90TH ANNIVERSARY TIME CAPSULE CELEBRATION

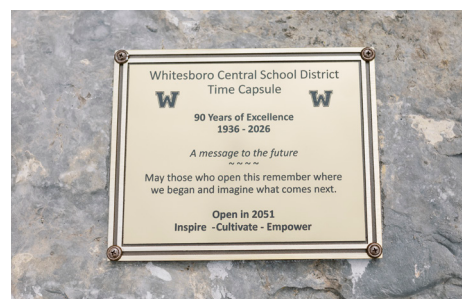


On May 11, the Whitesboro Central School District held a time capsule celebration at Whitesboro Middle School to commemorate its 90th anniversary. The morning began with a visit from Assemblywoman Marianne Buttenschon, who met with District officials to sign the Time Capsule Proclamation, formally recognizing this historic milestone.



The subsequent ceremony brought together students, staff and alumni to reflect on the District's rich history while contributing to its future legacy. Before the capsule was sealed, attendees viewed a curated display of memorabilia and artifacts representing the current era. The program took place on the front lawn of the middle school and featured several traditional honors following the Pledge of Allegiance. The Middle School Select Choir performed the National Anthem under the direction of Mrs. Chantelle Nobis, and the High School Chamber Choir led the assembly in the Alma Mater under the direction of Mrs. Sarah DePalma. These performances highlighted the District's long-standing musical excellence and vibrant community spirit.

As the centerpiece of the 90th anniversary celebration, the time capsule was filled with items documenting modern student life and local history. This initiative ensures that the experiences and achievements of today's school community are preserved for the next generation of students. The capsule is scheduled to remain sealed for 25 years, with the official opening set for 2051.

Welcome back and best wishes for a successful and rewarding 2026-27 school year!

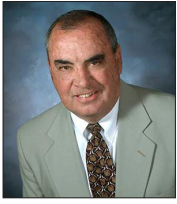

The Whitesboro Board of Education is committed to striving for higher student achievement in all of our academic and related program offerings. The Board has worked hard to allocate appropriate resources that will allow the school district to pursue the goal of having all students graduate career, college and life ready. Please review the information on this page to help you better understand the role and organizational structure of the Board of Education. It is the hope of each school board member that our students enjoy a positive learning environment throughout their school experience.

As the Whitesboro Board of Education, we welcome parents, students, staff members, community residents and other interested persons to our meetings. We appreciate your interest in and concern for our school system. The Board can better represent its constituents when members of the community take the time to observe the Board in action, express opinions and ask questions.

What is the Board Of Education?

The Board is the official policy-making body of the school district. The Board is composed of seven members, elected by the public, who serve three-year terms of office. Board of Education members receive no paid compensation for their services.

What are the responsibilities of the Board?

- Establish District policies
- Identify District philosophy and direction
- Develop an annual budget for voter approval
- Act on the Superintendent's recommendations regarding personnel matters
- Review programs and instructional materials

No person or group of persons acts in the name of the Board. All motions require a majority vote before the Board can act. A Board member acts in an official capacity only during an official Board meeting. The Board employs a Superintendent of Schools as the Chief Executive Officer of the school district. The Superintendent of Schools is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the District and administration of Board policies, programs and plans for Board action.

If I attend a Board meeting, must I stay until the end?

How long you stay is completely up to you. You may stay for as much time as you would like.

Can the public speak at Board meetings?

Normally, the Board will allow opportunities for the public to speak, both at the beginning (on agenda items only) and at the end on any item you wish to bring to the Board. You will be asked to state your name and address before speaking. Visitor comments will be limited to three minutes each. The President will curtail discussion on a topic to ensure that others have an opportunity to speak and that there is sufficient time to consider all agenda items. The Board of Education members will not engage in dialogue with the public during this time.

Comments relative to personnel or students are inappropriate to address in an open session and will not be allowed.

What is Executive Session?

Occasionally, it is necessary for the Board to conduct a discussion on a confidential matter which, under State Education guidelines, requires a "closed" or executive session. Such topics could include personnel matters involving a specific person, negotiation strategies, building rental or property acquisition. Although these discussions are not open to the public, any action on an executive session item must be taken in open public session. Executive sessions are usually held before or near the end of meetings. Only items which fall in the executive category can be discussed during such a session.

When and where does the Board of Education meet?

The Whitesboro Central School Board of Education meets at 7:00 p.m., unless noted otherwise. Meetings are held at the Administration Building at 65 Oriskany Boulevard in Whitesboro, or at one of the school buildings in the District. Please visit www.wboro.org/boemeeting for the complete meeting schedule.

