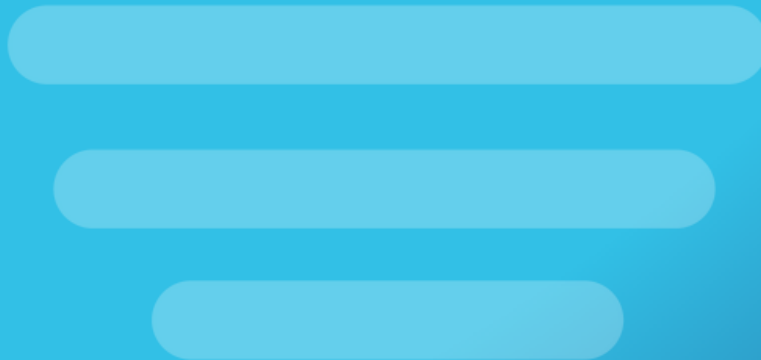

PLANNING FOR PROGRESS

Pinellas County Schools (PCS) is committed to keeping stakeholders informed about recommendations and decisions that affect students, families, staff, and the community. In response to the ongoing decline in the county's school-age population, district staff have presented the enclosed recommendations to ensure resources are used efficiently and that students have access to high-quality learning environments.

PCS is committed to providing timely information and opportunities for community input throughout the process. Recommendations, site-specific timelines, stakeholder feedback, and community engagement opportunities are available at www.pcsb.org/progress.

Recommendations were presented to the School Board during the September 10, 2026, workshop. The School Board will review the recommendations and community feedback at the October 6, 2026, workshop.

These recommendations are scheduled for public discussion and a vote by the School Board at the regularly scheduled School Board meeting on October 13, 2026. If approved, the recommendations will take effect beginning with the school year specified in each recommendation.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

The recommendations developed through the Planning for Progress process were guided by a comprehensive set of principles designed to ensure decisions support student success, maximize district resources, and reflect community priorities. Recommendations were evaluated through multiple lenses to balance educational opportunities, operational efficiency, and long-term sustainability. Key guiding principles include:

- **Student-Centered Opportunities:** Ensuring students have access to educational opportunities that are at least as good as, or better than, those currently available. Recommendations were evaluated based on their ability to maintain or enhance academic programs, student experiences, and access to support services.
- **Enrollment and Demand Trends:** Analyzing historical and projected enrollment patterns, school-level demand, and demographic trends to identify opportunities for more efficient use of facilities and alignment of resources with student populations.
- **Grade Configuration and Community Demand:** Considering the effectiveness and community interest in various school configurations, including K-5, K-8, 6-8, and 9-12 models, while evaluating the impact of potential changes on students, families, and communities.
- **Program Availability and Geographic Distribution:** Reviewing the location of academic, career, technical, and specialized programs across the district to ensure access and the strategic placement of educational offerings.
- **Site Capacity, Building Utilization, and Facility Investments:** Assessing the effectiveness of existing facility utilization, available capacity, and the level of investment or improvement needed to support future educational programs and operational requirements.
- **Community Development and Demographic Analysis:** Evaluating zip code-level population trends, housing development activity, and other community growth indicators to better understand future enrollment patterns and facility needs.
- **Public and Private Partnership Opportunities:** Identifying opportunities to leverage partnerships that enhance educational programming, expand services, optimize facility usage, or create additional value for students and communities.
- **School Attendance Boundaries and Transportation Considerations:** Reviewing school zones, feeder patterns, transportation routes, travel times, and operational efficiencies to ensure recommendations support student access while minimizing transportation impacts where possible.
- **Stakeholder Input and Community Priorities:** Incorporating feedback gathered through extensive stakeholder engagement, including students, families, staff, community members, business leaders, and other partners. Public input plays a critical role in ensuring recommendations reflect the values and priorities of the communities served.

Collectively, these guiding principles provide a balanced framework for evaluating options and developing recommendations that support high-quality educational opportunities, responsible stewardship of district resources, and the long-term success of Pinellas County Schools.

COMMUNITY INPUT SUMMARY AND THEMES

440+ stakeholders attended community meetings

2,500+ responses to the community survey

Since November 2025, Pinellas County Schools has sought community input to inform the Planning for Progress process. More than 2,500 responses were received during the July 2026 community meetings and stakeholder survey window. Community input continues to inform recommendations and decision-making. Input was summarized, reviewed, and discussed by the School Board during the workshop on August 13, 2026.

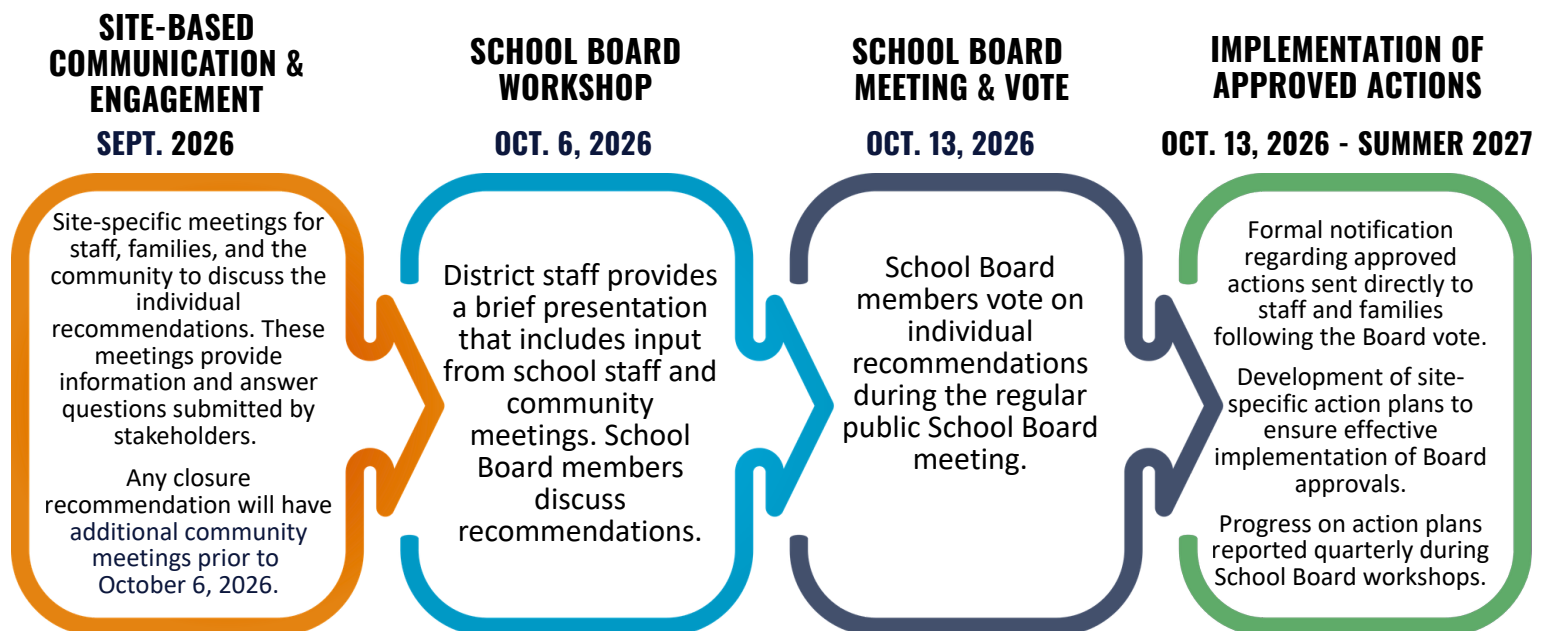
School communities impacted by the fall 2026 recommendations will be invited to participate in site-specific meetings between September 14 and October 6, 2026 at individual school sites.

COMMUNITY INPUT THEMES

- Additional K-8 schools; continuity and smoother transition for students in a K-8 model. Opposition to a 6-12 model.
- Combine and consolidate underenrolled schools in close proximity to each other.
- Preserve and strengthen neighborhood schools.
- Preserve magnet and fundamental programs.
- Allow community-specific needs and demands to guide programmatic changes.
- Expand and improve technical programs and technical high schools.
- Retain strong teachers and support staff.
- Repurpose closed campuses for community use, such as childcare centers, career and technical education, youth development, and community recreational centers.
- Utilize vacant buildings on elementary campuses or closed campuses for high-quality, affordable childcare and early learning.

- Reduction of up to 4,740 student stations.

ESTIMATED DISTRICTWIDE BUDGETARY IMPACT

- Reduction of estimated \$25 million in recurring annual expenses.
- Estimated one-time capital investment of \$6.9 million.

