The selections are made by a nominating committee made up of a member of the Alumni Association Executive Committee, a representative of the Board of Trustees, the Headmaster, the Dean of Advancement, and a member of the faculty.

The Hall of Fame induction ceremony takes place annually on the Friday of Reunion Weekend.

2026 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

ELAINE PATTERSON



Born and raised in Connecticut, Elaine Patterson earned her B.A. degree in economics from Trinity College in Hartford, where she was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, served as a Dorm Resident Assistant, and spent a semester in Rome, Italy – where she started a lifelong love affair with travel in general and Italy in particular.

After Trinity, and a thankfully short-lived banking career, she returned to school, earned a Master's degree in industrial and labor relations from Cornell University and began her human resources career with Texas Instruments in Dallas, TX.

In 1980 she joined Union Oil Company of California (Unocal) as an EEO Coordinator and went on to hold positions of increasing responsibility in a variety of Human Resources functions and different company business units. During her 25-year career at Unocal, she was named General Manager of International Human Resources, becoming the first woman to lead HR for all operations outside the U.S. and later became the General Manager of People Development, where she was responsible for companywide leadership development, performance management, executive succession planning and organization development.

Following Chevron's acquisition of Unocal, Elaine remained in Los Angeles working for Breitburn Energy, an independent domestic oil and gas producer, as their Organization and Leadership Advisor, helping them transition from a privately-held to publicly traded company. She retired from both practicing HR and the oil & gas industry in 2017.

During her HR career, Elaine became a Certified Compensation Professional, had several articles published in Workspan Magazine and appeared in interviews with USA Today and The News Hour with Jim Lehrer. In service to MCI, Elaine served on the Board of Trustees for almost 10 years starting in 2010 as well as co-founding the Patterson Lecture Series. Elaine served on the Board of Trustees of Trinity College, Hartford, CT and is a past Board member of the International Personnel Association. Elaine and her husband Gregg (MCI '69) have been happily married and living in Los Angeles for more than 45 years.

DAVID MACGOWN '86



Born at Seabasticook Valley Hospital and raised in Pittsfield, David was one of 14 freshmen who opted to attend MCI as it transitioned to a four-year high school in 1982. He greatly enjoyed MCI's rich academic, social and athletic opportunities, playing three sports, serving as President of Student Council, playing in the pep band and competing in the Manson Essays. As a senior he was named as the Principal's Student of the Year by MCI Head of School Ralph Baxter, graduating in 1986 as First Honor Essayist. In service to MCI, David joined the Board of Trustees in 2011, where he was co-Chair of the Finance and Investment Committee and served three 3-year terms until 2020.

David attended Georgetown University's McDonough School of Business, where he was named to the Financial Management Association's National Honor Society and graduated cum laude in 1990. Upon graduation he embarked upon a Wall Street career as a sell-side credit analyst with Morgan Stanley in New York and Tokyo. David then joined Citigroup in 1999 as a sell-side credit analyst, where he then transitioned to Citi's Financial Institutions Group Investment Banking business, providing M&A, capital-raising and strategic advisory services to diversified financial institutions. In this role he had a front row seat for the 2008-09 global financial crisis, helping multiple financial institutions to navigate the critical funding, capital, and business model challenges that emerged during the crisis. David then worked as a FIG Investment Banker at both Citadel Securities and Credit Suisse, until he joined Barclays in 2021 as Head of Americas Specialty Finance. David has led the inception and execution of a number of high-profile

transactions during his career. These include advising Social Capital Hedosophia V on its merger with SoFi valued at \$8.65bn, advising The Charles Schwab Corporation on its \$26bn acquisition of TD Ameritrade, advising CPPIB on its \$12bn acquisition of Antares Capital from GECC, advising Cerberus on its \$7.4bn acquisition of 80.1% of Chrysler and Chrysler Financial from DaimlerChrysler, and advising Harley Davidson captive finance unit on the sale of its retail back book assets, forward flow partnership, and minority investment with KKR and PIMCO. David has four children and resides in New Fairfield, CT where he is engaged to be married to Alina de Casteja.

DR. JOHN P. DOW (1934–2009)



John Prescott Dow was born on August 13, 1934, in Guilford, Maine, the son of Leroy and Margaret Stoddard Dow. He prepared for college at Foxcroft Academy, where he distinguished himself so thoroughly that the school would later honor him with the Mary Chandler Lowell Award and a place in the Foxcroft Academy Hall of Fame. From there his path ran through some of the most demanding institutions in the country: he graduated cum laude from Bowdoin College in the Class of 1957, where he was a member of Beta Theta Pi, and went on to earn his medical degree from Harvard Medical School in 1961. He completed his internship and residency at Hartford Hospital in Connecticut before making the choice that would define his life — returning home to Maine to practice.

In 1963, Dr. Dow opened his family practice in Pittsfield, and for the next thirty-six years he never really left it. He served as chief of staff at Sebecook Valley Hospital for thirteen years and practiced until ill health forced his retirement in 1999. His care extended well beyond his own examining room. In 1963 he established the utilization review process for the Somerset and Maine Medical Association, helping to set a standard for quality in regional medicine. In 2000, alongside Dr. Thomas Pierce and Dr. John Crane, he co-founded the Hartland Free Clinic so that the people of his community could receive care regardless of means — a fitting capstone to a life spent making sure no one in central Maine went without a doctor.

For ten years, Dr. Dow served as the physician for Maine Central Institute, looking after the health of its students and standing behind its athletes and activities. He gave the same to MCI that he gave to everyone in his care: attentiveness, good humor, and an unshakable sense of responsibility. He served as the regional school district physician for fifteen years and on the SAD 53 school board, weaving the welfare of the community's young people into the fabric of his daily life. To generations of MCI students, he was simply the doctor: trusted, familiar, and kind.