Do you have a concern?

The Board encourages parents and community members who have a concern about their children's education or other school-related problems to try to resolve them first at the level most directly involved; the classroom teacher or the building principal.

If your issue remains unresolved, you may contact the assistant superintendent or superintendent for their assistance.

STUDENTS EXCEL DURING AP EXAMS

Thanks to the relentless hard work of the students, the unwavering support of families and the exceptional dedication of the teaching staff, Advanced Placement (AP) exam results have reached unprecedented heights.

The data shows a remarkable upward trajectory for the high school. Over a five-year period, students consistently pushed the boundaries of academic excellence, culminating in a historic performance during the testing season.

A quick look at the school summary highlights just how far the program has progressed. The number of total AP students rose steadily from 222 in 2022 to an all-time high of 274 students in 2026. Students challenged themselves at a higher level, taking a record-breaking 439 exams during the year. Most impressively, a staggering 88.69% of AP students earned a score of 3 or higher, up from 73.87% in 2022 and 77.91% the previous year.

While overall growth is a major cause for celebration, students shined brightest in the STEM fields. In AP Pre-Calculus, AP Biology and AP Chemistry, classes achieved extraordinarily high passing rates. Not only did these programs set new school benchmarks, but the students also outperformed both New York State averages and global averages in these rigorous subjects. This achievement proves that the students are not just succeeding locally, they are competing and leading at an international level.

Behind every test score is a student who stayed up late studying, a teacher who went above and beyond to provide extra support and a family cheering them on every step of the way. The District extends a big congratulations to the students for their incredible dedication to academic excellence. The students have set a new standard for what is possible and the entire community feels incredibly proud of their success.

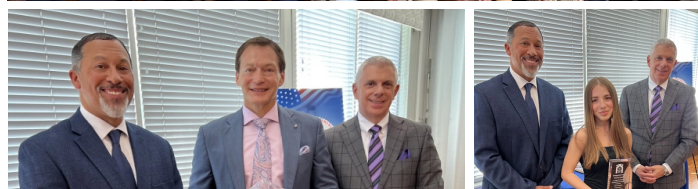
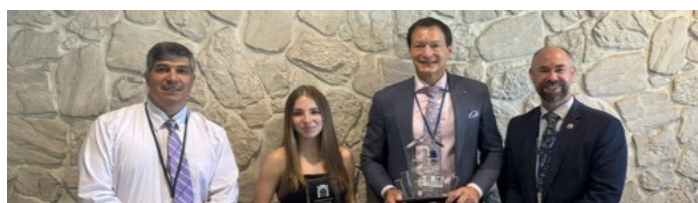
Award Oneida County Youth & Adult **RECOGNITION CEREMONY**

PARKWAY CAREER FAIR

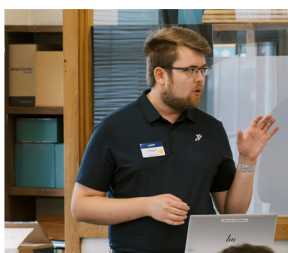

Whitesboro to Honor Two Coaching Legends at Dedication Ceremony

A new sign now stands at the entrance of Whitesboro's football stadium, symbolizing a legacy that spans generations. This fall, it will become one of the centerpieces of a ceremony honoring two men whose names have become synonymous with Whitesboro football.

On Friday, October 2, 2026, the Whitesboro Central School District along with the Schoen Dedication Committee will officially dedicate the football stadium as Tom Schoen Stadium and rededicate the playing field as Chiz Frye Field at Tom Schoen Stadium. The public dedication ceremony will begin at 5:15 p.m. at the stadium entrance, and community members are invited to attend.

The ceremony recognizes two coaches whose combined years of leadership established and sustained one of Central New York's most respected high school football traditions. Between their tenures, Coaches Harold Head and Dick Hawksley faithfully carried that tradition forward, ensuring the program's continued excellence during the period from 1966 through 1973.

Allen "Chiz" Frye laid the foundation for Whitesboro football during his tenure as head coach from 1931 through 1965. More than a coach, Frye built a program rooted in discipline, pride and commitment, values that became hallmarks of our football program for decades to come. In recognition of his contributions, the District dedicated the playing surface as Chiz Frye Field in 1973.

Coach Tom Schoen carried that tradition forward during a remarkable 45-year tenure as head football coach from 1974 through 2018. During his career, Coach Schoen recorded 288 victories, won 11 Section III championships and established himself as one of the most accomplished coaches in New York State.