FALL 2026 RECOMMENDATIONS OVERVIEW

DISTRICTWIDE

- **Expansion of early learning to 2-year-olds** beginning in 2027-28. PCS will provide accessible early learning programs for the community while maintaining tuition rates that support sustainable program operations. Program locations will be selected based on facility readiness and capacity.
- **Exploration of sites for Employee Wellness Centers.** The goal of the centers will be to provide employees with access to most primary care and urgent care services at little to no out-of-pocket cost.

NORTH COUNTY

- **Expand the number of seats at East Lake Middle School Academy of Engineering** beginning in 2027-28 to allow more students to enroll in this in-demand choice option.
- **Open a fundamental K-8** on the current Tarpon Springs Middle School campus starting in the 2027-28 school year. The campus will become a dedicated fundamental school serving grades K-8, increasing both enrollment capacity and access to the district's fundamental program. Consistent with School Board policy, the district's standard fundamental program admission priorities will apply.
- **Close Tarpon Springs Fundamental Elementary School** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. Current students will transition to the new fundamental K-8.
- **Close Tarpon Springs Middle School** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. The current Tarpon Springs Middle School boundary will be rezoned to Carwise Middle School. The closed middle school site will transition to the new fundamental K-8 school.
- **Close and repurpose Kings Highway Elementary** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. As a district application program school, there is no attendance zone; students attending Kings Highway Elementary will attend their zoned school or apply to a District Application Program (DAP). Current Kings Highway Elementary students will receive priority for enrollment at Sandy Lane Elementary. The ESE program will transition to Sandy Lane Elementary. Sandy Lane Elementary is newly renovated, directly adjacent to Kings Highway Elementary, and has available space for students. The PreK program will remain at the current Kings Highway Elementary campus, with plans to expand the site into an early childcare center that provides the community with affordable, high-quality education for children ages 6 months through Voluntary PreK.
- **Update school zone boundaries for Dunedin, Garrison-Jones, Sandy Lane, San Jose elementary schools and Carwise Middle School** beginning in the 2027-28 school year. The adjustments will better utilize available space, balance student enrollment across schools in the region, and support safer travel to school by reducing the need to cross major roadways. Currently enrolled students affected by a school zone boundary change, not due to the closure of their current school, may remain at their current school through a Special Assignment Request; however, transportation will not be provided.

MID COUNTY

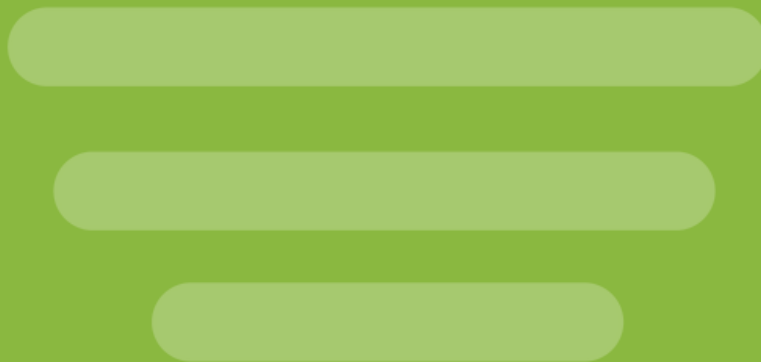
- **Open a fundamental K-5 school at Pinellas Park Elementary School** beginning in the 2027-28 school year. **Close Pinellas Park Elementary** and rezone the current school boundary to Skyview and Lealman Avenue elementary schools. The K-5 fundamental school will be a District Application Program (DAP) with no zone, and the district's standard fundamental program admission priorities will apply.
- **Close Blanton Elementary** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. The current school boundary will be rezoned to Marjorie Rawlings, Westgate, and Lealman Avenue elementary schools. The Exceptional Student Education (ESE) program will transition to the new fundamental elementary school at Pinellas Park.
- **Update school zone boundaries for Skyview, Marjorie Rawlings, New Heights, Westgate, Lealman Avenue, and 74th Street elementary schools** beginning in the 2027-28 school year. The adjustments will better utilize available space, balance student enrollment across schools in the region, and support safer travel to school by reducing the need to cross major roadways. Currently enrolled students affected by a school zone boundary change, not due to the closure of their current school, may remain at their current school through a Special Assignment Request; however, transportation will not be provided.

SOUTH COUNTY

- **Create a technical high school at Boca Ciega High School** beginning in the 2028-29 school year. The 2027-28 school year will allow for thoughtful planning of technical pathways and remodeling needed for programming. The current Center for Wellness and Medical Professions pathways will be enhanced as part of the technical high school program offerings. The Boca Ciega High School zone will have minor changes.
- **Relocate and rename Azalea Middle School.** The middle school will move to the current building 4 at Boca Ciega High School beginning in the 2027-28 school year. Renovate the Boca Ciega campus to provide a separate address and space, including safety and security separation for the middle school. The new site will place the middle school closer to the center of the school zone, enables resource sharing between the middle and high schools, strengthens articulation when transitioning to the technical high school, and better utilizes the current high school facilities.
- **Transition Azalea Elementary School to a K-8 school with an expanded zone and relocate the campus.** The new Azalea K-8 will relocate to the current Azalea Middle School campus in 2028-29. All students who attend grade 5 at Azalea Elementary will be able to attend grade 6 at Azalea K-8 beginning in 2027-28. The transition to a K-8 school will occur over three years, adding grade 6 in 2027-28, grade 7 in 2028-29, and grade 8 in 2029-30. The Azalea K-8 school will be a zoned school, and the district's standard Special Assignment Request admission procedures will apply for students who do not reside in the Azalea Elementary zone. The new Azalea K-8 will relocate to the current Azalea Middle campus in 2028-29.
- **Close Bear Creek Elementary** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. The current school boundary will be rezoned to Gulfport Montessori and Fairmount Park elementary schools. The ESE program will relocate to Gulfport Montessori Elementary.
- **Close Sexton Elementary** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. The current school boundary will be rezoned to Woodlawn and Lynch elementary schools. The ESE program will transition to the new fundamental elementary school at Pinellas Park.
- **Close Lealman Innovation** at the end of the 2026-27 school year. Educational Alternative Services (EAS) resources will be assigned to the appropriate South County schools to directly support students in the programs. Current students will receive individualized consultation to identify supports at the appropriate middle or high schools. The closed Lealman Innovation property will be leased to Feeding Tampa Bay.
- **Update school zone boundaries for Lynch and Sawgrass Lake elementary schools** beginning in the 2027-28 school year. The adjustments will better utilize available space, balance student enrollment across schools in the region, and support safer travel to school by reducing the need to cross major roadways. Currently enrolled students affected by a school zone boundary change, not due to the closure of their current school, may remain at their current school through a Special Assignment Request (SAR); however, transportation will not be provided.

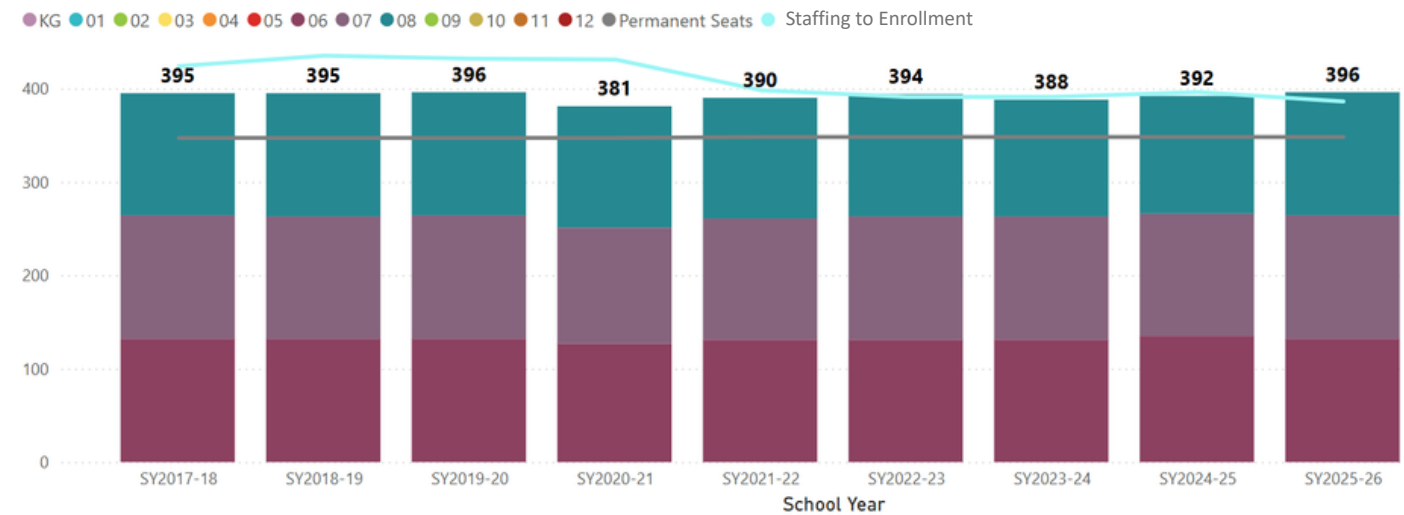
RECOMMENDATION: EXPAND EAST LAKE MIDDLE ACADEMY OF ENGINEERING

This recommendation **expands East Lake Middle School Academy of Engineering** beginning in the 2027-28 school year. No programmatic changes are proposed. The expansion will increase enrollment capacity within the current campus, allowing more students to access the program. This recommendation aligns with the community's expressed support for preserving magnet programs, expanding technical programs, and using community demand to inform programmatic decisions.

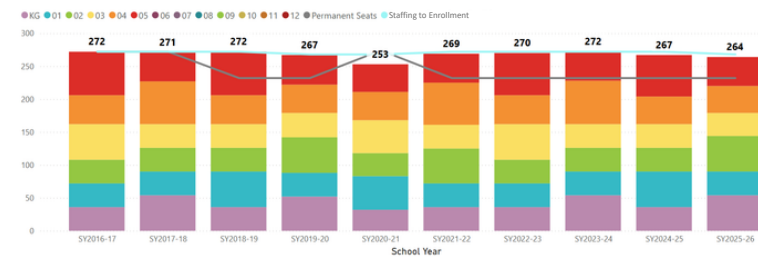

**RECOMMENDATION: OPEN A FUNDAMENTAL K-8 ON THE TARPON SPRINGS MIDDLE SCHOOL CAMPUS
CLOSE TARPON SPRINGS MIDDLE SCHOOL
CLOSE TARPON SPRINGS FUNDAMENTAL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL**

This recommendation opens a fundamental K-8 school on the current Tarpon Springs Middle School campus beginning in the 2027-28 school year and closes Tarpon Springs Middle School (TSMS) and Tarpon Springs Fundamental Elementary (TSFES) at the end of the 2026-27 school year. The existing Tarpon Springs Middle zone will be rezoned to Carwise Middle School (CMS) beginning in the 2027-28 school year. Students currently enrolled in the K-5 fundamental program at Tarpon Springs Fundamental Elementary have the opportunity to continue in the fundamental program through 8th grade. The Tarpon Springs Fundamental K-8 School will be a District Application Program (DAP) with no zone, and the district's standard fundamental program admission priorities will apply. Annually, all students enrolled in grade 5 at Tarpon Springs Fundamental Elementary will be eligible to continue in grade 6 at Tarpon Springs Fundamental K-8 beginning in 2027-28. Additional seats will be available through the district's DAP process, which opens in January 2027 for the 2027-28 school year.

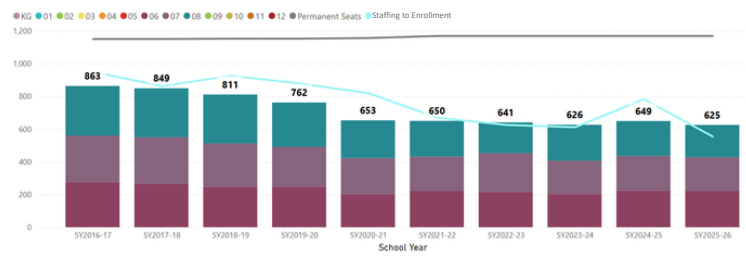

**Carwise MS projected enrollment is the new total zoned population minus the ELMS capacity and the 6-8 capacity of the new fundamental K-8.

Creating a fundamental program on a larger campus will provide space to expand enrollment up to 480 in K-5, and 572 in middle school grade levels, making better use of the facility. As middle school families choose the expanded Tarpon Springs Fundamental K-8 School, expanded East Lake Middle, and the newly expanded Oldsmar K-8 School, enrollment is expected to become more balanced across the area, better utilizing available capacity.

FISCAL AND OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCY

RECENT FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

Since 2020, Tarpon Springs Fundamental Elementary has received more than \$967K in facility improvements and maintenance, including an upgraded playground and turf, painting, and chiller replacement.

During the same period, Tarpon Springs Middle has received nearly \$654K in maintenance and capital improvements, including chiller and elevator replacements and major plumbing repairs.

ANTICIPATED FACILITIES INVESTMENTS

The Tarpon Springs Middle campus will require \$3.1 million in one-time capital improvement investment to renovate bathrooms, making them suitable for primary grades, install playgrounds, and make upgrades to create elementary spaces on the first floor.

ESTIMATED FINANCIAL IMPACT

Total Savings: \$4.6M/year

Personnel: \$4M/year

Operational: \$590K/year

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AND PROGRAM OFFERINGS

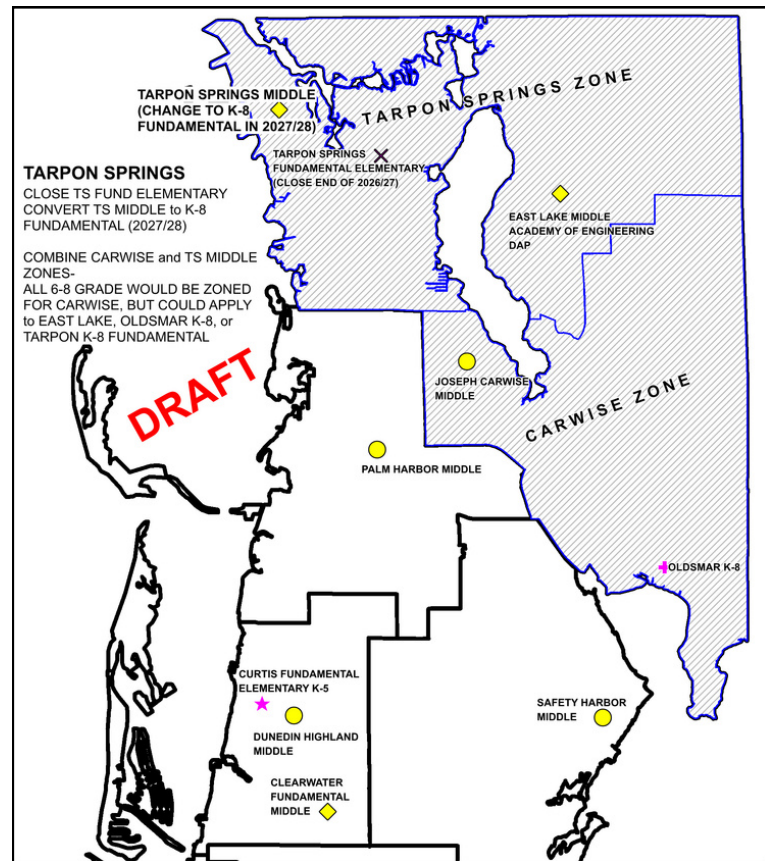
Tarpon Springs Middle School has earned a school grade of A or B since the 2020-21 school year. This recommendation is driven by community feedback, districtwide enrollment trends, facility utilization, and the need to align resources to best serve students across the district.

The current Tarpon Springs Middle zone will be rezoned to Carwise Middle. Approximately 1,117 PCS students live in the affected area that will be rezoned to Carwise Middle. Carwise Middle is an A-rated school serving students in grades 6-8.

Students who currently attend Tarpon Springs Fundamental Elementary can remain in the new fundamental program and change locations to the current Tarpon Springs Middle campus beginning in the 2027-28 school year. Additional families can apply to the Tarpon Springs Fundamental K-8 program beginning in January 2027 for the 2027-28 school year. Transportation will be provided to Carwise Middle in alignment with School Board policy.

POLICY 2250: FUNDAMENTAL AND MAGNET SCHOOLS

The expanded K-8 fundamental school will become a District Application Program (DAP) choice for the 2027-28 school year. The district's standard fundamental program admission priorities will apply, and transportation will not be provided.

POLICY 5120: ASSIGNMENT WITHIN THE DISTRICT

This recommendation will rezone 59 grids and 1,117 students who live within the zone.

