STOCKBRIDGE VALLEY SENIORS EARN TC3 DEGREES WITH HIGHEST HONORS



On May 19, four Stockbridge Valley seniors reached an extraordinary milestone: they graduated from college before graduating from high school. Elizabeth Shaver, Rebekah Cullen, Nathanyel Lumbrazo, and Abigail Jantzi each earned an associate degree from Tompkins Cortland Community College (TC3) — and all four graduated with highest honors.

Through SVCS's partnership with TC3's CollegeNow dual enrollment program, students complete college level coursework during the school day, taught by SVCS faculty certified through TC3's selective approval process. This rigorous pathway allows motivated students to finish high school having already completed a SUNY recognized degree.

At TC3's Commencement Ceremony, President Dr. Amy Kremenek highlighted the achievements of 173 CollegeNow graduates from 17 school districts, noting the dedication required to balance college academics with the full life of a high school student.

Earning a TC3 degree gives students a strong head start: SUNY credits transfer widely, reducing both the time and cost of future college study. It also marks a lifelong accomplishment — these students are now officially college graduates.

SVCS celebrates the hard work and determination of these four outstanding seniors and wishes them continued success.

SCIENCE CLUB EXPERIENCES MEMORABLE TRIP TO BOSTON

Science Club was able to travel to the Boston area on Friday, June 5, and Saturday June 6. After an early departure from school, the students boarded the *7 Seas Whale Watch* in Gloucester, MA. The club members were able to watch multiple groupings of humpback whales, a pod of jumping Atlantic white-sided dolphins, lion's mane jellyfish, and seals. There were many whale mothers with their young swimming and playing close to the surface of the water that allowed the cruise vessel to get very close. Due to the extreme activity, the captain informed the group that they were on one of the longest whale watching tours the company has ever hosted. After the whale watch, students were treated to a pizza party at their hotel where the group swam and played games together.



On Saturday, the club traveled like true Bostonians by entering the city from the outskirts via commuter rail. Once inside the city, the group walked to the Museum of Science, Boston, Quincy Market, Faneuil Hall Marketplace, and the New England Aquarium. At the Museum of Science, students could interact with exhibits covering many subjects ranging from robotics, dinosaurs, animal specimens, the art of illusions, gemstone and rock samples, engineering, AI, transportation, and arctic biomes. Several students were able to witness "Lightning!" a live theater show that showed off the power of lightning with the world's largest air-insulated Van de Graaff generator that was built by Dr. Robert J. Van de Graaf in the 1930s.

A trip to Quincy Market and Faneuil Hall Marketplace allowed the club to experience delicious food and shopping before traveling onward to the New England Aquarium. There was a 7th hatching day party for one of the many African penguins, feeding of the green sea turtles and loggerhead sea turtles, and a demonstration of skills performed by the California sea lions. Students were also able to learn about sharks and rays while feeling their skin at the touch tank.

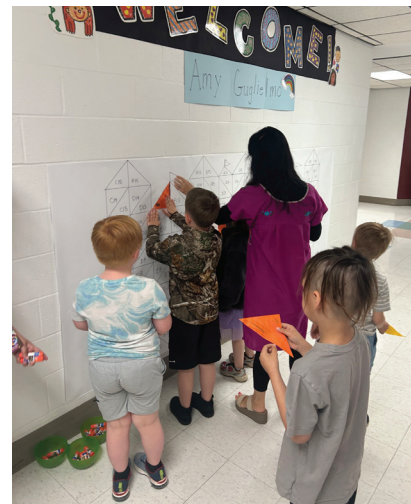

REMINDER TO ALL PARENTS/GUARDIANS REGARDING THE UPCOMING 2026-2027 SCHOOL YEAR

If your child will be taking medicine at school, provider and parent permission forms are needed for both prescription and over the counter medications. **New medication permission forms are required each school year.**

NEW YORK STATE LAW REQUIRES THAT:

- **Parents or guardians must personally deliver all medication to the school health office** (unless a self-carry order form is signed by parent and physician). All Controlled Medications must be brought in by an adult.
- All medication must remain in properly labeled pharmacy or original over the counter (OTC) containers.
- A new prescription/medication form signed by the medical provider is required at the beginning of every school year.
- The parent must sign the medication permission form.

Appropriate certification of immunizations is required for students to attend school in the fall.

We request that you ask your pharmacist to give you a **second identically labeled container** for any prescription medications your student will take at school. We also request that you bring **small containers of any OTC medications** that your student will take. This will allow the School Nurse to send these medications on field trips and comply with New York State laws pertaining to medication storage.

Medication forms may be obtained from the School Health Office, or your physician may use their own form if desired.

New York State law also requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11 grade.

Students entering these grades must have a valid physical dated on or after September 5, 2026. Health certificates are required to be submitted within 30 days from the start of the new school year.

In regards to vaccinations, New York State Law requires the following for school entrance in the fall:

KINDERGARTEN:


- 5- doses of Dtap (unless the 4th dose was on or after their 4th birthday), 4- doses of Polio (unless the 3rd dose was on or after their 4th birthday), 3- doses of Hepatitis B, 2- doses of MMR, and 2- doses of Varicella.
