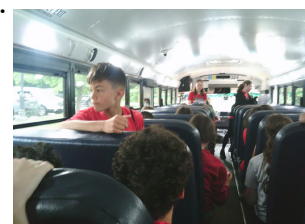

Even though scientist haven't fully figured out why déjà vu happens, it is very intriguing on how the brain works.

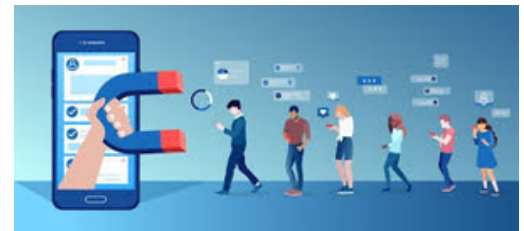
Social Media's Influence Show No Sign of Fading

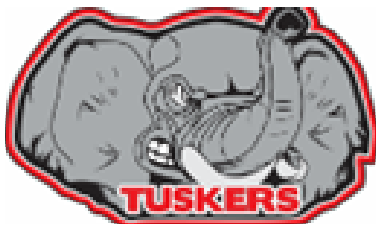