Dr. Dow believed a doctor owed his town more than medicine. He served on the Pittsfield Town Council and the Pittsfield Parks and Recreation Committee, and was a past president of the Pittsfield Kiwanis Club. Within his profession he was a member of the Aesculapian Club of Boston, the Maine Medical Society and its legislative committee, the National Board of Medical Examiners, and was a life member and past Maine chapter president of the American Academy of Family Practice. His contributions were recognized with the Pittsfield Jaycees Distinguished Service Award and, in 1982, the President's Award of the Maine Medical Association. Healer, teacher, neighbor, and friend — Dr. John P. Dow embodied the spirit of service that Maine Central Institute is proud to honor.

2026 DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

JODI BREAU '77



A 1977 graduate of MCI, Jodi has fond memories of Ron Bessey's, John Slagle's and Bud Lewis' classes. She loved the challenge of reading literature such as *Wounded Knee*, Shakespeare, *Don Quixote* and the American classics. Who knew that love of literature would morph into a career. After graduating from USM, she taught 4th grade until Pittsfield decided to move 9th grade to MCI. At this time, she moved West to Utah State University where she earned a Masters in Education with a Major in Instructional Technology, and focused on Library Media Administration. Her first School Library Media Specialist position was in Kemmerer Wyoming, where coal miners, oil men and cowboys ruled. It was a far cry from Pittsfield, but after 6 years she returned to Maine where she spent the next 30 years in several high schools around the state.

During this time Jodi was honored to receive Maine's Library Media Specialist of the Year Award and the McCampbell Award for Outstanding Library Program. At the Class of '77 25th Reunion, thanks to a comment from Tammy Andrews Ingraham '77, she re-met and eventually married her classmate Jim Morra, which she says is her greatest achievement. Retiring in 2015 and most definitely bored, Jim urged her "to do something with that dental floss idea of yours."

For years Jodi had been complaining about conventional dental floss. So she took Jim's suggestion and ultimately created the first plastic free, PFAS free, refillable dental floss. Launching Dental Lace Refillable Floss in 2017 from a guest room in their home, the business took off. Eventually she relocated the business to Pittsfield and hired Lewis Fitts '08 and George Webber '11 to run operations. Within 2 years Dental Lace was sold around the world.

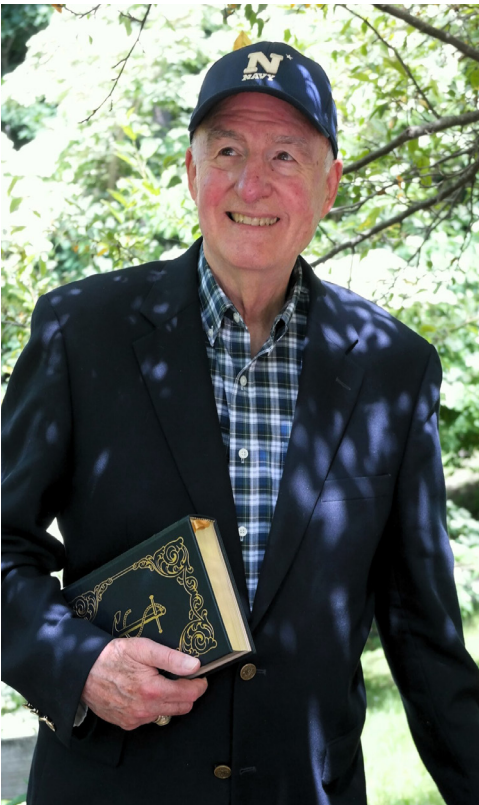

2025 Hall of Fame Inductee Gregg Newhouse '81

GREG NEWHOUSE '81 is a dedicated and deeply valued member of the Maine Central Institute (MCI) community. A natural leader, Gregg graduated from MCI in 1981 as the recipient of the prestigious Master's Cup. He followed in the footsteps of his father, George Newhouse '54, who served with distinction on the MCI Board of Trustees, including four years as Board President. Continuing the family legacy, Gregg himself served on the Board of Trustees for nearly 20 years. During his tenure, he played an instrumental role in numerous decisions and improvements that have shaped MCI into the school it is today. Professionally, Gregg earned a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from the University of Maine. He went on to become a licensed Professional Engineer, advancing from project engineer to Senior Project Manager before founding The Newhouse Group alongside his wife, Laurie. Their Virginia-based consulting firm specialized in commercial, residential, and industrial land development, environmental engineering, construction surveying, and construction management. Currently, Gregg serves as the Senior Vice President and Construction Services Practice Lead at ATCS, a multidisciplinary firm providing innovative solutions in transportation, construction and program management, traffic engineering, and environmental planning. In this role, Gregg leads ATCS' construction-related projects, guiding teams and clients through successful project delivery with technical expertise and strategic oversight. Outside of his professional accomplishments, Gregg has built a rich and fulfilling life with Laurie, his wife of 29 years. Together, they are the proud parents of two children, Sophie and Samuel. The Newhouses share a love for travel - especially throughout Europe - and Gregg is an avid golfer and sports fan. He loyally supports the Patriots, Bruins, Celtics, and Red Sox, and he and Laurie are working toward their goal of visiting every Major League Baseball stadium. Those who know Gregg describe him as passionate, hardworking, and always willing to go the extra mile. 2025 Hall of Fame Inductee Winn Price

Born into a Navy family in the Territory of Hawaii, **WINN PRICE** has maintained strong ties to the service throughout his life. He grew up in 15 states, including Maine, before following his father, Walt (USNA '42), to the U.S. Naval Academy. His naval career took him across Northern Europe and around South America, serving on multiple ships and as Aide to the President of the Naval War College. After further service, Winn joined the Naval Reserve and earned his MBA from Harvard Business School, where he then worked in Career Development and Admissions. His path soon connected him with Maine, when he was recruited to open Bath Iron Works' first Washington, D.C. office. He later moved to Bath, spending 14 years at the shipyard in program management and business development, notably as Deputy Program Manager for the Aegis Cruisers. Retiring from BIW as the VP of Business Development, Winn began to transition to education. He served on a Naval Academy Board of Visitors team reviewing the institution and then spent four years at a successful Maine business startup, where a colleague inspired his focus on education. In 2001, Winn joined MCI as Dean of Students, learning the ropes with the help of Rosalie Williams (then Associate Head of School), Head of School Doug Cummings, and his future fiancée, Leigh Hallett. He later served as Co-Interim Head of School with Jim Hornor, an opportunity to learn still more about school administration. For years he also taught "Economic Literacy" and "Ethics/ Leadership," finding a true passion for engaging with students in the classroom. Winn left Maine mid-2008 to lead the Miller School of Albemarle in Virginia during a transitional period there. Upon completing his work in VA, he was glad to come home to Maine, intending to focus on writing and travel. He penned the first volume in a planned historical fiction series (with robust editorial support from Rosalie Williams) and several walking tours across the UK and Ireland. In 2021, MCI Board Chair Norb Young called Winn back to active duty as Interim Head of School during the search for a new head. That process concluded successfully with the selection of David Pearson. Winn loved returning to the school but welcomed David with enthusiasm. Since his latest retirement, Winn continues to enjoy time with MCI colleagues and former students, volunteers with local organizations, follows Navy sports avidly, and pursues his research and writing.

Andrea Cianchette Maker '75*

ANDREA CIANCHETTE MAKER '75 has enjoyed a long and successful career in the world of Maine public policy and other related fields. The daughter of Chuck and Helen Cianchette, Andrea watched her father's construction company grow throughout her childhood and anxiously awaited the opportunity to make her own mark on the world. She received her Bachelor's in Business and Economics from UNH in 1979, interning under Bill Cohen. She then attended the University of Maine School of Law, where she earned her Juris Doctorate and became a lobbyist representing clients in the Maine legislature on a number of issues. She became the Regional Director of Public Affairs at Champion International Corporation Paper until 2000, where she continued to provide substantial government relations and public policy related services as owner of The Maker Group in North Yarmouth. In 2006, Andrea became the Vice President of Corporate Affairs at Martin's Point Health Care, where she developed a community relations programs, led the organization's rebranding initiative, and positioned the organization as a fast-growing, intelligent and progressive health care services organization. After a couple years serving as the Project Manager for the launch of Project Login, now known as Educate Maine, Andrea became a Partner and Chair of the Government Relations Practice Group at Pierce Atwood LLP, where she served for over 10 years. At Pierce Atwood, Andrea advanced agendas and created solutions in Maine public policy or government relations arenas including lobbying, networking, state procurement, and state agency relations. In 2014, Andrea became the Co-Founder and Co-Chair of FocusMaine, a private sector led initiative catalyzing growth in Maine food and biotechnology sectors as well as developing related workforce talent. Since November of 2023, Andrea has been operating as the President of FocusMaine as she works to accelerate the creation of quality jobs and increasing revenue in these two globally competitive and high-growth sectors. In her free time, Andrea enjoys bicycling, hiking, painting, and rowing, the latter of which won her a silver medal in the Head of the Charles Regatta in 1976 and a gold medal in the National Women's Rowing Association national competition in 1978. For these efforts and more, she was inducted in the MCI Athletic Hall of Fame in 2018.

MIKE BOLSTER '75 graduated from Maine Central Institute in 1975, and not long after did he become the founder of what would become one of the most recognizable and reliable services in the region. When you see that bright red, you know it's Bolster's. In 1975, with just a pickup truck and a relentless work ethic, Mike Bolster launched Bolster's Rubbish and Recycling. From long weeks on the road to unwavering dedication to his family and community, Mike laid the foundation for what MCI campus at the beginning of their daily 3 mile walk around the town would become a cornerstone business in Burnham, Maine. What began as a couple pickup trucks collecting rubbish and sawdust grew into one of the region's most trusted names in waste management. As a local, family-owned and operated business, Bolster's Rubbish has always put customers first. Their reliable and efficient trash removal services are customized to the unique needs of homeowners, business owners, contractors, and municipalities alike. It's hard to believe that the business started with just a pickup truck, to their first packer truck in 1976, their first large rolloff truck added in 1995, and everything in between. In 2017, Bolster's moved into a new, modern facility to support growing demand. In 2018, Mike was honored with the Spirit of America Award, presented by the Burnham Select Board in recognition of Mike's outstanding contributions to the town and for building a business rooted in service, integrity, and local pride. The Bolster name is very much an MCI family, as Mike's wife Sheniah Huff Bolster '83, daughter Sarah Bolster Ross '99, and son Matthew Bolster '08 all attended and graduated from Maine Central Institute. Now led by Matt Bolster, who is also Co-Chair of the Planning Board for the Town of Burnham, the company continues to deliver the same great service the community has trusted for over 50 years. Mike Bolster's vision, grit, and community spirit transformed a single pickup into a trusted, full-service operation. Today, Bolster's Rubbish and Recycling is not just a business—it's a symbol of what dedication, family values, and hometown pride can achieve. Thank you, Mike, for not only celebrating 50 years since MCI, but also 50 years of service, leadership, and legacy.

2024 Hall of Fame Inductee Dean Neal

Growing up in St. Albans, **DEAN NEAL** developed a love for music under the direction of music educators Jack Clifford, Bruce Brown and Stan Buchanan in MSAD 48/RSU 19. That love of making music was further developed through studies with Chuck Winfield, Tom Hoffman, Dave Demsey, and Don Stratton at the University of Maine and the University of Maine at Augusta. In 2020, Dean returned to RSU 19 as the Director of Instrumental and Vocal Music at Nokomis Regional High School and Music Coordinator for RSU 19 in Newport, Maine, where he manages the Performing Arts facility and now teaches Concert Choir, Vocal Jazz Ensembles, Jazz Combo, Digital Music Production, and co-teaches Stagecraft with his wife Lisa. He previously served as Director of Music at Maine Central Institute from 1990-2020. Together with the amazing music educators in MSAD 53 and MCI, Dean helped to grow the music program through the 90's and 2000's from serving 40-50 students each year to 140-150+ students. The music program in 1990 offered Band, Chorus, and Music Appreciation that eventually grew to provide Band, Chorus, Jazz Band, 2 Jazz Combos, 3 Vocal Jazz Ensembles, Piano, Guitar, Digital Music, Music History, and Music Theory and Songwriting. MCI's instrumental and vocal jazz ensembles became recognized and respected across the state and New England through outstanding performances at State jazz festivals and the Berklee College of Music Jazz Festival, reaching a high point in 2018 when the Vocal Jazz Ensemble Caravan won first place in the college festival. Dean has served as a guest conductor for numerous regional and state honors bands and jazz choirs, notably the New Hampshire All State Jazz Choir twice and Maine All State Jazz Choir. Dean has held MMEA and KVMEA Executive Board leadership positions and in 2018 he was featured in School Band and Orchestra magazine as one of "50 Directors Who Make A Difference." In the mid 2000's, Dean took his first steps in the musical theater arena and has since appeared in many lead roles at the Waterville Opera House and Lakewood Theater. He and his wife Lisa reside in Palmyra, Maine and are looking forward to building a cabin on Whites Pond in Palmyra this summer and just celebrated the arrival of their first grandchild in May!



2024 Hall of Fame Inductee Sue Haseltine '67

SUE HASELTINE '67 is one of our proudest MCI alums. The daughter of MCI faculty members, Sue grew up learning from the best in Frank Haseltine '40, who taught biology at MCI for many years, and Leona Haseltine, who was MCI's librarian. Both Frank and Leona were inducted into the MCI Hall of Fame for their service to the School in 1987 and 1993 respectively, making Sue a second-generation recipient of this prestigious honor. While at MCI, Sue was an active student, participating in Rifle club, Debate club, National Honor Society, Girls' State, and more. After graduating valedictorian of her class in 1967, Sue studied at the University of Maine, where she received her Bachelor of Science in Wildlife Science. She went on to receive a Masters and PhD in Zoology from Ohio State University and then joined the US Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) as a researcher stationed at the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center (PWRC) in Laurel, MD. Sue's research on the effects of organochlorine pesticides and metals in relation to bird populations and habitats eventually led her to become the Director of Northern Prairie Wildlife Research Center in Jamestown, ND and then to become Assistant Regional Director for Refuges and Wildlife for FWS in Minneapolis, MN. After a stint supervising land and wildlife management programs in an 8 state region, she returned to research administration, leading programs at the regional and national levels for the National Biological Service and the US Geological Survey (USGS). As Chief Scientist for Biology and then Associate Director for Biology in the USGS, she was responsible for leading and supporting long term research programs carried out at 18 research centers and 40 Cooperative Research Units located at universities across the country. She was responsible for building long term science capacity and collaborative approaches with conservation and resource management agencies to address priorities in fishery and wildlife science, ecological change and policy issues of concern to US Department of Interior, OMB and Congress. Sue served on the MCI Board of Trustees from 2013-2022. Her brother, Frank Haseltine '64, currently serves as a Trustee. Sue is a member of the Heritage Society and has been a longtime supporter of MCI, just as her parents were. Sue currently resides in Haymarket, Virginia, and we at MCI are beyond grateful for her dedication and support to our school throughout the years. a number of parents, and graciously looks forward to all that MCI will do to further the tradition of education in Pittsfield, Maine.

2024 DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



After graduating from MCI in 1984, **MICHAEL LYNCH** pursued a BS in Business with concentrations in Marketing and Management at the University of Maine and completed his MBA in Investment and Finance in May of 1989. In 1990 he became licensed in the Securities and Insurance business and began his career working in Southern Maine and New Hampshire. In 1992, Mike moved his practice back to Pittsfield where he continues to practice today, servicing clients in well over a dozen states across the country. His practice is primarily focused on management of assets for retired people, business planning, charity fund management and 401k management all through his business Northeast Planning Associates, Inc. Mike likes to tell people, "I work with people all over the country, but choose to live in Pittsfield, America."

In 1993, Mike joined the board of Sebecook Valley Hospital and became their Treasurer for the next 10 years. During that time, he was appointed to a committee to undertake the building of a healthcare system in Eastern Maine. After 3 years, Eastern Maine Healthcare System was born, which soon became known as Northern Light Healthcare. Mike served on the EMHS Board for 12 years, chairing the Executive Compensation Committee and the Investment Com-

mittee as well as serving on other committees. Eastern Maine Homecare was established by joining 4 state wide homecare agencies, where Mike served as Treasurer on the Board and was active on the Board for 15 years. After 32 years and over 19,000 hours of volunteer time, Mike has retired from most of his Board positions now and only serves on the Investment Committee.