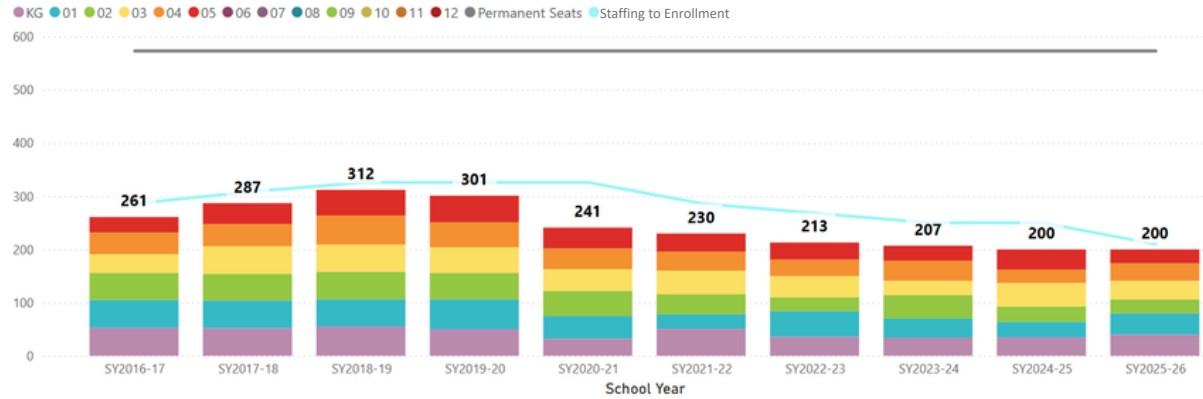

RECOMMENDATION: CLOSE AND REPURPOSE KINGS HIGHWAY ELEMENTARY

This recommendation **closes Kings Highway Elementary School (KHES) at the end of the 2026-27 school year**. Kings Highway Elementary currently serves 168 students in grades K-5, 75 PreK students, and 20 students in a full-time Exceptional Student Education (ESE) program. The ESE program will transition to Sandy Lane Elementary. PreK will remain at Kings Highway Elementary. Transportation may be provided in alignment with School Board policy. If Board approved, the recommendation includes repurposing or leasing the Kings Highway Elementary property for childcare and early learning.

Projected enrollment includes currently enrolled students from the closing school who are zoned to the receiving school, plus the receiving school's current enrollment.

The majority of Kings Highway Elementary students live in the Sandy Lane (96 students) and Skycrest (29 students) elementary school zones. Most of the remaining students are zoned for nine elementary school zones: Dunedin, Ponce de Leon, Eisenhower, High Point, Belleair, Plumb, Frontier, Garrison-Jones, and Safety Harbor elementary schools, with 10 or fewer Kings Highway Elementary students zoned for each school. All receiving schools have sufficient capacity to accommodate these students.

Capital Investment: The recommendation is to repurpose or lease the Kings Highway Elementary property for childcare and early learning.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AND PROGRAM OFFERINGS

Kings Highway Elementary earned a B school grade in 2025-26. The recommendation for closure and rezoning is guided by districtwide enrollment trends, facility utilization, and the need to align resources to best serve students across the district.

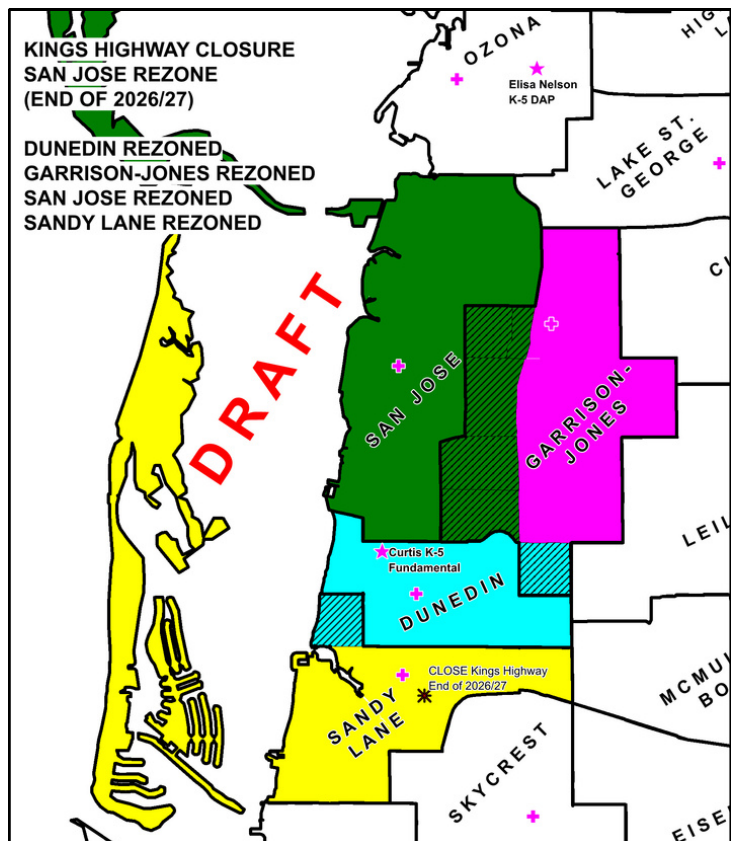

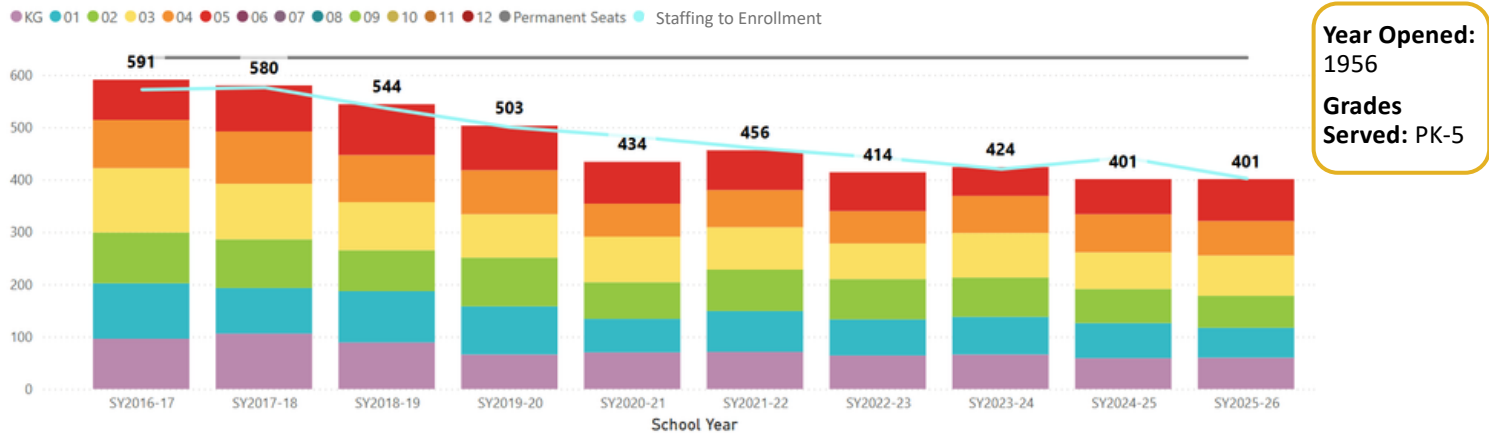

RECOMMENDATION: OPEN A FUNDAMENTAL K-5 ON THE PINELLAS PARK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAMPUS CLOSE PINELLAS PARK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

This recommendation opens **Pinellas Park Elementary School (PPES)** as a K-5 fundamental school beginning in the 2027-28 school year. Pinellas Park Elementary will close at the end of the 2026-27 school year. The existing school boundary will be rezoned to nearby Skyview and Lealman Avenue elementary schools. The current full-time Exceptional Student Education (ESE) program at Pinellas Park Elementary will relocate to the established program at Seminole Elementary. The ESE program at Blanton Elementary will transition to the new fundamental K-5 at Pinellas Park Elementary in the 2027-28 school year. The fundamental school will operate as a District Application Program (DAP) with no zone and the district’s standard fundamental admission priorities will apply. For the 2027-28 school year, students currently enrolled at Pinellas Park Elementary will have the choice to opt-in to attend the new fundamental school, agreeing to all fundamental program requirements. Transportation will not be provided.

