Georgetown Visitation, founded in 1799, is a college preparatory school rooted in the Roman Catholic faith and Salesian tradition, committed to educating young women from diverse backgrounds. We are a faith-centered community dedicated to educational excellence and enriched by co-curricular and service programs. Our mission is to empower our students to meet the demands and challenges of today's rapidly changing and morally complex world. We guide our students to become self-reliant, intellectually mature, and morally responsible women of faith, vision, and purpose.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

A Visitation education is tailored to ensure every student has a strong foundation in both liberal arts and STEM, as well as the freedom to explore her passions. During freshman year, all students take a core curriculum of classes, building not only their academic knowledge, but also their self-understanding and study skills. Each year, students build on this foundation, as intellectual vistas unfold before them, offering new areas for exploration. Visitation women graduate with exceptional writing and communications skills and creative, analytical problem-solving abilities, as well as the moral imperative to apply these skills to the betterment of our world. Signature academic experiences include:

- **Junior Year English Research Paper:** students create a strong thesis statement and argument, conduct research in a college library, identify proper sources, and write an in-depth research paper.
- **Theology III Praxis Project:** students examine global and domestic social justice issues through the lens of Catholic teaching, proposing and executing actionable solutions to problems they identify.

STUDENT LIFE

Our students learn leadership skills and explore passions beyond the classroom through Visitation's robust student life programming, which includes:

- More than **50 student-led associations and clubs**, including elected leadership positions for Student Government Association, Athletic Association, and Honor Board and award-winning publications (literary magazine, newspaper, yearbook).
- **24 JV and Varsity athletic teams** - Visitation has won the Lewis Cup for overall athletic excellence 14 times - more than any other school in the Independent School League.
- **Artistic outlets**, including dance, music and theater productions; visual art classes; and technical crew.

DISTINCTIVE TRADITIONS

Georgetown Visitation students take part in unique community traditions, which include:

- **Gold-White Spirit Week & Pep Rally:** Our school is divided into Gold and White Teams; students plan and organize Gold-White weeks twice a year, including collecting thousands of cans for donation in the fall, culminating in huge pep rallies, performances, and athletic competitions.
- **Marshmallow Roast:** Each class writes and produces a comedic skit about student life.
- **Salesian Virtues:** Each month, one student is invited to share a reflection with the community on a Salesian Little Virtue; students are also peer-nominated as "Cub of the Month" for displaying a particular virtue.

COURSE RIGOR

A Georgetown Visitation education equips young women with the knowledge and skills for a lifetime of inquiry and excellence. Teachers foster collaboration and communication skills, empowering students to think independently, critically, and creatively to identify solutions to real world challenges.

To enroll in advanced classes, students must meet academic eligibility benchmarks; with prior approval, students may also choose to take an online course or a summer course to count towards completion of their graduation requirements. The level of rigor offered is as follows:

- **College Preparatory:** Unless designated otherwise, all courses are college preparatory and challenging, including theology courses.
- **Honors:** Honors courses provide more challenge than our standard courses. Denoted on the transcript with Honors in their title, they receive a .7 bump for GPA calculation. Rarely do students enroll in Honors courses prior to sophomore year.
- **High Honors:** One post-AP course that is considered High Honors - Multivariable Calculus - receives a 1.0 bump for GPA calculation.
- **AP:** The 20 AP courses we offer are the most rigorous in our catalog; they receive a 1.0 bump for GPA calculation. Students do not take AP classes in ninth grade, and only one AP class (AP Human Geography) is available to tenth graders. The average Visitation senior has taken five AP courses by the time she graduates.
- **Dual Enrollment:** Visitation partners with Georgetown University and Mount St. Mary's University to offer college-level classes. These courses are listed on transcripts (as P or NP) and count towards graduation, but are not factored into a student's cumulative GPA. Students receive transcripts from the universities that reflect the actual grade and credit earned.

GRADING SYSTEM

A cumulative grade point average (GPA) is computed at the end of each year based on final letter grades. Grades and their numerical equivalents are as follows:

ACADEMIC HONORS & CHARACTER AWARDS

Due to the strength and rigor of our academic program, we do not assign class rank. Awards are noted as follows:

- **General Medal of Excellence:** Given yearly to the student in each grade who has earned the highest grade point average for that school year.
- **Academic Excellence:** Given yearly to those in the top 15% of the class for that school year.
- **Cum Laude Society:** Students with a cumulative GPA in the top 20% are inducted into the Visitation chapter of the Cum Laude Society.
- **Clorivière Scholars:** Given to students whose cumulative GPA at the end of sophomore year places them in the top 20%. Students retain their distinction or are newly inducted for senior year if their cumulative GPA at the end of junior year places them in the top 20%.
- **Honor Roll:** At the end of each semester, students with a grade point average of 3.0 or above with no grades below C receive Second Honors. Students with a grade point average of 3.7 or above with no grades below C receive First Honors.
- **Margaret Mary Spirit Award:** Given to students who mirror the qualities of its namesake: dependability, loyalty, friendship, and enthusiasm.
- **Rubacky 3-E Award:** Given to students who have shown exemplary effort and enthusiasm for learning, who consistently work diligently but are rarely recognized.