In 1986 on a Christmas Break, Mike assisted Bud Jones and the Masonic Lodge with a Community Christmas Project for the kids of MSAD 53. In 1992 he joined the Meridian Lodge of Masons in Pittsfield, and for the last 15 years he has been Chairing that same Christmas Project which consumes most evenings from September through Christmas Eve, a labor of love that he shares with many other community members. For the few years that it was active, Mike served on the Board of Visitors for MCI.

Mike served 10 years on the Alumni Board at the University of Maine, chairing committees and working on a task force with the President of the University and Chancellor of the University of Maine System. He was a founding member of the University of Maine Senior Skull Alumni Interest Group and has worked as a mentor to a few University of Maine graduates entering into the investment world.

Spreading basic investment knowledge and money management techniques, Mike has taught in over 20 high schools around Central Maine through Jobs for Maine Grads (JMG) and local health classes. He has had the pleasure of assisting 3 MCI graduates recently with their senior projects. At one point in his career, Mike had thought about teaching at nearby colleges, but there are only so many hours in the day.

His weekends are filled with wake surfing, waterskiing, friends, family, travel, and anything that can bring a smile to another's face and his own. 2023 Hall of Fame Inductee Milton Webber '71

MILTON WEBBER, Class of '71 is a true son of Pittsfield and MCI. Growing up on the edge of campus in the house his grandfather owned, the sounds of the bell ringing and the sight of Founders Hall from his kitchen window were familiar reminders of the school. His official relationship with MCI began in 1961 when his mother, Betty (Knight) Webber started teaching home economics there. In 1970, George Webber would join his wife at MCI teaching drafting and shop. During his school years Milton was very involved in a variety of activities including several sports, Key Club, Arts Club, and others. He was mentored in his pursuit of art by Norbert Young, Sr. Mr. Young's tutelage appears to have paid off; after graduating from MCI in 1971, Milton attended the Portland School of Art (now MECA&D), and upon graduation Milton worked in advertising agencies as an Art Director/Creative Director. After twenty years he changed careers and worked for Walmart Distribution in Southern Maine and New Hampshire before retiring and returning to Pittsfield. Although he had always kept in touch with MCI, now he had the opportunity to give back in a personal way, helping out with school events and supporting the alumni office. He was a substitute teacher and taught art classes, mentoring many senior students with their projects. Eventually he joined the Alumni Association and then became Alumni Association President, learning from the best, former President Ralph Damren '64. Under Milton's leadership, the Alumni Association resurrected the Alumni Golf Tournament, by far the largest alumni fundraiser. The Association supported current students providing scholarships and funding for student activities including Winter Carnival and Homecoming, as it still does today. Milton's devotion and dedication went so far as to perform as the school mascot at the football championship playoffs. Milton and his wife Kathy operated The House Next Door Bed and Breakfast from their home next door to the campus. Over the years the house has seen many students and families from all over the world as they arrive and depart from school. Today Milton is as busy and energetic as ever. He manages to find time to keep involved in the doings at the school, leading by example in hopes that future alumni will follow suit.



2023 Hall of Fame Inductee Jane Woodruff '64

When thinking about the town of Pittsfield and who best represents this tight-knit community, few names carry as much weight as **JANE WOODRUFF**, Class of '64. After graduating from Maine Central Institute in 1964, Woodruff enrolled at Bates College, where she spent her junior year abroad in Edinburgh, Scotland before graduating with her Bachelor's from Bates in 1968. She would then go on to receive her Master's degree in Occupational Therapy from Western Michigan University in 1971. After completing her education, Woodruff would go on to work several jobs and serve many roles in the Pittsfield area to better her community. She was a substitute math teacher for MCI and Morse High School, before becoming a Vista volunteer for AmeriCorps and eventually an OT Aide at Augusta State Hospital. As a registered Occupational Therapist, Woodruff worked for 40 years in a variety of different settings in Connecticut, Illinois, and Maine. Woodruff served as the President of the Pittsfield Ski Club and Ski School Director, as well as District 3 Town Councilor and Mayor. She was on the MCI Alumni Committee for two years, and was an MCI Trustee for over ten years. Woodruff also worked on the committee to return 9th Grade and freshmen to Maine Central Institute. She is a member of the Pittsfield Recycling Committee, and was an instrumental member of the Pittsfield Bicentennial Committee. Today, Woodruff does all that she can to ensure that the beauty of Pittsfield does not go unnoticed or forgotten. She is the manager of the "Heart of Pittsfield" Facebook page, which circulates timely Pittsfield information, recognizes community members, and appreciates the nature and allure of Pittsfield. Woodruff also authored the book "Pittsfield - Then & Now" back in 2018, which details the history and heritage of the town and how it affects the Pittsfield of today. Jane Woodruff '64 has been a fierce supporter of MCI from the beginning through her involvement on various committees and through her parental guidance of four MCI graduates: Daniel '84, Scott '86, Vaughan '92, and Dana '97. She remembers fondly painting the Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center with Don and a number of parents, and graciously looks forward to all that MCI will do to further the tradition of education in Pittsfield, Maine.

