A new ruling prevents Open School students from competing on other school's sports teams.

Because Open School doesn't have sports teams of its own, the students intent on playing sports have, in the past, played for the school that is in their registry area and attended Open School for their classes.

But the new ruling of the Minnesota High School League stops athletes like Matt Haug from playing. He wished to play hockey at Como, and that was only possible through the intervention of a lawyer. Unfortunately, a recent development

requires he take at least three classes at Como and he has decided against it.

Teol Knight, who runs track and cross country, was lucky enough to be spared the red tape because she transferred from Central and is enrolled at both schools. Thus, she was "grandfather clausued."

Because students that play at other schools aren't always registered for that school, their opportunities are limited.

At a recent advisory council meeting, the topic was brought up of a possible joint sports team. Theoretically, we would be able to participate on the

Open-Central team. However, this may not be effective until next year.

Ruth is currently opposing this decision, and is willing to go as far as the State High School League to repeal the ban. She believes that this ban will make Open School "lose good students. I don't want that to happen."

Many students share her opinion, however, some take a more apathetic view. One of these students is Thomas Greenly, a tenth grader. When asked his opinion, Greenly said "It doesn't affect me . . . It'd probably make some people upset, but it won't bug me. The only thing I do is O.M., and it's here."

the eight new Macintosh computers for the computer lab, and internet access.

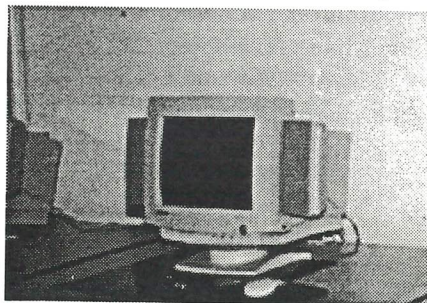

The Election

Last October, the politics class held their mock presidential debate, and the results are in. Clinton, the expected winner, took 167 of the votes. Odyssey of the Mind

Think there's nothing exciting after school? Well there is, it's called Odyssey of the Mind, or as it is commonly referred to, OM. There are ten to eleven teams at Open School this year which will compete against other schools at the Regional competition on March 8, 1997 at Harding HS.

"It's one of the best things we do around here," said Julie Doble, who has coached OM for eight or nine years now.

"It's creative problem solving that involves a group of students, I'm looking forward to the tournament," said Greg Adams who is also one the coaches. The teams hold anywhere between six to ten team members. This year, Adams said, there might be around 78 students at Open School competing in OM.

As of this November, students interested in OM are starting to

talk to the coaches and form teams and meet after school. Other teams will start forming soon after Winter Break. Some of the problems they have to solve in order to earn points consist of building anything from little cars to building robots.

Other competitions include acting out a play while other team members are solving the problem given. Every time a problem is given, the judges will give a specific period of time to work the problem out. There are six different problems each year. They generally have something to do with cars, classics, folk tales and something that involves building some type of machine.

What each member of a team does is find the best way to solve the problem. Before students get on an OM team, they are given a questionnaire. The questions

might be something like "name three things that are blue or green." The student will have to be creative, but they will not be marked right or wrong. The questions test students' problem solving skills.

"It's fun to work in a group and be creative." OM student Dorothy Henke-Haney said. The Long Term Prob-

lems for this year are: Balloonacy Cars, Omerdroid, Classics Can You Dig It, Double Trouble, Heroic Proportion, and The Good News. There are three Divisions for each category.

"It basically helps me to solve problems in many areas," David LaCombe said. A lot of teachers think OM is a wonderful way to work with other students and work on creativity. You don't have to be smart to get in, according to Adams, you just have to be confident that you can contribute to solving the problem.

The coaches for this year are Susanne Hollingsworth, Chris Wintheiser, Rick Olson, Julie Doble, Jenny Eisele, Fawn Tran and Greg Adams.

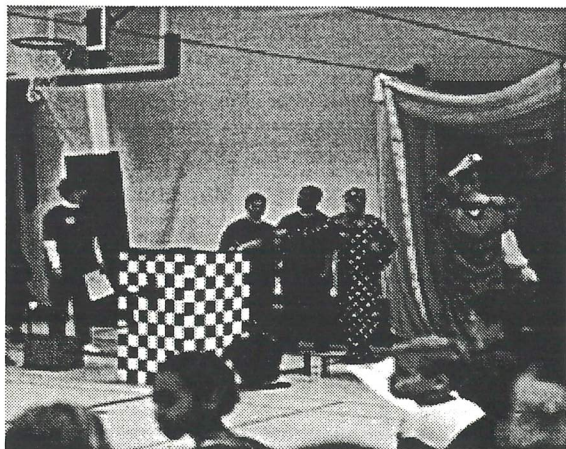

The 1996 World Series

In a season plagued with scandals, early retirements, and stalled labor talks, there have been miraculous comebacks: Darryl Strawberry rebounding from the St. Paul Saints to the Yankees, Dwight "Doc" Gooden pitching a no-hitter in New York after being out of baseball a year earlier, and of course the New York Yankees snagging a World Championship for the first time since 1978.

The path was long and winding for the ailing Yanks, who started out the season below .500. Their team got worse when it was announced that pitcher David Cone would probably not play again in the 1996 season. However, they turned things around and by August they caught up to the first-place Baltimore Orioles in the AL East standings.

This comeback didn't come easily though; they signed free agents Gooden and outfielder Ruben Sierra, bought out the

contract of Strawberry from the Saints, and made two key trades: one that brought Cecil Fielder from the Tigers and a highly controversial one that gave New York two injured players, Graeme Lloyd and Pat Listach. With the extra padding that Fielder's and Strawberry's home runs provided and the 16 wins that Gooden supplied, the Yanks were able to overtake the O's by late August.

At the end of August, it was apparent to everyone that the Yanks would win the division, but no one thought they would go any further. Then, David Cone rebounded from the surgery that was supposed to keep him sidelined until 1997 and pitched a two-hitter in his first start. After Cone's comeback, the Yankees were unstoppable. They won the AL East, forcing Baltimore to settle for a wild-card spot. They went on to defeat Texas in five games and were charted to play the O's in the ALCS. They defeated

Baltimore in five and faced their toughest challenge, the Atlanta Braves, in the World Series.

Fox Sports' baseball analyst Steve Lyons stated before Game 1 that this year's Series was a mismatch. Most people believed that too, especially after Atlanta took a 2-0 lead in the Series. But thanks once again to David Cone, New York was given new life with a victory in Game 3. When the Series came back to Yankee Stadium, where the Braves held the lead three days before, the Yanks were leading three games to two. The sixth game was no cakewalk for either team, as the score was tied 2-2 going into the sixth inning. Then the Yankees exploded for three runs and took the lead 5-2. Right-hander John Wetteland, the Series MVP, turned in another superb relief appearance and Graeme Lloyd closed the game up to bring the World Series trophy home.
