What is a Title I school?

- Title I was passed in 1965 under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). It is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- Title I schools receive extra funding (Title I dollars) from the federal government. These dollars are used to:
 - identify students experiencing academic difficulties and provide assistance to help these students;
 - purchase additional staff, programs, materials, and/or supplies; and
 - conduct parent and family engagement meetings, trainings, events, and/or activities.

What can Title I funds be used for?

- In general, Title I funds may be used for:
 - additional paraprofessionals,
 - additional training for school staff,
 - extra time for instruction (before and/or after school programs),
 - parent and family engagement activities, and/or
 - a variety of supplemental teaching materials, equipment, and technology.

How does our school use Title I funds?

- In [SY 26.27](#) our school was allotted approximately \$[455,918.03](#) in Title I funding.
- We developed a **Schoolwide Program**, which means we plan to spend our funds on the following:

What is the SIP?

- The SIP is the School Improvement Plan. It includes:
 - the identification of the school planning team and how they will be engaged in the planning process;
 - a needs assessment and summary of academic and non-academic data;
 - prioritized goals, strategies, and action steps to help address the academic and non-academic needs of students;
 - teacher and staff professional development needs; and
 - budgets and the coordination of resources.
- The school must include family representatives on our school planning team.

What are our schoolwide program goals?

- **Math:** By May 2029, William Herbert Brewster Elementary School will increase the percentage of students who score proficient in Grades 3–5 Math for all students from 24.4% (2026) to 38.6% (2029); students with disabilities (SWD) from 17.1% to 32.6%; and English learners (ELL) from 18.8% to 34.0%.
- **ELA:** By May 2029, William Herbert Brewster Elementary School will increase the percentage of students who score proficient in Grades 3–5 ELA for all students from 30.3% (2026) to 43.4% (2029); students with disabilities (SWD) from 11.4% to 28.0%; and English learners (ELL) from 12.5% to 28.9%.
- **Grade 3 ELA:** By May 2029, William Herbert Brewster Elementary School will increase the percentage of third-grade students who score proficient in ELA from 36.0% (2026) to 70.0% (2029).
- **Attendance:** By May 2029, William Herbert Brewster Elementary School will reduce chronic absenteeism by **5.25 percentage points**, decreasing from **28.0% (2026) to 22.75% (2029)** through targeted attendance, engagement, and student support strategies.

What is our school's designation status?

- In accordance with Tennessee's accountability system, the Tennessee Department of Education (TDOE) determines designations for all public schools. Designations include:
 - **Reward Schools:** Recognizes schools with high levels of performance or student growth, including the top 5% of schools.
 - **CSI (Comprehensive Support and Improvement):** Also known as Priority schools, these are identified for being in the bottom 5% of overall performance or having a graduation rate below 67%.
 - **TSI/ATSI (Targeted/Additional Targeted Support and Improvement):** Also known as Focus schools, these are identified when specific student groups underperform
- WH Brewster has a non-designation status.

What is the State Report Card?

- TDOE releases an annual Report Card on Tennessee schools.
- This report displays state-, district-, and school-level data for each school year.
- It includes information on demographics, achievement, academic growth, attendance, graduation rate and more.

What curriculum does our school use?

- The Tennessee Academic Standards provide a common set of expectations for what students will know and be able to do at the end of a grade for each subject area.
- Tennessee's academic standards form the framework for everything taught at William H. Brewster Elementary.

What curriculum does our school use?

Dr. William H. Brewster Elementary uses the following curricula to guide students toward mastery of state standards per grade level:

- ELA (Reading) – McGraw-Hill Wonders
- Math – Envision Mathematics
- Science – Savvas Elevate Science
- Social Studies – Studies Weekly
- RTI²-A – i-Ready

What tests will my child be taking?

- Universal Screener (Fall, Winter, Spring)
 - ✓ The proficiency expectation is all students will score above the 25th percentile.
- CFAs (Common Formative Assessment) administered quarterly
 - ✓ The proficiency expectation is all students will score at or above 70 %.
- TCAP (April 2027)
 - ✓ The proficiency expectation is all students score on-track or mastered on all content areas.