The newly installed stadium sign serves as a lasting tribute to both coaches and reflects the District's commitment to preserving the rich history of Whitesboro athletics. By naming the facility Tom Schoen Stadium while continuing to honor Chiz Frye Field, the District recognizes the enduring legacy of two individuals whose dedication helped shape not only a football program, but an entire community.

Alumni, former players, families and community members are encouraged to attend the October 2 ceremony as Whitesboro celebrates the remarkable contributions of two legendary coaches whose influence continues to inspire future generations of athletes.

THE BUS SCHEDULE

Morning pick-up times will begin at the approximate time stated. We ask that students arrive at their bus stop **five** minutes prior to pick-up time.

Bus arrival times, routing and stops will become finalized several days into the school year. Post cards with initial route/bus information will be sent home the last week of August.

All routes are **subject to change** during the school year.

STOP AND PICK-UP TIMES

Approximate times are given for the bus stop on each run. A time pattern for all stops will be established within a few days. Students should be ready at the stop five minutes ahead of the estimated time. Exact arrival times are affected by many factors, including weather, traffic, substitute drivers and mechanical problems. These are suggested times for the first week of school and are **subject to change**. Drivers will notify students of changes.

BUS SAFETY GUIDELINES

1. Line up single file as soon as you see the school bus approaching. Do not start toward the bus until it has come to a full stop and the driver has opened the door. If you have to cross the street, wait for the bus driver to signal.
2. Use the handrail when boarding and exiting the bus.
3. Be courteous.
4. Do not walk behind the bus.
5. Bus passes must be obtained from school personnel (available with written permission from parent or guardian) in order to discharge student at another stop other than his/her normal stop.

ITEMS PROHIBITED ON SCHOOL BUSES

For the safety of all riders, students are requested not to carry potentially harmful items on the bus. Nothing should be carried that will interfere with seating, space or safety. The following are examples of items prohibited on the bus:

- Insects or animals of any kind
- Glass objects and breakable objects
- Balloons
- Skate boards
- Sleds and skis of any kind
- Any sharp or pointed objects
- Medicine, medications
- Projects that don't fit on a student's lap
- Large musical instruments
- Weapons of any kind or any object that could be perceived to be a weapon (toy guns, knives, etc.)
- Matches/lighters

SCHOOL BUS RULES OF CONDUCT

1. Follow directions of the driver at all times.

2. Stay seated in your seat at all times.
3. Keep all parts of your body in the bus and to yourself.
4. No pushing, shoving or fighting.
5. No eating, drinking, smoking or spitting.
6. Do not litter, write on or damage the bus in any way.
7. Do not use profanity, rude gestures, tease or harass anyone on the bus.

BUS DISCIPLINE

Improper behavior may result in the suspension of bus riding privileges. The following procedure is followed when a student's conduct may warrant suspension.

IF A STUDENT VIOLATES THE CODE OF CONDUCT:

- 1st time:** Driver verbally warns student and documents on daily log.
- 2nd time:** Parents contacted by driver or transportation department personnel, documented on daily log form (probationary period begins).
- 3rd time:** Bus Conduct Form issued, parents contacted by Building Administrator, three (3) day bus suspension.
- 4th time:** Five (5) day bus suspension.
- 5th time:** Principal's hearing (10-30 day bus suspension).
- 6th time:** Superintendent's hearing.

SEVERE DISRUPTION

The following inappropriate behavior will result in suspension of transportation privileges

IMMEDIATELY:

1. Physical harm to student.*
2. Physical harm or threat of physical harm to driver.*

*May result in referral to law enforcement

It's "Back-to-School" time. School buses are back on the roads, and students are walking along the side of the road and waiting for buses.

- Please watch carefully for children near school buildings, in areas where school buses are traveling or where there are signs for school zones or bus stops.
- Remember that if you are approaching a school bus from either the front or behind, and its yellow lights are flashing, the bus is preparing to stop.
- If the bus' red lights are flashing, **YOU MUST STOP. It's the law!**

This **includes** school buses that are: on the opposite sides of divided highways, on multiple lane roadways, in parking lots and on school grounds.

NOTE: The **only** exception to this law is if the bus driver or a police officer signals that you may pass the bus.

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

School districts and BOCES are required to maintain a list of parents or guardians who wish to receive written notification 48 hours prior to application of a pesticide that is covered by notification requirements, at their child(ren)'s school/facility. You will then receive advance notification of a pesticide application at your child(ren)'s facility of pesticide products covered by notification requirements.