2023 DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS



*2023 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient
Craig Sargent '73*

CRAIG R. SARGENT, Class of '73, has had a storied and accomplished history during his time at MCI and beyond. While at MCI, Sargent was the Manson Award Winner and Scholar Athlete of the Year in 1973. That same year, Sargent was a member of John Dana's infamous 1973 Prepper basketball team which won the New England Championship in Worcester, Massachusetts by just one point. Upon graduation, Sargent was honored as the Post Graduate Valedictorian for the Class of 1973. Coming out of high school, Sargent decided to pursue a career in real estate, becoming a Licensed Maine Real Estate Salesperson at age 19 and a Licensed Broker at age 22. Sargent would serve as co-owner of Century 21 Sargent Real Estate Agency from 1979 to 1988 as well as founding the Sargent Insurance Agency in 1982, where he served as president for over 20 years and oversaw 12 different offices. That same year, he opened Sargent Appraisal Services, a real estate appraisal service that specialized in residential and commercial appraisals. Sargent Appraisal Services boasted 11 different locations and became the first accredited review appraiser in the state of Maine. Craig Sargent is the President and Co-Founder of the North American Insurance Alliance, Inc (NAIA). He established NAIA in 2009, with Debora Hillier, with the mission of helping insurance agents achieve greater profitability and business stability. Craig's extensive knowledge of the insurance industry, coupled with his business management acumen, has helped agencies throughout Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, South Carolina and Florida increase their market share. He was the sole owner until January 1, 2023. Of his many other businesses, Craig's proudest achievement is founding the Sargent Family Community Fund (SFCF). On average, each year, two homes are remodeled for senior citizens who are financially unable to maintain their properties. This year, they will be tearing down an unsafe garage, and replacing it with a brand-new structure. There will also be extensive landscaping and other home improvements. The second property is having its siding replaced and removing trees that were blown down all over the property. 80% of all funds for these projects are supplied by Craig and Sharon Sargent. As of July 2023, over 15 homes have been renovated through this foundation.

Bill Cunningham '70*

WILLIAM "BILL" A. CUNNINGHAM II, is a Pittsfield native who graduated from MCI in 1970. While a student at MCI, Bill was a determined cross-country skier on the school's championship ski team coached by Mr. Boulrisse for all four years. He participated in the Key Club, Outing Club, Humanities Colloquium, and Summa Rerum. He served as business manager of the Trumpet, the school's yearbook, and as co-editor of Marsardis, the school's literary magazine. During his junior and senior years, Bill was awarded the George M. Parks Scholarship Prize, the Rensselaer Math and Science Medal, the Harvard Prize Book, the Paul W. Legge Physics Award and the Maurice L. Earle Award in History. He was the valedictorian of his Class of 1970. Bill graduated from Bates College in 1974 with a B.S. degree in Biology. He went on to earn a DMD degree with honors from the Tufts University School of Dentistry in June of 1977. Later that summer, he married Karen Lord of Marblehead, MA and in September opened his dental office in the house he grew up in that was built in 1916 by his great grandfather on South Main Street across from MCI. Bill practiced general dentistry nonstop for 35 years helping patients of all ages achieve healthy and pain free mouths. He always worked extra hard to ensure his patients had nothing to fear about their dental treatment. Because he had his dental office in his house, he did not mind being on call 24/7! During those busy years, Bill was also active in the community, serving as Cub Scout Den Leader, Scoutmaster of Troop 428, President of the Kiwanis Club, and a Deacon and Moderator of the First Congregational Church. Bill served as the 1978 Alumni Representative to the MCI Board of Trustees and, in more recent years, as a member of the MCI Alumni Association Executive Committee. Bill and Karen, now both retired, continue to live in the same house on South Main Street. Bill's current activities include helping the Pittsfield Historical Society, serving as an MCI Class Agent and trying hard to keep healthy by cross country skiing, Nordic skating, ice boating, fly fishing, hunting, swimming and walking daily, fat tire e-biking, kayaking, and ax throwing. He feels like he is almost back in school again, each time he and Karen walk across the busy MCI campus at the beginning of their daily 3 mile walk around the town.

2022 Hall of Fame Inductee John C. Manson

JOHN COLBY MANSON was born in 1830 in Meredith, New Hampshire. He graduated from the Univeristy of the City of New York Medical School (now New York University) in 1853 and was the first regular physician in Pittsfield around 1855. He married Mary Ann Lancey of Pittsfield, and the couple welcomed their daughter, Kate, in 1860. Kate would go on to attend and teach at MCI. Their son, John William Manson, was born in 1862. Manson began his Civil War service as a surgeon with the 24th Maine Regiment in 1862 before being honorably discharged for medical reasons several weeks later. Upon returning to Pittsfield, Manson resumed his role as the town's doctor. He served as an MCI trustee, and in 1871, made his most lasting contribution to MCI with the donation of funds for what would become the renowned Manson Essay Competition, which remains as one of MCI's proudest traditions. The competition has occurred annually for more than 145 years, where a select few students are given the title of "Manson Essay Finalists" and only one student achieves the coveted title of "Manson Essayist."



2022 Hall of Fame Inductee John W. Manson

JOHN WILLIAM MANSON graduated from MCI in 1877 before going on to receive his bachelor's degree from Bowdoin College in 1881 and his law degree from the Boston University Law School in 1884. Upon graduation he returned to Pittsfield to practice law. Manson joined the MCI Board of Trustees in 1905 and served for many years. His financial support of the school included a \$5,000 gift for Alumni Hall in 1928. He also served as the president of the Pittsfield National Bank for over twenty-five years in addition to practicing law. Manson was a member of the Maine Legislature in 1903 and 1904 and was the president of the Somerset County Bar Association and a director of the Main Bar Association. Upon his death in 1941, Manson bequeathed to MCI one fourth of his estate, which went to the school's endowment. His home was also given to MCI to serve as the residence for the school's headmasters. In 1926, Manson donated land to the Town of Pittsfield for the Mary Ann Lancey Manson Park, in memory of his mother.



