End Of Another School Year

As we wrap up the 2025-2026 school year I would like to take this opportunity to share some reflection on where we are as a school district. There are so many things that go into a successful school district, and oftentimes things go uncelebrated or unexplained.

To start I would like to highlight our Portrait of a Warrior. This is a project that started late last school year and has continued through this school year and will continue to be a focus moving forward. As a district and community, the pillars of what we believe every Mohawk student needs to master before leaving our school have been identified. These are not only skills for the classroom, but also skills for life. When I speak with employers I often hear about these skills being more important than the knowledge to actually do the work as they can provide training to support those efforts. It is much more difficult to train these "soft skills". In our classrooms we are working to provide an environment that will allow students to engage in projects, collaboration, challenging tasks that they can put what they have learned into real life application and practice.



When looking at academic achievement for the district, Mohawk ranks in the top 17% of districts in the state for academic achievement. This is a testament to the value that is placed on education and the hard work done by all students, families, and staff. This is something that the district takes great pride in, and we want to be continuously improving upon this ranking. With the academic achievement the graduating class at Mohawk this year has been able to earn over \$840,000 in scholarships to further their education.

The district has also worked very hard to secure grants to help support projects and improvements in the district. To date this year the district has secured over \$85,000 in grants from various sources such as local businesses and our local PTO to support things such as camera upgrades, classroom projects and trips, the STEAM lab, guest speakers, and other safety measures. These grants truly help us continue to enhance the opportunities that we can offer to our students and support our daily operations.

As we head into the summer months we have a lot of projects that will be going on around campus. Here is a rundown of things that will be happening over the next few months:

Playground Expansion- The expansion will happen on the older student playground and has been an exciting project to plan for. A group of our 5th/6th grade Mohawk Leaders were able to help plan and select the equipment that will be installed.

These students also got to present about their work at the state level OSBA conference in Columbus this past November. This expansion will bring a more inclusive environment to this playground. On May 19th Garmann- Miller and Midstates Recreation participated in our groundbreaking for the project. Our Mohawk Leaders are helping us out through each step of the project. We will be excited to welcome everyone back in the fall when the project is complete.



STEAM Lab- Academically one of the biggest updates to the building will be our creation of a STEAM Lab for our elementary students. We are looking forward to creating a hands-on learning environment for our elementary students that will include a makerspace with 3D printers and a laser cutter, an area for horticulture, robotics, legos, along with a presentation area for guest speakers as well as virtual field trips. Construction/ renovation will start as soon as the school year concludes and should be completed in time to welcome everyone back in the fall.

Softball Field- Athletically this is a great opportunity to bring our Lady Warriors out on to campus. Construction on this project has already begun and is going very well. This project will be complete and ready to go for the 2027 season.

Other Projects- There are many other projects going on inside the building as well. We will be painting the upstairs and the main office areas this summer as well as installing new carpet in the office. The high school gym floor is getting refinished. On the outside of the main building there will be some regular maintenance on caulking as well as asphalt resealing in the parking lots.

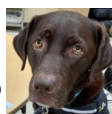

HARRY'S HAPPENINGS



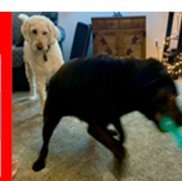
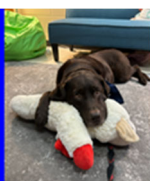

From the Health Clinic



Immunizations:

As the Nurses in the school, we want to remind you of the importance of getting your son or daughter vaccinated before they go back to school in the fall. Vaccines are the best way that you can protect your child from a number of serious diseases. Each child has a health record, which is kept on file in the school office. It is required in the state of Ohio for this record to contain an Up-to-Date Immunization Record. Please provide the nurses with a printed Up-to-Date Immunization Record.

Schedule your child's appointment today to ensure they are up-to-date on the vaccines they need. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recommend your son or daughter receive the following vaccines:

Required Immunizations for Kindergarten are:

- 5 doses of Diphtheria Tetanus and Pertussis Vaccine
- 4 doses of Polio Vaccine
- 3 Doses of Hepatitis B Vaccine
- 2 doses of Measles Mumps Rubella Vaccine
- 2 doses of Varicella Vaccine (chickenpox vaccine)

Required Immunizations for 7th Grade are:

- Meningococcal Conjugate Vaccine/MCV4
- Tdap

Required Immunizations for 12th Grade are:

- Meningococcal Conjugate Vaccine/MCV4

YOUR CHILD WILL BE EXCLUDED FROM SCHOOL IF REQUIRED IMMUNIZATIONS ARE NOT UP TO DATE.

If you choose not to vaccinate your child, you will need to complete a waiver form every year. Please let the school nurse know of this decision.

Allergies:

The United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service, as well as the Ohio Department of Education, have guidelines regarding students with food allergies. Due to this regulation, Mohawk Local Schools requires a written and signed order form from a physician stating that your student has a food allergy, what the allergy consists of and what food substitutions are required.

TITLE I-A Improving Basic Programs – Reading and Math Intervention

Title I-A provides supplemental support for reading and mathematics intervention for at-risk students at qualifying non-public and public schools. Fundable evidence-based activities may include employee salaries, professional development, instructional materials, equipment and parental involvement. Buildings must meet eligibility requirements for funding and services.

TITLE II-A Supporting Effective Instruction

Title II-A funds may be utilized for developing and implementing mechanisms to recruit, train and retain highly qualified teachers. Districts may also use these funds to reduce class size, particularly in the early grades.

TITLE III Limited English Proficiency (LEP)

The Title III grant is intended to improve or enhance LEP programs by upgrading curriculum, instruction materials, technology, and software; provide tutoring; provide professional development, and implement a community LEP outreach program to help parents so they can become active participants in the education of their children.

TITLE IV-A Student Support and Academic Enrichment

The purpose of the Title IV-A grant program is to improve students' academic achievement through strategies and activities to support a well-rounded and supportive educational program.

IDEA-B Special Education and IDEA-B Early Childhood Special Education

Allowable expenditures for IDEA-B resources include:

- Salaries and benefits for Intervention Specialists and paraprofessionals
- Instructional supplies and equipment designed to increase student achievement while increasing access to the general curriculum
- Substitute costs associated with IEP meetings
- Professional development
- Excess costs
- Specialized instructional supplies
