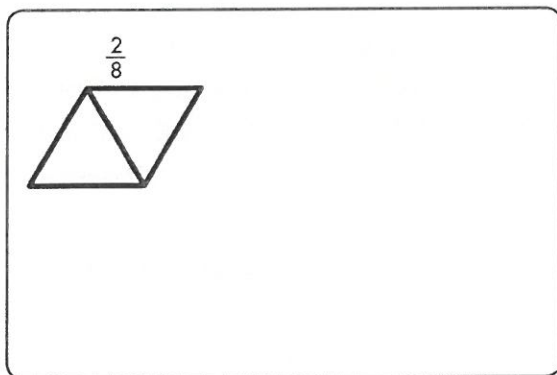

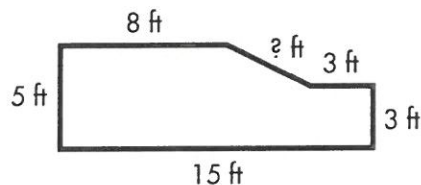

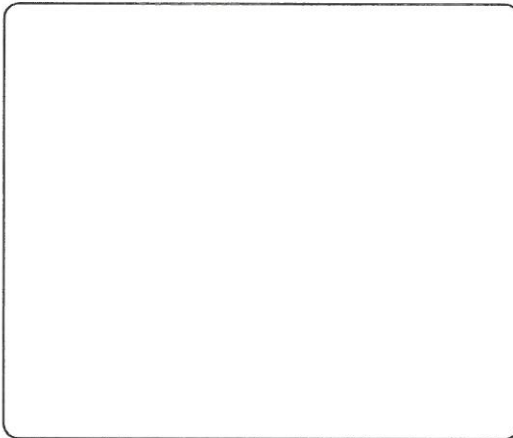

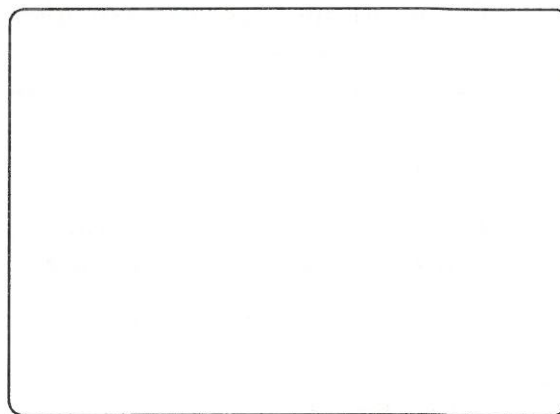

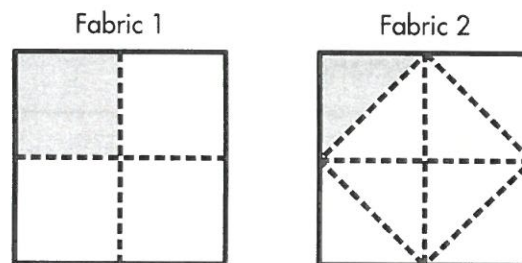

The Declaration of Independence is presented to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, July 1776.

July 4th is an important day in American history. It is the day we celebrate our independence from England. Before July 4, 1776, America was one of England's colonies. This meant that American colonists had to follow rules that were written by people living in England. American colonists had to do what the King of England wanted us to do, even if it wasn't fair or right. If the King of England wanted to charge an extra fee for tea, the American colonists had to pay the extra fee. When we passed the Declaration of Independence, we told England that we wanted to be our own country. On July 4th we hold celebrations to remember the day we first became a nation.

One year after the Declaration of Independence, America celebrated its first birthday. Even though America was still fighting a war against England for independence, people celebrated July 4th by throwing a birthday party. There were bands playing music, people marching in parades, and people making speeches about the importance of independence. There were even fireworks at the first July 4th celebration. The celebration was filled with lots of red, white and blue things; the colors of the American flag. Everyone was able to enjoy the celebrations because stores and businesses were closed. Sounds like the way we celebrate July 4th today!

Students are encouraged to mark their names on the tags of polos, cardigans, and physical education uniforms (t-shirts, sweatshirts, sweatpants, and mesh shorts).

- Sneakers (any color) can be worn on GYM DAYS ONLY.**
- Students in **Grades 2-8** may wear their gym uniforms to school on physical education days only. **Students must be in full uniforms on the days they do not have gym.**

Dress Code for Terence C. Reilly School #7

The purpose of a dress code is to establish limits on any extremes in students' appearance, promote a positive image, and to sustain a safe and friendly school environment that accepts all students.

- Clothing that is cut off, tattered, torn or has holes must be repaired before it is worn to school.
- Pants and skorts should be worn around the waist and not lowered, rolled down or under the waistline.
- Only school approved cardigans with the G/T logo should be worn during school hours and for other announced occasions. **No Fleece are required-those can be worn outdoors only.**
- Shoes must be black leather, or man-made leather dress shoes that can be tied, buckled, velcroed or slipped-on. Shoes **CAN NOT** resemble sneakers. If medically required for another foot apparel, a **signed note** from the student's doctor **MUST** state the **time period** with an **ending date**.
- For special Celebratory Events or Recognition Days, students are **ONLY** allowed to wear accessories or special clothing pertaining to that day **OVER** their TCR uniform, and it is not to be substituted for the TCR uniform.
- NO** tight-fitting clothing. **NO** gap between top and pants, skort or skirts. Even an incidental gap from bending, stretching or sitting is unacceptable.
- NO** Boots, TOMS®, Vans®, corduroys, cargo pants, or Jeggings which are not part of the school uniform.
- NO** hats or outerwear such as winter coats or heavy jackets may be worn or carried during the school day except for entering and leaving the school.
- NO** bandanas, sweatbands, or inappropriate head attire.
- NO** sunglasses, unless medically approved by a physician.

Student Rights

Often times people choose to participate in civil disobedience—breaking the law and accepting the consequences in order to stand up for their freedom or the freedom of others in their own country. This is never an easy decision. Anita struggles with this. Read the following passage where she discusses this, then answer the questions that follow.

“I admit I feel mean participating in this scheme—but I also understand that our lives are in danger. A tip from Lorena could wipe us out. It’s so unfair to have to live in a country where you have to do stuff you feel bad about in order to save your life. It’s like Papi and Tio Toni planning to assassinate Mr. Smith when they know that murder is wrong. But what if your leader is evil and rapes young girls and kills loads of innocent people and makes your country a place where not even butterflies are safe? I feel sick to my stomach all over again just thinking about all this.” (pg. 75).

What do you think? Do you think what Anita's family did was right? Would you do the same? How would you feel?