2022 Hall of Fame Inductee Michael Duncan Wyly

MICHAEL DUNCAN WYLY is a native of Kansas City, Missouri. He took the oath as a Marine Private in 1957 and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Marines on June, 6 1962 upon graduation from the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis. Col. Wyly went on to serve a long and decorated career as a rifle platoon commander, Psychological Warfare Officer, Captain of Marines, and Commanding Officer, and moved through the ranks as a major, lieutenant colonel, and colonel. He served two tours in Vietnam and three in the Western Pacific, receiving the Purple Heart Medal, Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V" for valor, the Defense Superior Service Medal, and the Legion of Merit. After retiring in 1991, Colonel Wyly moved to Maine and founded Bossov Ballet Theatre, a pre-professional school and performing company devoted to classical ballet and formed around Russian Ballet Maestro Andrei Bossov, formerly a principal with Kirov Ballet, St. Petersburg, Russia. Colonel Wyly resides in Pittsfield, Maine, where he and his late wife, Linda raised their two daughters, Laura '99 (PhD) and Summer '00, graduated from Maine Central Institute.



2022 Hall of Fame Inductee Robert "Bob" Knowles '52

ROBERT "BOB" KNOWLES is a member of the Class of 1952 and is the husband of the late Rae Jean Knowles, a former trustee of Maine Central Institute. After graduating from MCI, Bob went on to lead a highly successful career in the medical imaging field as the owner and president of Maine X-ray Equipment, one of New England's largest distributors of X-ray film and chemicals (located right here in Pittsfield), eventually serving as the president of White Mountain Imaging, a X-ray chemical manufacturer that serves medical facilities across the northeast. Bob is perhaps best known in some circles for his contributions to stock car racing in Maine and beyond through his and his family's ownership of Unity Raceway. As owner and operator for over 20 years, Bob oversaw renovations including new grandstands, the transition to a paved track, an enlarged pit area, and new fencing. Following in Ed's footsteps, Bob was inducted into the Maine Motorsports Hall of Fame in 2008. Bob has been an active member of the Unity Rotary Club and Anah Temple Shriners.

2022 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient Rex Fowler

The story of **REX FOWLER** and his band Aztec Two-Step is intertwined with the history of folk/rock music in America. Originating from a chance meeting at an “open mic night” in Boston in 1971, then taking their name from a poem by beat poet Lawrence Ferlinghetti, Rex and his music partner Neal Shulman went on to record four albums on Elektra & RCA Records, helping to usher the music of the 60’s into the 1970s and beyond. The duo performed worldwide, was critically acclaimed in major U.S. newspapers, reviewed in Rolling Stone magazine and appeared on numerous radio and TV shows including The King Biscuit Flour Hour, World Cafe, and David Letterman. With a career built on progressive FM and college radio, and non-stop touring over five decades, the duo appeared in concert with such notable artists as The Band, Bruce Springsteen, Bonnie Raitt, Donovan, Judy Collins, Jackson Browne, Carly Simon, Heart, The Beach Boys and many more. Now that Neal has retired, and performing primarily as a 5-piece band, Rex continues to expand his musical legacy alongside his wife Dodie Pettit, an accomplished musician and an original member of The Phantom of the Opera. Rex and Dodie first met during a recording session in 1979, then miraculously re-connected, fell in love, and married in 2018. Together, as the heart and soul of Aztec Two-Step 2.0, they continue to impress audiences with their dazzling musicianship, intelligent songwriting, and soaring two and three-part harmonies.



2022 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient Lee Southard '64

A member of the class of 1964, **LEON (LEE) SOUTHARD** was a four year member of the baseball team, basketball team, and Key Club during his years at MCI. He served as his class secretary and was its vice president as a senior, and was the manager for the post grad football team. However, it was Southard’s four-year involvement as a member of the school band and his appearance playing trumpet in “Spotlight on Youth” that would portend his future achievement: a 50 year career as a one-man band from Maine to Florida with a strong, loyal following. Southard was one of the best high school pitchers in central Maine during his MCI baseball career, and he went on to set several pitching records at Thomas College in Waterville. While we all had childhood dreams of what we wanted to do when we grew up, very few of us realized them. Southard’s dream of some day pitching for the Red Sox didn’t happen, but his alternate dream of a career in music did. Being well known from Maine to Florida, his heart remains in Pittsfield, as echoed in his song “Highway to My Hometown.” He performed as the opening act in “Campus Capers, Alumni Style” sponsored by the MCI Alumni Association and held at the Pinnacle Ski Club in Pittsfield. These were held in the early 90’s and since then Lee has performed during reunion weekend at J.W. Parks Golf Course in Pittsfield.

2021 Hall of Fame Inductee Ed Miller

EDDIE MILLER graduated from Orono High School in 1976 before moving onto the University of Maine to earn a bachelor's degree in Secondary Mathematics Education in 1980. After beginning his career as a teacher at Orono High, Ed accepted a job at MCI in 1983 where he remained until his retirement in 2019. He was awarded with a Faculty Chair in 2003. Ed met his wife Anne Vaughan Miller, then an English teacher at MCI, in 1985. Ed served as a dorm parent in Rowe Hall and Alumni Hall in his early years before he and Anne moved into their Pittsfield home to raise their two children, Nicholas '09 and Cassandra '15. In the classroom, Mr. Miller was known for his disciplined and effective instruction in geometry and algebra. During two stints as a football coach, Coach Miller served as a defensive coordinator while coaching the offensive line and linebackers. He also spent several years as an assistant coach on the baseball team. 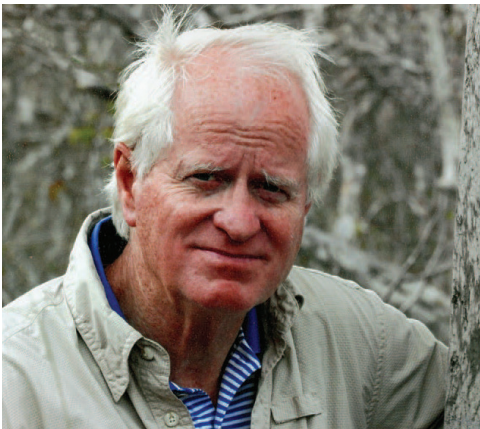
2021 Hall of Fame Inductee Andi Vigue '68

