Regular Attendance Key to Success in School

In order to be successful in meeting the high expectations set down by the State Education Department and our local school district for graduation, it is imperative that students come to school on a regular basis and maximize their time in school for learning. There is a positive correlation between regular attendance at school and academic success. The business world demands that employees be at work daily and on time. Excessive absenteeism and for tardiness to work often results in the loss of jobs. Our school has an obligation to expect regular attendance and punctuality to school and class. Students have a responsibility to come to school on a daily basis and to be on time to school and to all of their classes. Parents have a responsibility to see that their children meet these obligations.

The vast majority of student discipline referrals at Whitesboro High School are related to truantcies and tardies. Improvements in those areas will allow students to perform better in the classroom. There is a direct correlation between poor student attendance and course failures. We ask for your cooperation. Your child should attend school daily. Whenever possible, medical and dental appointments should be scheduled outside of the school day. Students requiring regular appointments during the school day should have these scheduled as to avoid missing the same class each time. We need to maximize the time we have in school for instructional purposes.

Student Drop-Off Areas and Tips

Students Drop off areas are located in the student parking lot near the Auditorium and at the end of the North Drive near the faculty parking lot. Signs are posted at both entrances. However, the parking lot does get congested as buses arrive and depart between 7:10-7:15 AM and between 2:00-2:15 PM.

In the morning, it is important for students to be in class when the 7:30 bell rings to avoid referrals for tardiness. In order to ensure they are on time for class, parents should drop off students no later than 7:25 AM. You are also reminded that the Auditorium doors do close promptly at 7:30 AM and after that time all students must report to the attendance office in the North Drive to sign in and receive a pass to class.

At the end of the school day, buses depart at 2:15. There is congestion between 2:10 and 2:20 as all of our buses and student drivers attempt to exit the parking lots at the same time. Parents are encouraged to wait until after 2:20 to arrive at which time both bus circles are accessible and can be utilized for pickup. Students are free to wait for 10-15 minutes in the Auditorium lobby, Gym lobby, or cafeteria lobby until their parents arrive in these pick up circles.

Remember, passing a school bus while it is loading or unloading in NY State will result in a ticket and fine. All buses are equipped with traffic cameras to protect our students.

Late Buses

Late buses are available for those students who stay after regular school hours for remedial help or co-curricular activities Monday - Thursday. There are no late buses on Friday or on a day before a vacation. Students should be under the supervision of a staff member during this time period, from 2:20 to 3:20 p.m., and need to have a late bus pass signed by a staff member in order to be allowed to ride the bus. Student athletes, waiting for their coach to arrive to begin practice, should report to the cafeteria no later than 2:20 p.m. unless they are with another teacher for extra help or at a club meeting. The late bus departs from the High School at 3:20 p.m. and goes to the Middle School to pick up students. There, students may have to transfer to other buses depending on where they live. During the 2024-25 school year, we repeatedly had issues with students who wished to stay after school to socialize with friends or "hang out" on campus. Students should only remain on campus after school if they are meeting with a teacher, club advisor, or coach.

Handicapped Accessibility

Your Whitesboro High School is handicapped accessible. Two elevators are available; one is located at the south side of the high school adjacent to the gymnasium and the other at the north side of the building across from the auditorium. Handicapped parking areas are located in the circle in front of the high school, in the north drive across from the Attendance Office, and in the parking area east of the Attendance Office. All bathrooms in the building are handicapped accessible. Any further questions concerning handicapped accessibility needs should be directed to the school administration.

Dress Code Helps Maintain Quality School Environment

All students are expected to give proper attention to personal cleanliness and to dress appropriately for school and school functions. Students and their parents have the primary responsibility for acceptable student dress and appearance. Teachers and all other district personnel should exemplify and reinforce acceptable student dress and help students develop an understanding of appropriate appearance in the school setting. A student's dress, grooming and appearance, including hair style/color, jewelry, make-up, and nails, shall:

1. Be safe, appropriate, and not disrupt or interfere with the educational process.
2. Recognize that extremely brief garments including but not limited to tube tops, net tops, halter tops, plunging necklines (front and/or back) and see-through garments are not appropriate. (This includes low-cut pants and abbreviated tops which expose the midriff area.)
3. Ensure that underwear is completely covered with outer clothing.
4. Include footwear at all times. Footwear that is a safety hazard will not be allowed.
5. Not include items that are vulgar, obscene, libelous or denigrate others on account of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, gender, sexual orientation or disability.
6. Not promote and/or endorse the use of alcohol, tobacco or illegal drugs, and/or encourage other illegal or violent activities.
7. Not include the wearing of hats or other headgear in the building during regular school hours except for medical or religious purposes.

If the manner of dress is such that it violates these standards, the student will be asked to change, and, if necessary, be sent home to do so. The student will be responsible for missed work as a result of leaving school. If there is any doubt about the appropriateness of clothing, it should not be worn. If you have any questions, please contact an administrator.

Main Entrance

For the safety and security of all members of our educational community, we utilize one main entrance to the high school, located on the north side of the building by the cafeteria. Buses drop off students in the morning on the circle in front of the building and on the north side circle drive. Students and staff may utilize the front doors by the auditorium and the cafeteria doors on the north side to enter the building until 7:30 a.m. After that time, all entrance doors are locked for the remainder of the day except for the entrance door leading to the cafeteria on the north side. Afternoon buses pick up from the same locations as they dropped off students in the morning. The attendance office is located just inside the doors leading to the cafeteria.

All visitors should enter the building through the main entrance located on the north side of the building by the cafeteria. Visitors and handicapped parking areas are designated in a lot off the north circle drive. Visitors are expected to sign in at the Attendance Office where they will receive a guest pass. Upon exiting the building, guests are to again report to the Attendance Office and sign out.

As an additional security measure, we have a second set of doors just beyond the attendance office. Similar to other buildings in the District, this allows our attendance clerk to control access to the building via a buzzer which unlocks the door. We appreciate your cooperation and patience with this procedure.

Excuses & Early Release From School

Regular attendance and arriving to school on time are essential for student success. Under New York State guidelines, school districts are required to classify every absence, tardy, and early dismissal as either **excused** or **unexcused**.

Excused absences and tardiness reasons are personal illness, a death in the family religious observance, court appearances, medical appointments, severe weather, quarantine, approved educational field trips, approved college visits, and military obligations. Any absence or tardy that does not meet these criteria will be recorded as **unexcused**, unless otherwise approved by the building principal.

If your child needs to leave school early, please send a signed note with your student to the Attendance Office at the beginning of the school day. Students who become ill during the school day must report to the nurse and may only be dismissed after the nurse has evaluated them and contacted a parent or guardian.

96 Students Named as AP Scholars

Whitesboro High School is proud to announce that 96 students have been named by the College Board as AP Scholars. Students achieving this status must have received scores of 3 or higher on 3 or more Advanced Placement Exams. Of these students, 40 qualified for the AP Scholar category, 32 students qualified for AP Scholar with Honor category, while 24 were awarded the highest possible title of the AP Scholar with Distinction.

For the 2026 AP cohort, 85% of total AP students scored a 3 or higher on their respective exams, with an average score of 3.8.

Cafeteria News

For the upcoming 2026-2027 school year, the Whitesboro CSD's Food Service Department is pleased to announce that it will continue to operate under the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) which means all students enrolled within the district can receive breakfast and lunch FREE of charge!

Families with children of the district do not need to fill out a new 2026-2027 household income eligibility form but are encouraged to do so to help determine eligibility for any additional State and Federal program benefits that the district may qualify for. In addition, an application will be mailed out to each household at the start of school and will be available at the main office anytime throughout the school year.

Beyond FREE meals, students will have the option each day to purchase milk, extras, along with a variety of healthy snacks and/or a la carte items offered during each meal period. In order to receive any of these additional items, students will need to have money available on their meal accounts or pay cash at the time of purchase. NO CHARGING to the student's meal account will be permitted without sufficient funds available.

Whitesboro High School is recognized as a 2025-2026 Scholar-Athlete School of Distinction winner by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA). For only the third time, our teams have earned this highest honor. The purpose of this award is to unite athletic departments in challenging every varsity team to achieve statewide academic recognition. Dr. Robert Zayas, NYSPHSAA Executive Director, claims, "These awards recognize entire school communities that value success in the classroom as much as success in competition." To earn the School of Distinction Award, 100% of a school's varsity teams must qualify and receive the Scholar-Athlete Team award. At Whitesboro High School, all of our teams met this criteria for all three sports seasons!

Internet-Enabled Device Ban

Dear Parents and Guardians,

New York state law prohibits the use of internet-enabled devices during the school day in all New York State public schools. This legislation, signed by Governor Kathy Hochul, applies to any device capable of connecting to the internet and accessing online content or social media.

The Whitesboro Board of Education is committed to striving for higher student achievement in all of our academic and related program offerings. The Board has worked hard to allocate appropriate resources that will allow the school district to pursue the goal of having all students graduate career, college and life ready. Please review the information on this page and the following page to help you better understand the role and organizational structure of the Board of Education. It is the hope of each school board member that our students enjoy a positive learning environment throughout their school experience.

As the Whitesboro Board of Education, we welcome parents, students, staff members, community residents and other interested persons to our meetings. We appreciate your interest in and concern for our school system. The Board can better represent its constituents when members of the community take the time to observe the Board in action, express opinions and ask questions.

What is the Board of Education?

The Board is the official policy-making body of the school district. The Board is composed of seven members, elected by the public, who serve three-year terms of office. Board of Education members receive no paid compensation for their services.

What are the responsibilities of the Board?

• Establish District policies • Identify District philosophy and direction • Develop an annual budget for voter approval • Act on the Superintendent's recommendations regarding personnel matters • Review programs and instructional materials.

No person or group of persons acts in the name of the Board. All motions require a majority vote before the Board can act. A Board member acts in an official capacity only during an official Board meeting. The Board employs a Superintendent of Schools as the Chief Executive Officer of the school district. The Superintendent of Schools is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the District and administration of Board policies, programs and plans for Board action.

If I attend a Board Meeting, must I stay until the end?

How long you stay is completely up to you. You may stay for as much time as you would like.

Can the public speak at Board meetings?

Normally, the Board will allow opportunities for the public to speak, both at the beginning (on agenda items only), and at the end on any item you wish to bring to the Board. You will be asked to state your name and address before speaking. Visitor comments will be limited to three minutes each. The President will curtail discussion on a topic to ensure that others have an opportunity to speak and that there is sufficient time to consider all agenda items. The Board of Education members will not engage in dialogue with the public during this time.

Comments relative to personnel or students are inappropriate to address in an open session and will not be allowed.

What is Executive Session?

Occasionally, it is necessary for the Board to conduct a discussion on a confidential matter which, under State Education guidelines, requires a "closed" or executive session. Such topics could include personnel matters involving a specific person, negotiation strategies, building rental or property acquisition. Although these discussions are not open to the public, any action on an executive session item must be taken in open public session. Executive sessions are usually held before or near the end of meetings. Only items which fall in the executive category can be discussed during such a session.

When and where does the Board of Education meet?

The Whitesboro Central School Board of Education meets at 7:00 p.m., unless noted otherwise. Meetings are held at the Administration Building at 65 Oriskany Boulevard in Whitesboro, or at one of the school buildings in the District. Please visit www.wboro.org/boemeeting for the complete meeting schedule.

Do you have a concern?

The Board encourages parents and community members who have a concern about their children's education or other school-related problems to try to resolve them first at the level most directly involved; the classroom teacher or the building principal.

If your issue remains unresolved, you may contact the assistant superintendent or superintendent for their assistance.