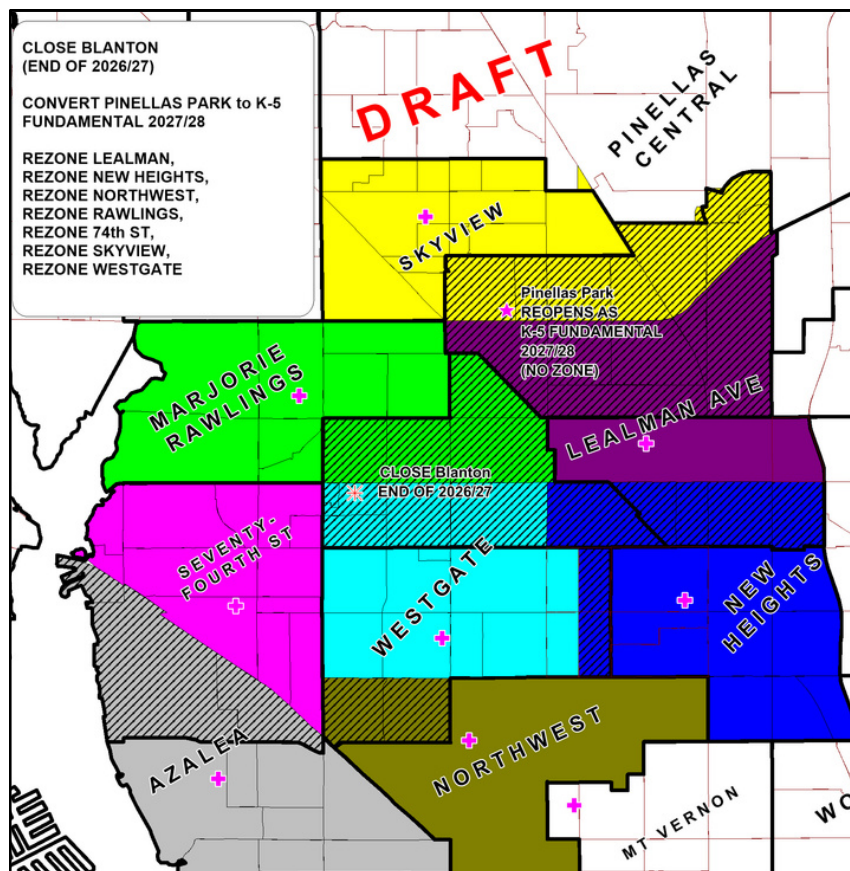

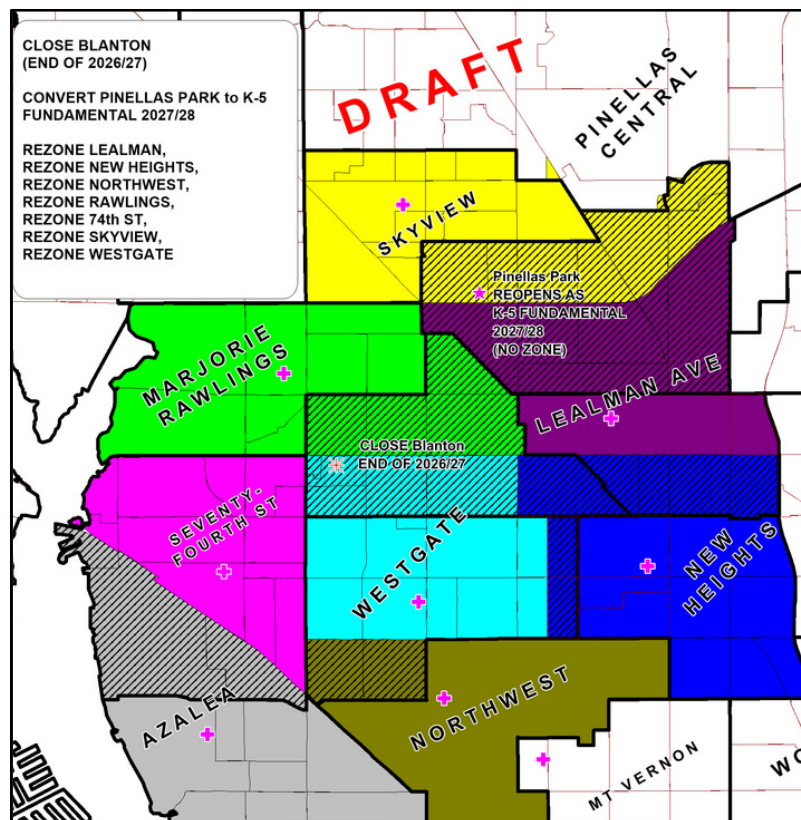

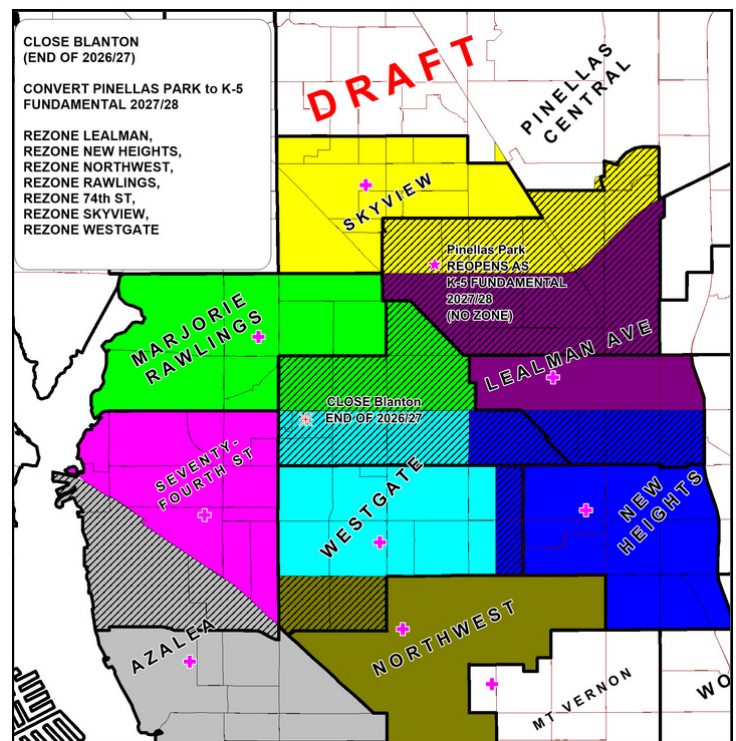

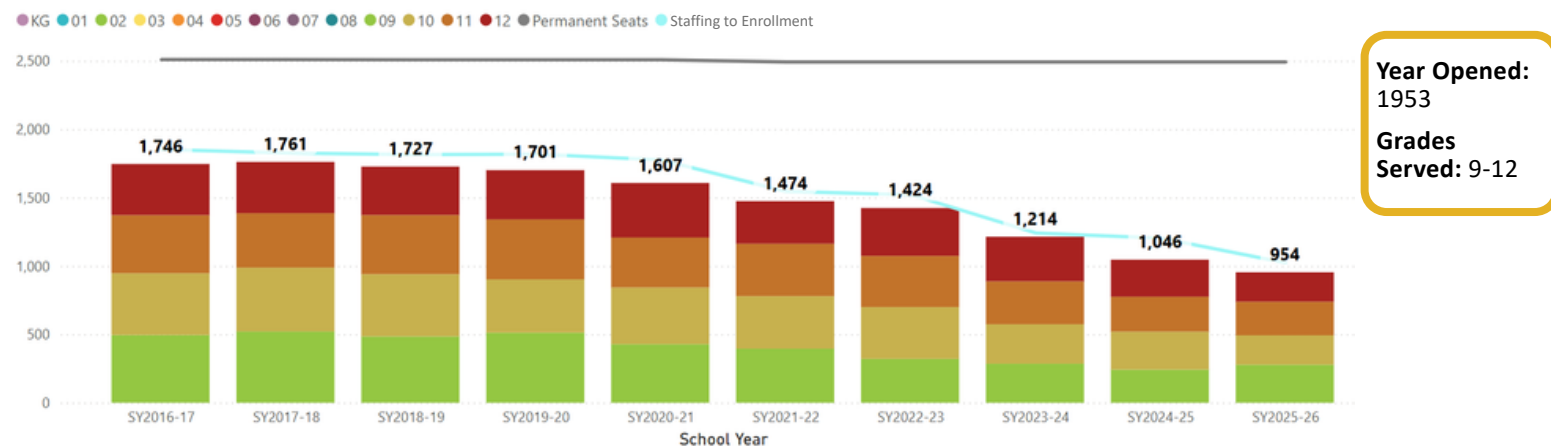
RECOMMENDATION: CREATE A TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL AT BOCA CIEGA HIGH SCHOOL

This recommendation establishes a **technical high school at Boca Ciega High School (BCHS) beginning in the 2028-29 school year**. The district is committed to partnering with local employers, colleges, and community leaders to provide meaningful real-world experiences that prepare students for college, careers, and life. No changes are recommended to the current Center for Wellness and Medical Professions District Application Program (DAP). If approved by the Board, the district will initiate a year-long planning and community engagement process to design academic programs that align with the interests and needs of students, families, and the community. Additionally, a portion of the campus will be re-parceled to establish a separate address for building 4, which will serve as the relocation site for Azalea Middle School and reduce the permanent capacity of the Boca Ciega High campus.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND HISTORY

Boca Ciega High currently has an enrollment of 967 students and a building capacity of 2,492 student stations, resulting in 39% utilization. Expanding the academic programs will provide students with opportunities for specialized training and hands-on learning across a variety of programs and degree fields, while making better use of the campus and increasing enrollment.