PETER "ANDI" VIGUE is a Pittsfield native who graduated from MCI in 1989. He earned a bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Maine in 1993 and began working at Cianbro Corporation. Andi served in several capacities at Cianbro in his early years. He went on to earn a master's degree in Business Administration from the University of Maine in 1998, and served as Cianbro's Senior Vice President of Operations before being named President and Chief Operations Officer in 2018. Under Tim's guidance, K.O.S. created several large-scale artworks that are on exhibit in museums all over the world. Tim and the six long-time K.O.S. members/artists conducted workshops in schools across the country and around the world to instruct students in the process of creating art for exhibition in their local museums. Tim is survived by his mother, Charlotte; his brother, Ron Rollins '74, and his sisters, Carlene Rollins '76 and Cindy Rollins McGrady '80, as well as nieces and nephews.

2018 Hall of Fame Inductee L. Ross Fitts '78

L. ROSS FITTS '78 pursued a degree in history after MCI, and since he graduated from the University of Maine, he's been a successful senior sales representative for northern Maine's dairy industry. MCI has always been an important part of his life. His late parents, Alice Wright Fitts '47 and Lewis Fitts '47, siblings Kirk '69 and Laurie '71 considered the school a central part of their lives and activities in the community. Ross explained that there are four generations of alumni named Lewis R. Fitts who graduated from MCI between 1918 and 2008, and school reunions are often reunions for his family, too. 2018 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient
Susan Haseltine '67

The Alumni Association's 2018 Distinguished Achievement Award recipient is biologist and MCI alumna **SUSAN HASELTINE, PH.D. '67**. Throughout her career as a biologist, Sue researched the effects of environmental toxins, land use, and climate changes on migratory birds and other wildlife. She worked at the United States Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) and US Geological Survey (USGS) throughout her career. After working on research projects around the country, Sue became director of Northern Prairie Wildlife Research Center, the second woman in the FWS history to lead a major research center. She was Chief Scientist and then Associate Director for Biology at the USGS before retiring in 2010. Sue lives in Virginia and visits Maine regularly.

2015 Hall of Fame Inductee Robert Libby '48

After MCI, **ROBERT LIBBY '48** commuted to Colby College for two and half years. After military service in the US Navy, Libby began a career as a casualty underwriter at Continental Casualty Company (now CNA). At the same time he returned to college in the evenings and graduated from Northwestern University with a Bachelor's degree in Finance. 2015 Hall of Fame Inductee Anna Maria Parker '66

ANNA MARIA PARKER '66 received her BA in Speech Pathology and Audiology in 1970 from the University of Vermont in Burlington, Vermont. She was a legal secretary for 25 years and gave private piano and voice lessons for 10 years after that. In 1985 Parker was introduced to women's barbershop singing and has been an enthusiastic member of Sweet Adelines International ever since. She is a charter and emeritus member of the Royal River Chorus of Yarmouth, Maine, and is now in the Tucson Desert Harmony Chorus in Tucson, Arizona. In May 2010, Parker became the Sweet Adeline Region 21 Coordinator for the region's Arranger Development Program. She is a certified arranger in Sweet Adelines International and is in the process of becoming a certified Sweet Adeline chorus director. Parker has also been a church music director in Yarmouth, Maine and in Portland, Maine, and an organist in several churches. Parker has been a devoted volunteer for MCI, serving as a Class Agent as well as Reunion Gift Chair for her class. She has also been a long-time supporter, particularly of the School's Visual and Performing Arts Program.



2015 Hall of Fame Inductee Peter Williams

DR. PETER WILLIAMS (posthumous) earned a bachelor's degree from Northern Michigan University and a doctorate in education from Indiana University. Williams volunteered as a Peace Corps teacher in Sierra Leone, West Africa. He was a Fulbright specialist in South Africa in 1998 and spent four months teaching at Beijing Polytechnical University in Beijing, China. Williams began his career at Cianbro in 1975 as training director and completed his career as vice president of personnel and safety in 1985. After 10 years at Cianbro, Williams returned to the University of Maine at Farmington. He was chairman of the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science for a number of years, as well as the chairman of the Department of Science and Mathematics. Williams retired from the Mathematics Department at the University of Maine at Farmington in June 2004. Williams passed away in August 2004, the result of a motorcycle accident. Williams was a long-time volunteer for MCI, serving as a member on the board of trustees for six years and chairperson of the strategic planning team for math and science. In addition, Williams served as both volunteer Headmaster and Math Teacher and coached the MCI Ski Team.



2015 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient
Beverly Breau '52

BEVERLY BREAU '52 graduated from Eastern Maine Medical Center in 1954 as a Registered Radiological Technologist. She worked for nearly 30 years at Seabrook Valley Hospital in Pittsfield, where she was instrumental in establishing the first mammography unit. She was also the co-organizer for the first local Breast Cancer Walk for the Cure. Breau is a life-long volunteer, dedicated to her family and community. In 2014, she received the Spirit of America Award for establishing the St. Martin Library in Palmyra, Maine. She established a literacy program at the library and has continued to volunteer there for over 25 years. Breau has been a longtime member of the Order of the Eastern Star. As the District Deputy Grana Matron, she began a fund raising effort to support people studying for the ministry, which has spread state-wide. In addition to her other volunteer work, Breau has been a supporter of MCI and served as a Class Agent for 1952 for several years.

In the spring of 2014, Clifford again made waves with his announcement that he has found Christopher Columbus' ship, the Santa Maria.
