Course Overview: Curriculum: AP Calculus AB Flamingo Math

AP (Advanced Placement) Calculus AB is equivalent to a first-semester college calculus course. Topics include functions, limits and continuity, derivatives, and integrals. The course will focus on applying the skills and concepts of calculus to modeling and solving problems across multiple representations. Students will take the AP Calculus Exam May 10, 2026.

Materials Required Daily:

2 inch binder, 5 dividers (*labeled Bellwork, Notes, Homework, Daily Quizzes, Tests/Quizzes*), Notebook paper & Pencils (preferably mechanical). A small folder could be useful as a means to take home individual assignments. Optional to donate: Facial Tissues, Notebook Paper &/or Paper Towels. (Thank you!)

We will use a TI-84 Graphing Calculator during class, but those calculators will remain in the classroom. There are several free apps for graphing calculators that students can use at home. Otherwise they will need to purchase one to use it at home.

Remind Code:

I will sometimes use the Remind app to send reminders for upcoming quizzes and/or tests. Signing up is optional, but I offer it because I know many of my students are very involved and very busy. A little reminder here and there can't hurt. Parents are welcome to sign up as well. Remind can be used as an effective/timely form of communication between the parent and teacher.

Classroom Expectations:

Follow all school rules.

Be polite and respectful of others. Respect others' property and right to learn.

Be seated and working on the "bellwork" when the tardy bell rings.

Bring your materials to class every day.

Take notes and use your class time wisely -- ask questions while you are here.

Students not on task will be assigned detention.

Detention

If detention is assigned, students will be expected to be in my classroom at 7:30 the next school morning. During detention students will complete assignments or other tasks at teacher discretion. Failure to attend or work during detention will result in 2 days of detention. If missed again, a discipline referral may be turned in.

Hall Passes

No student may leave the classroom without a hall pass. Every 6 weeks students will be given 3 "Sofka Hall Passes". If a student must leave the room for personal reasons, which include going to the restroom, speaking with other teachers, making a phone call, getting a drink of water or any errand not requested by me, the student must give up a hall pass. I will determine when will be the best time for them to leave class. If they have no more passes (or if they lose their passes), then they may not leave. Unused passes may be cashed in for 1 test point or 2 quiz points each at any time, but all extras must be turned in by the end of each **semester** to get credit.

Grading Policy:

Minor Grades are **50%** of the six weeks grade. Major Grades will count **50%** as well.

In this class, Quizzes will count as one "Major Grade" while tests will count as two "Major Grades." The Semester Exam counts **20%** of the semester average.

There is no extra credit available. AP/Honors classes are not given re-tests. As an AP Class, 15 points will be added to your average at the end of each six weeks.

Homework/Late Work/Make-up Work

As an upperclassman AP/Honors Class, students will be expected to show maturity and responsibility with their own learning process. After each lesson is complete, a short "daily quiz" will be completed in class and will count as a "daily grade." Independent Practice is imperative to the learning process, so it is VERY important that students work through their homework and/or "daily quiz practice" assignments. I will post an answer key on Google Classroom to help. This is where their maturity/responsibility comes in - simply writing the correct answer is not learning and will not prepare them for the upcoming "daily quiz," quiz, or test. Students must make sure they understand how to reach the correct and be prepared for the "daily quiz" when they arrive to class. If a student is struggling or needs help with the homework, tutoring is available most mornings at 7:30 am in my classroom.

Students should make arrangements to get their notes and assignments before any expected absences or immediately after any unexpected absences. A video lesson for each section will be available on Google Classroom. These video lessons will walk them through the notes they missed (and/or can be used as a re-teach at home).

Notebook:

Students will keep all assignments, notes, etc for each six weeks in the correct divider:

Bellwork, Notes, Daily Work, Tests/Quizzes, AP Exam. At the end of the six weeks (at teacher discretion), students will turn in the notebook to be graded.

Honors Course Policy:

In order to remain in any Honors course program, students must maintain an overall grade average of 85 or better after the ten points are added for each individual Honors course. If the student does not maintain this average for any six weeks, he or she will be placed on probation. If the student does not maintain this required average at the end of the following six weeks, he or she will be removed from the particular honors course and will be moved to the corresponding regular education class. The student will not be allowed to re-enter this honors program content area until completion of a full year of the regular education course and the readmittance criteria have been met. In addition, honors students must pass the state mandated test in the specific content area for the current school year to remain in the program. Students who do not meet both of these standards will be removed from the honors course for the upcoming school year.

Criteria for Consideration to Re-Admittance into an Honors Program:

In order to be considered for re-admittance into an honors program, the student must have an overall average of 92 in the regular core content area class at the end of the school year, must have passed the state mandated assessment for the particular content area during the most recent testing period, and have the content area teacher make a recommendation for re-admittance.