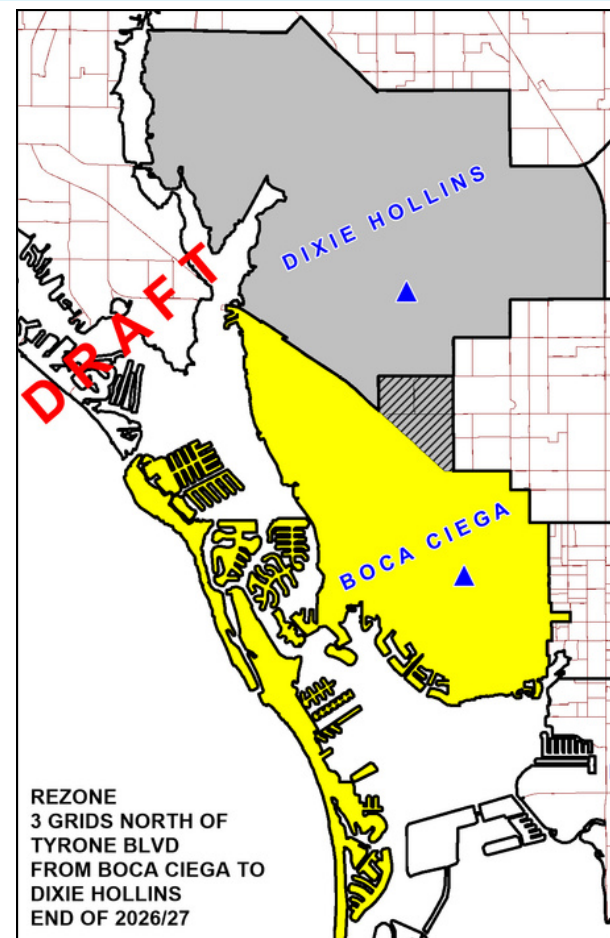
ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AND PROGRAM OFFERINGS

The technical high school at Boca Ciega High will be a college- and career-focused public high school that combines rigorous academics with hands-on, real-world learning experiences. Building on and expanding the renowned Center for Wellness and Medical Professions, the school will provide students with access to specialized Career and Technical Education (CTE) pathways aligned with high-demand industries. Similar to Richard O. Jacobson Technical High School, all students will participate in specialized programs that provide in-demand skills, opportunities to earn industry certifications, and experiences that prepare them for college and careers.

Starting in Spring 2027 and continuing throughout the 2027-28 school year, the school and community will engage in a transition process to identify pathways for the technical high school. The fundamental program will begin to phase out over the next three school years. Starting in 2027-28, the fundamental program will no longer accept new applicants to the fundamental program at Boca Ciega High.

Students currently zoned for Boca Ciega High will remain zoned for the technical high school and will be offered a traditional high school experience, including athletics and extracurricular activities, enhanced with embedded CTE pathways. Every student will graduate prepared for multiple postsecondary options, including colleges and universities, technical schools, military, apprenticeships, and direct entry into the workforce, and will also earn industry-recognized credentials. If a student is zoned for Boca Ciega High and does not wish to attend the technical high school, a transportation zone will be established, and transportation will be provided to a designated traditional high school starting in the 2028-29 school year.

The technical high school will be available to students throughout the south county application area through the District Application Program (DAP) process, providing more students with access to specialized college and career pathways starting in the 2028-29 school year.

Development of the District Application Program (DAP) choices aligned with the technical high school pathways will occur in the 2027-28 school year and will be reflected in policy amendments for the 2028-29 school year.

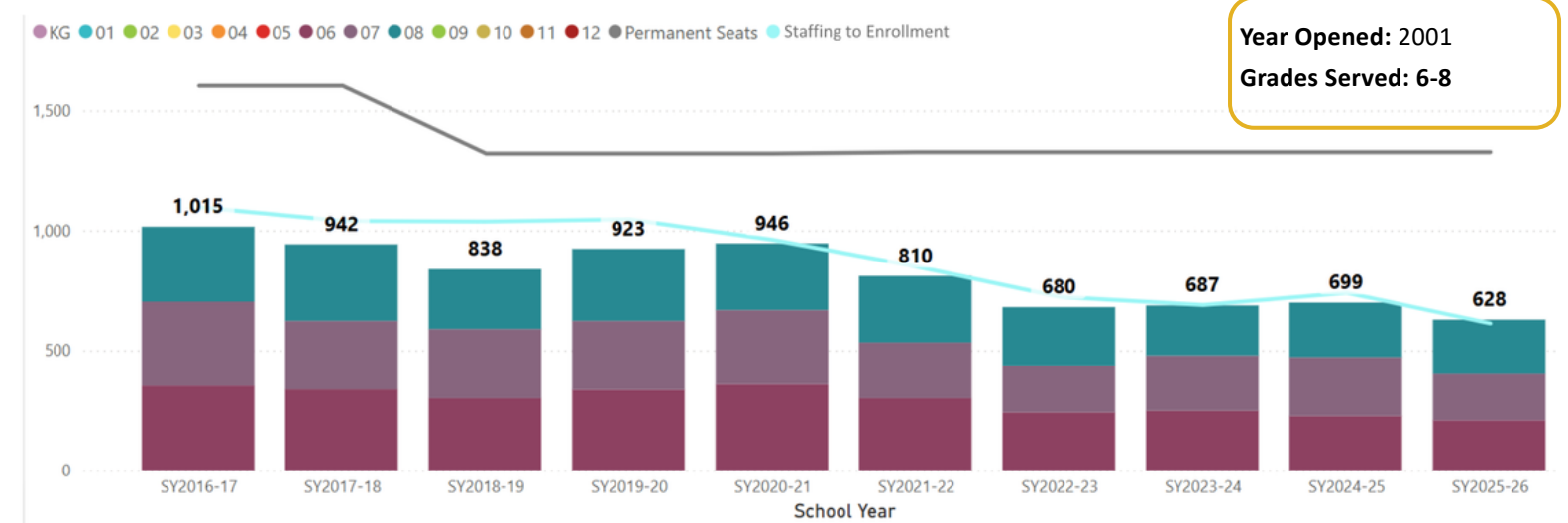

Relocating the school creates opportunities to develop technical program pathways and share resources between the middle and high schools while maintaining a unique identity and clear separation as a dedicated middle school campus. During the planning year, Azalea Middle and the technical high school at Boca Ciega will work together to identify and develop career and technical education pathways that align across middle and high school grade levels, creating a more seamless progression for students.

In addition, the medical pathway currently offered at Bay Point Middle will move to the new Azalea Middle School location, creating stronger alignment with Boca Ciega High's Center for Wellness and Medical Professions and establishing a clearer feeder pattern for students interested in pursuing medical and healthcare careers. This transition will provide students with expanded access to specialized academic opportunities, stronger connections to career-focused programs, and a well-defined pathway from middle school through high school and beyond.

While most of the current attendance zone will remain unchanged, students who live on the northwest side of Tyrone Boulevard will be rezoned to attend Tyrone Middle School. Additionally, a small portion of the current Bay Point Middle boundary will be rezoned to the Azalea Middle boundary.

The school community will engage in a renaming process prior to the move to the new campus.

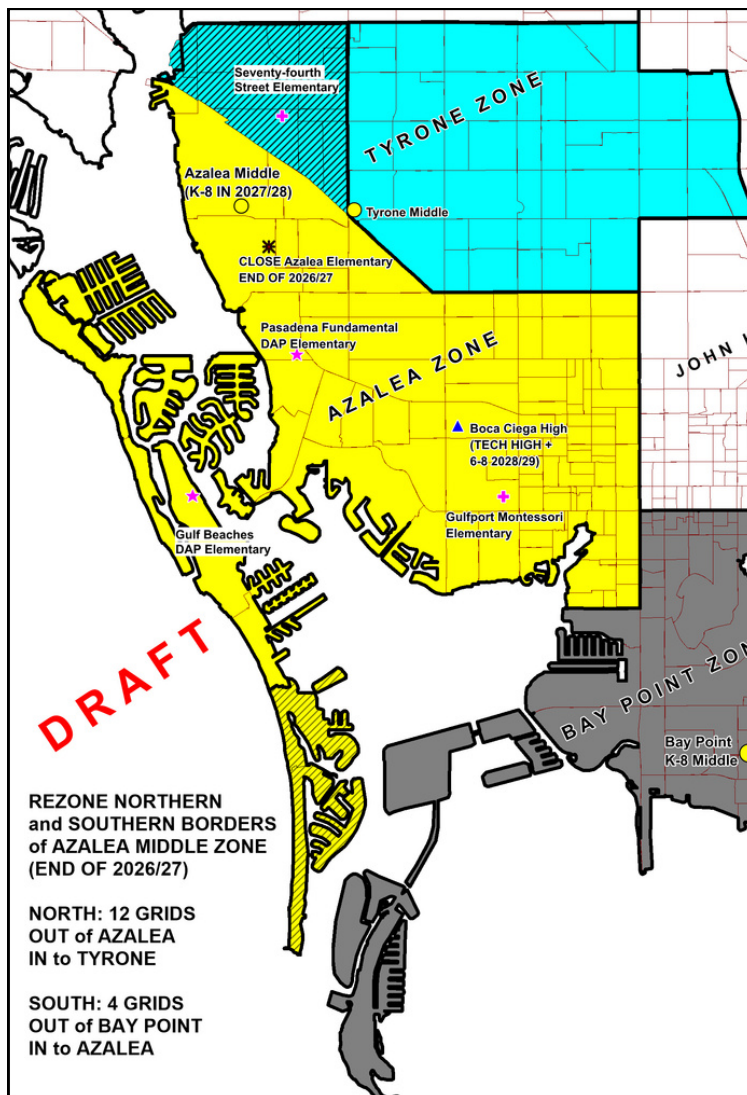

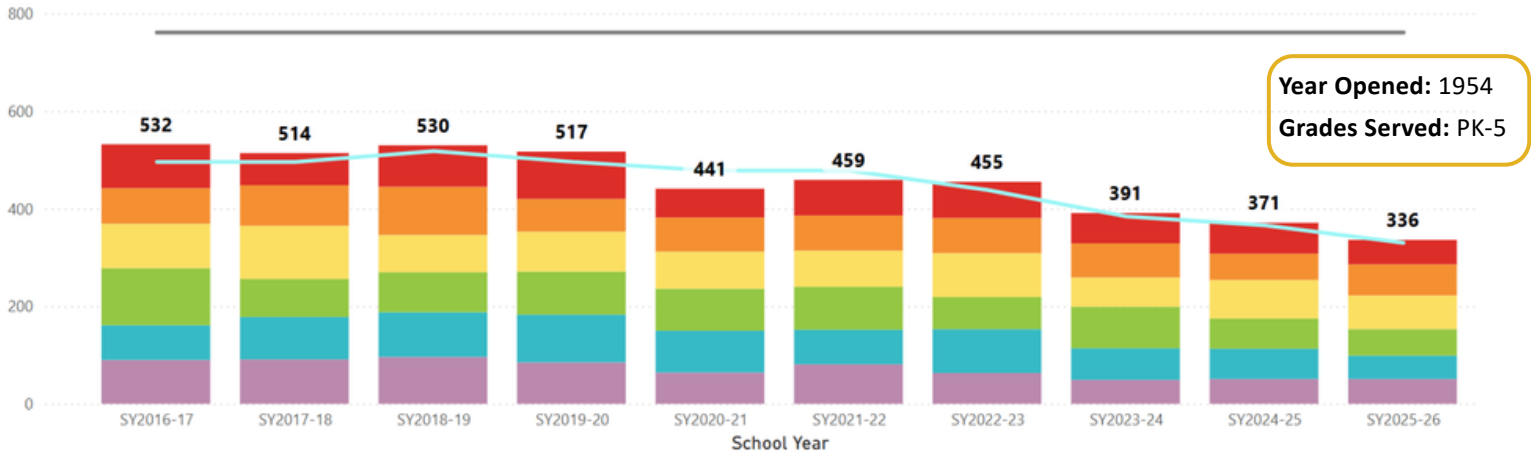
RECOMMENDATION: TRANSITION AZALEA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TO A K-8 WITH AN EXPANDED ZONE AND RELOCATE THE CAMPUS

This recommendation transitions Azalea Elementary School (AES) to a K-8 school with an expanded zone for the 2027-28 school year and relocates the campus for the 2028-29 school year. Annually, all students who attend grade 5 at Azalea Elementary will have the opportunity to continue in the K-8 program through 8th grade. Current Azalea Elementary fifth graders will be able to attend grade 6 at Azalea K-8 beginning in 2027-28. The transition to a K-8 school will occur over three years, adding grade 6 in 2027-28, grade 7 in 2028-29, and grade 8 in 2029-30. The Azalea K-8 school will be a zoned school, and the district's standard Special Assignment Request admission procedures will apply to students who do not reside in the Azalea Elementary zone. The current full-time Exceptional Student Education (ESE) program at Azalea Elementary will remain at Azalea K-8. The new Azalea K-8 will relocate to the current Azalea Middle campus in 2028-29. Transportation may be provided in alignment with School Board policy.

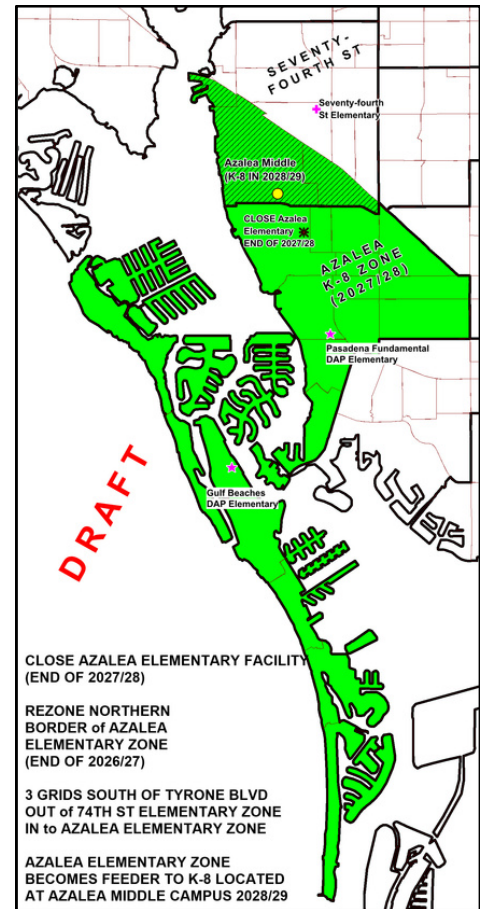
To support a smooth implementation, the K-8 model will be phased in over three years, adding grade 6 in 2027-28, grade 7 in 2028-29, and grade 8 in 2029-30.

The Azalea K-8 school will be a zoned school. The zone will include the current Azalea Elementary zone and will expand north to Tyrone Boulevard, allowing more students in the surrounding community to attend the new K-8 school. Students who attend grade 5 at Azalea K-8 will have the opportunity to continue in the K-8 program through 8th grade. Current Azalea Elementary fifth graders will be able to attend grade 6 at Azalea K-8 beginning in 2027-28.

Each year during the school choice process, students who do not live within the zone may apply to attend Azalea K-8 through the district's standard Special Assignment Request process. The district's policies will apply to students who do not reside in the Azalea Elementary zone.

The new Azalea K-8 will relocate to the current Azalea Middle campus beginning in the 2028-29 school year.

This phased expansion mirrors the approach used at Oldsmar Elementary, allowing the school community to grow gradually while maintaining continuity for students and families. The transition will provide families with a stable K-8 option, reduce student transitions, and create opportunities for stronger academic and extracurricular alignment across grade levels.

