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DESCRIPTION OF THE SCHOOL

Middlesex School is a nonsectarian, coeducational preparatory school founded in 1901. The present enrollment is 427 with 207 females and 220 males in grades nine through twelve, with 115 students in the Senior class. The student body represents 20 states and 22 foreign countries. The vast majority of students enter Middlesex in either the ninth or tenth grade. There are 67 teaching faculty, 81% of whom have graduate degrees. Classes are conducted six days a week. The average section size is 12.

CURRICULUM

Freshmen and Sophomores customarily take 5 1/2 credits per semester; Juniors and Seniors take 5 credits. Specific requirements include 8 semesters of English; 4 semesters of history, including 1 year of United States History; mathematics through Pre-calculus: Trigonometry; 2 years of laboratory science; a foreign language through the third-year level; and 4 half-credit courses in the arts. In addition, Juniors and Seniors are required to distribute their courses among the 4 divisions of the curriculum: 7 in the Humanities, 5 in STEM disciplines, 2 in the Social Sciences, and 1 in the Arts, with 5 courses unrestricted.

GRADING

The numerical system at Middlesex is designed to give a precise evaluation of each student's academic performance. Full-credit courses are given equal weight in computing averages. Neither a rank in class nor a cumulative average is computed. **Grading standards are unusually high. In the Class of 2027, the highest unweighted Junior-year average is 95.55.**

Middlesex's grading system has the following letter/number equivalencies:
