Parents will provide input on Title I plans and school improvement efforts for 2027-2028 and receive information about Georgia Milestones testing.

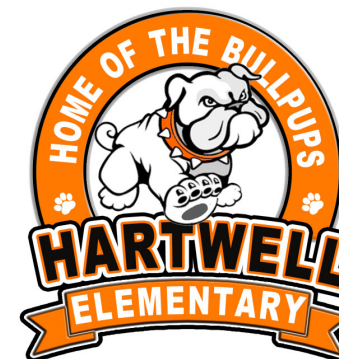
April 14, 2027, from 6:00-7:30 pm, STEAM (Math/Science) Showcase

In the First Grade Classroom

The First Grade team will work with students and their families to support success and achievement in language, reading, and math. Some of our key connections with families will be:

- Provide parents with information to help their child learn Reading Literary, Reading Informational, and Reading Foundational skills at home.
- Provide reading and writing opportunities in the classroom everyday. Offer reading choices for students to read at home.
- Provide parents information on essential math units and skills as they are taught through out the year. The math units include base ten number sense, understanding shapes and fractions; sorting, comparing, and ordering numbers; measurement and time; operations and algebraic thinking; and understanding place value. Numbers talk mental math strategies will be shared to help students and families integrate discussion of math in everyday scenarios.
- Communicate through school status (phone calls and texts), newsletters and emails to inform about upcoming events, extra resources, content we are learning, and student's progress.

Communication about Student Learning

At Home

Hartwell Elementary School parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support students' success in reading, language, and mathematics. Families may have other ideas to add to the list below:

- Review homework and complete learning activities that are sent home as well as reading materials.
- Listen to my child read and encourage writing everyday at home to increase stamina in their daily reading/writing.
- Review my child's math skills and tools everyday at home to build fluency in number sense, measurement, operations and algebraic thinking. Participate in learning opportunities at home and school. Use numbers talk strategies as discussed by the teacher in order to increase number sense and mental math capabilities in everyday scenarios.
- Listen to weekly School Status recordings, read and review materials sent home in order to stay up to date on current happenings at school.

Hartwell Elementary Students

The following ideas make connections between learning at home and school:

- Complete daily homework and reading activities. Continue to practice reading daily with my parents.
- Read and write daily at home.
- Practice reviewing my numbers and counting so that I can be more fluent in Math. Practice the strategies I have learned to better understand numbers and how to use them to solve problems. Look for ways to talk about math every day.
- Take important documents home and have parents sign off.