USE OF SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

The Whitesboro Central School District promotes student, staff and visitor safety in all District facilities, grounds and buses. In an attempt to ensure a safe and effective learning environment, the Board of Education supports the use of surveillance cameras, when necessary, in all District facilities, grounds and buses. Surveillance cameras will not be used in private areas such as restrooms and locker rooms, where there is a reasonable expectation of privacy. Audio recordings will not be made in conjunction with the use of cameras. Such prohibition does not preclude the use of audio recordings by law enforcement or District personnel when used in accordance with their official duties as authorized by law.



The Whitesboro Central School District's Food Service department welcomes you to a new and exciting school year. The food service team will work hard to ensure that each meal served provides a varied and well-balanced meal consisting of whole grains, lean proteins and array of wholesome fruits and vegetables. The food service staff are knowledgeable and trained in food safety procedures, regulations and food allergy protocols to follow. Each staff member has the skills and mindset to ensure a safe, healthy and friendly experience for all students.

Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)

Back on November 1, 2023, the District's food service department received approval to operate both the School Breakfast Program (SBP) and National School Lunch Program (NSLP) under the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP). Under the CEP, students enrolled in the Whitesboro CSD can receive FREE breakfast and lunch meals at no cost! This approval is good through June 30, 2027.

Families with children of the District do not need to fill out a new 2026-2027 household income eligibility form, but it is encouraged to do so for accurate state and federal data reporting to ensure correct funding to the District.

MEDICATION DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

School policies regarding administration of medication are consistent with procedures established by state education law.

For students to receive medication (prescription or non-prescription, including cough drops and other "over-the-counter" medication) during the school day, the following procedures **MUST** be followed and renewed each year:

- The parent or legal guardian must submit a written request to school authorities, along with a written request from the prescribing physician, indicating the frequency and dosage.
- The medication must be brought to school by a responsible adult in the original container labeled with the name of the medication and the dosage.

These procedures must be followed in order for medication to be administered in school.

STUDENT PHYSICALS

New York State Education Law requires that each new entrant to the District and students in kindergarten, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th and 11th grades must have a physical examination, either by the school nurse practitioner or family physician. Vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings per NYS regulations will be done by the school nurse.

Please communicate with the school nurse if you will have your family physician provide the physical examination. The family physician will need to complete a physician's report form (available from the school nurse) and submit it to the nurse.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT PARKING

Driving a motor vehicle and parking on school property is a privilege granted to juniors and seniors at the high school. Information on registering vehicles for the upcoming school year is sent out to the parents of all 11th and 12th grade students in early August.

There are designated areas for parking at the high school. Students must park in white lined areas only (including designated parking in the west end of the north parking lot). Staff parking is indicated by yellow lines; signs designate visitor areas. Anyone using a handicap space must have appropriate handicap identification on their vehicle or, for temporary reasons, must contact the student activities office to secure permission.

Daily passes, which allow students to drive to and from BOCES internship sites, can be issued by Dr. Lee in the student activities office.

If you have questions or concerns, contact the student activities office between 7:15 a.m.-3:00 p.m. at 315.266.3230.

WORKING PAPERS

Before starting employment, students 14-17 years of age are required by New York State law to have working papers. There are restrictions on the type of work and the number of hours a student can work, particularly during the school year.

Students should apply for working papers at least one week before the start of employment to allow time for the paperwork to be processed. Students must provide proof of age and physical fitness to work. School records can provide proof of age for students registered at Whitesboro High School. The high school nurse can provide proof of physical fitness for students whose physicals have been done at school for sports. Students may also submit written documentation from their private physicians.

Application forms (working papers) can be picked up in the high school nurse's office. Students should return their completed forms to the nurse's office. The nurse will then verify that the student has had a physical within the last year and will attach a "certificate of physical fitness" form, forwarding everything to the student activities office where the student will pick up their employment certificate (working card).

STUDENT DIRECTORY INFORMATION POLICY

New York State law allows school districts to release student directory information to an outside group without individual consent. Parents or eligible students have the right to refuse the release of such information by notifying Mr. Christopher O'Neil, Records Information Officer, in writing, no later than October 1 of the school year. Following this response period, the District may release such information.

The Family Education and Rights Privacy Act (FERPA) defines student directory information as the following: name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height (if members of athletic teams), degrees and awards received and the name of the educational agency or institution previously attended by the student.