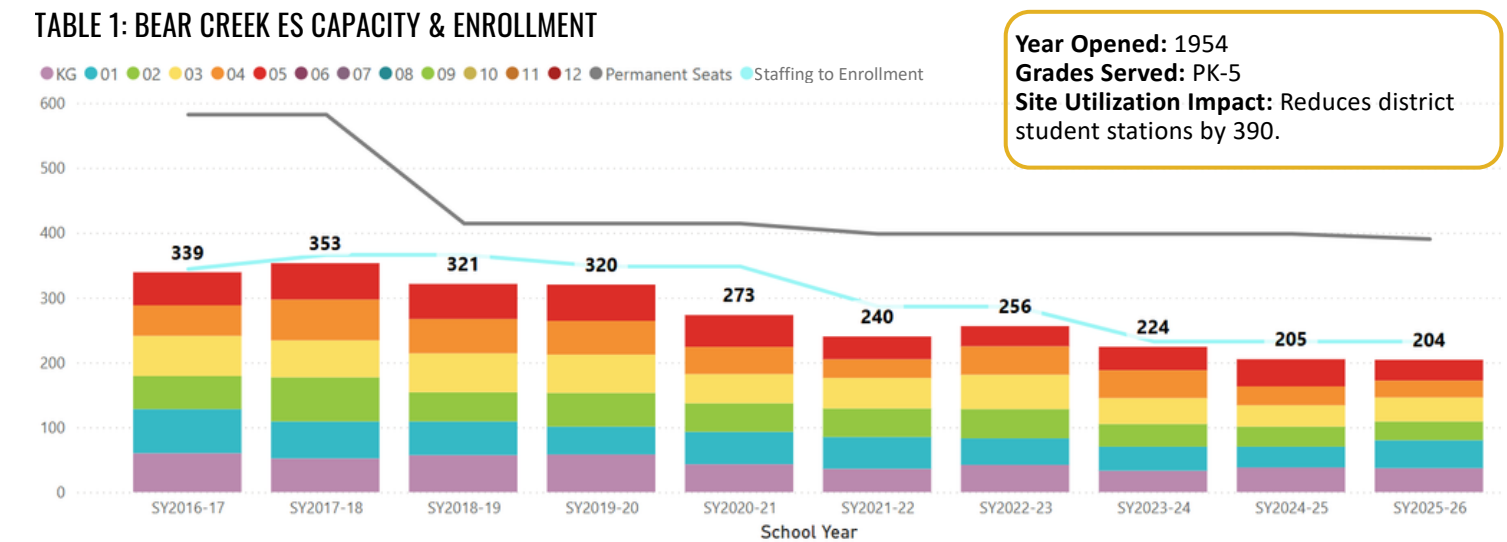

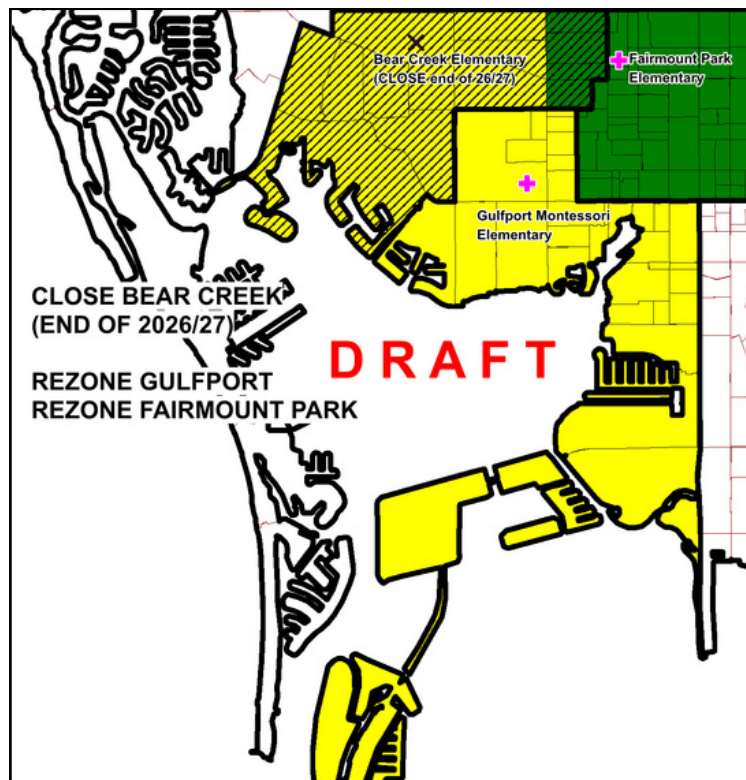

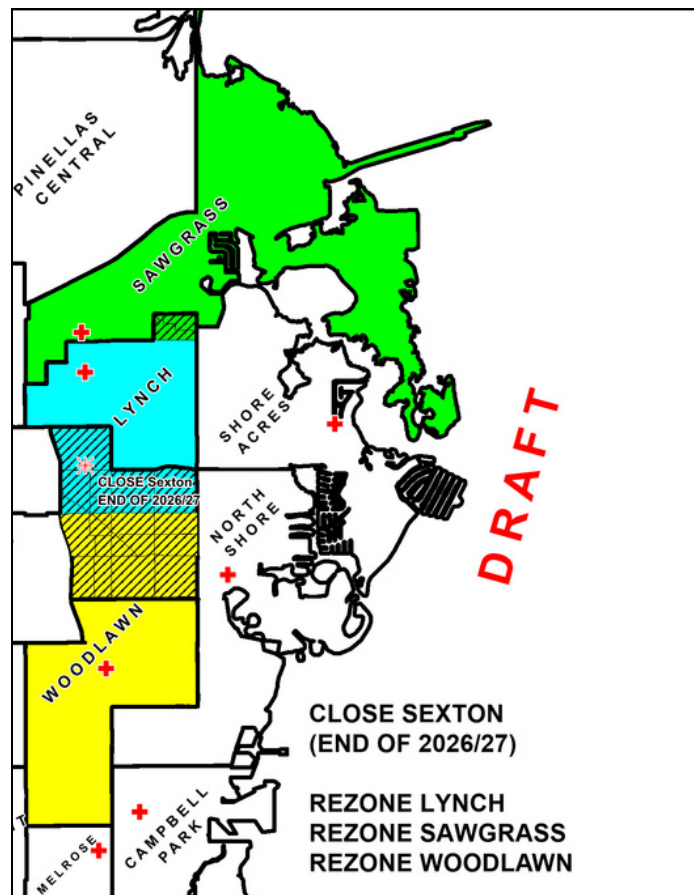

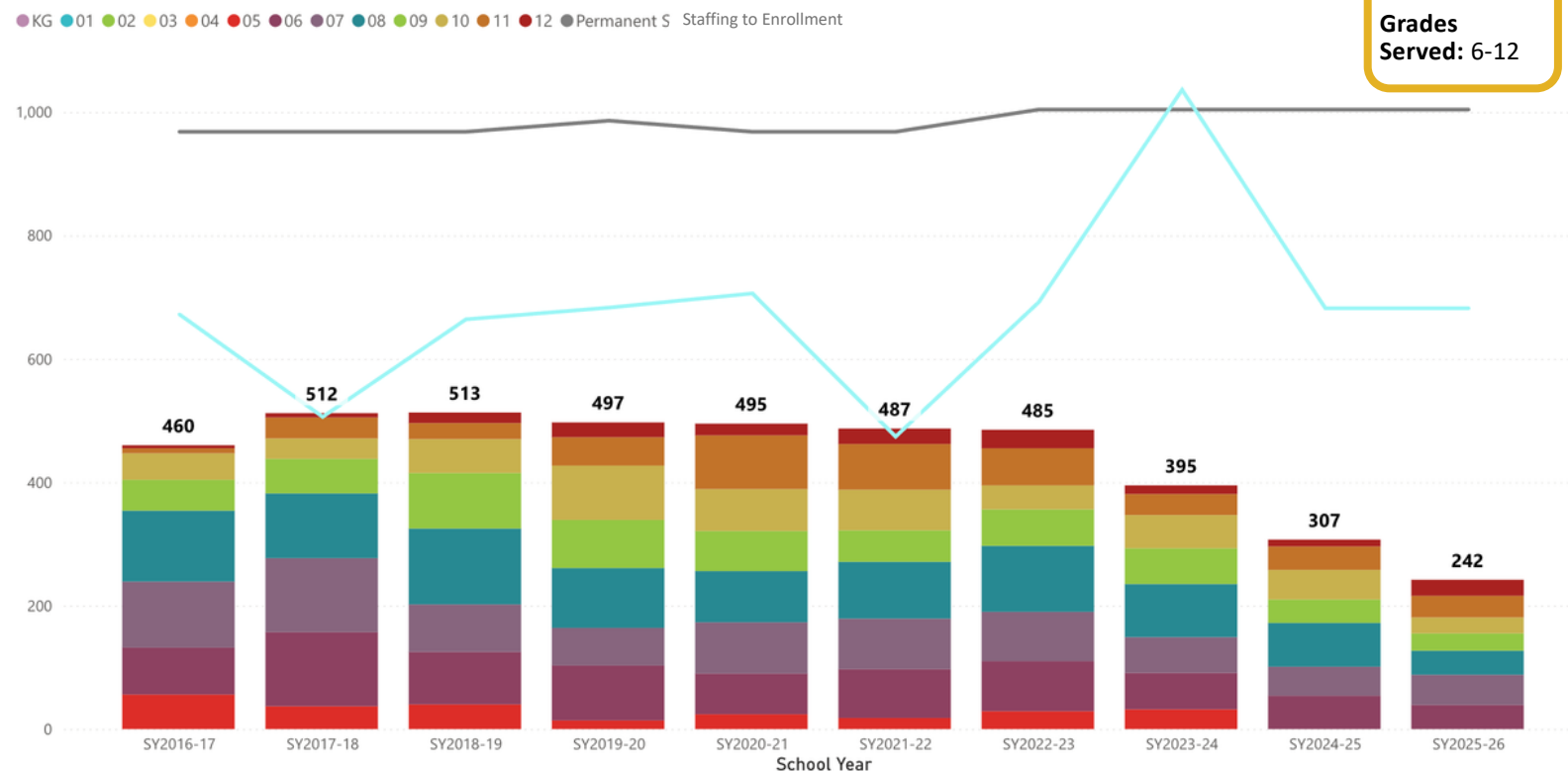

 - Opportunities to shadow/visit the campus and attend experiences hosted at the new zoned school.
 - Families interested in additional options for the 2027-28 school year can engage in the choice process during the District Application Program and Special Assignment Request windows.