What is parent and family engagement?

- Family engagement is a **shared responsibility** in which schools and other community agencies and organizations are committed to reaching out to engage families in meaningful ways and in which families are committed to actively supporting their children's learning and development.
- Family engagement is **continuous** across a child's life and entails enduring commitment but changing family roles as children mature into young adulthood.
- Effective family engagement cuts across and reinforces learning in the **multiple settings** where children learn – at home, in pre-kindergarten programs, in school, in after-school programs, in faith-based institutions, and in the community.

What is a Parent and Family Engagement Policy?

How is parent and family engagement funded?

- Any district with a Title I allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of its Title I allocation for parent and family engagement.
- Of that 1%, 10% may be reserved at the district for system-wide initiatives related to parent and family engagement. The remaining 90% must be allocated to all Title I schools in the district.
- You, as Title I parents and family members, have the right to be involved in how this money is spent.

How is parent and family engagement funded?

- In [SY 26.27](#) we received approximately [\\$5,500](#) in parent and family engagement funding. We plan to use these funds for:

What is a School-Parent Compact?

- A school-parent compact is a written commitment that outlines how the entire school community – teachers, families, and students will share the responsibility for improved academic achievement.
- The compact must describe how the school will:
 - provide high-quality curriculum and instruction;
 - hold parent-teacher conferences, annually in elementary schools;
 - provide parents with reports on their child's progress;
 - provide parents reasonable access to staff.
 - provide parents opportunities to volunteer; and
 - ensure regular two-way meaningful communication between family members and staff, to the extent practicable, in a language family members can understand.
- You, as a Title I parent or family member, have the right to be involved in the development of the compact.

What are the benefits of family engagement?

For students:

- Higher grades and test scores
- Better attendance
- More positive attitudes and better behavior
- Higher graduation rates
- Greater enrollment in postsecondary education

For Parents and Families:

- More confidence and trust in the school
- Increased confidence in their parenting skills
- Creates a home environment that encourages learning
- Encourages families to form stronger relationships with teachers and other families

For Schools and Teachers:

- Improved teacher and staff morale
- Higher ratings of schools and teachers by families
- More support from families
- Higher student achievement
- Increased and improved relationships within the community

How can I be involved?

- We need you! Research has proven that family engagement in education has more impact on student achievement than any other factor.

How can I be involved?

- Some examples of how you can be involved in your child's education include, but are not limited to:
 - encouraging attendance;
 - monitoring grades and schoolwork on PowerSchool;
 - be knowledgeable and understand the Student Code of Conduct
 - attending family events and meetings;
 - joining family groups and committees (e.g., PTA/PTO, SBDMC, etc.); and
 - reading school/classroom newsletters or utilizing websites that contain examples of learning activities families can do with students at home.
- Additionally, WH Brewster Elementary School's FEP describes several other opportunities for you to be involved in the education of your child.

What are my rights?

- The families and parents of Title I students have a right, by law, to:
 - be involved in decisions made at both the school and district level;
 - be provided with information on your child's level of achievement on tests in reading/language arts, writing, mathematics, and science;
 - request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher and paraprofessionals who are working with your child [by contacting the principal](#).
 - request opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of your child. The school is required to respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible.

What are my rights?

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

Parents' Right-To-Know

All parents have the right to request the following:

- A teacher's professional qualifications, which include: state qualifications, licensure, grade/s certification, waivers
- A teacher's baccalaureate and /or graduate degree, fields of endorsement, previous teaching experience
- A paraprofessional's qualifications
- An assurance that their child's name, address, and telephone listing not be released to military recruiters

All parents will receive information on the following:

- Their child's level of achievement in each of the state academic assessments
- Their option to request a transfer to another school within the district if their child is the victim of a violent crime at school
- Their right to timely notification that their child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who is not highly qualified.
